## Symphony Trip to Keep Director, Musicians Busy

There's more detail than meets the eye in managing a trip of 40 young musicians to California. So Dr. William Sweetman found out when he commenced plans for the trip of the Salem Junior Symphony next week.

Yes, the opportunity for the Salem musicians to appear before a session of the Music Educators National Conference in Los Angeles is "invitational," he answered my query on how the trip came about.

"But it took a lot of good hard work to get the invitation," he said.

The 40 orchestra members, 14 chaperones and all the instruments, board three buses on Sunday morning and return Thursday night, March 27. Dr. Sweetman has already left and plans to meet the buses, with all the loose ends gathered handily—he hopes.

Among his worries will be handling the \$1200 on food and seeing that everybody is kept just busy enough to remain occupied but not tired. Sightseeing trips have been planned, a visit to a large musical instrument company plants, a short stop in Disneyland and a meal at Knott's Berry Farm enroute home are also on the itinerary.

**ONE OF FIVE**

The Salem group is to be one of five organizations to appear before the music educators during the five-day convention. Their concert is to take place Tuesday morning in the Philharmonic Auditorium at a general session of the convention. The last music group from Oregon which appeared at a similar convention was the 1940 LaGrande Band. Others selected this year are students from Anchorage, Alaska, Utah, Arizona and an all-boy band from Georgia.

The orchestra will play a 45-minute contemporary program: Fantasia on the Alleluia Hymn by Gordon Jacob, Pastoral Suite by Lars-Erik Larsson, John Henry, by Aaron Copeland, and Dance Overture by Burrill Phillips.

Dr. Sweetman tells me the concert is not to be broadcast, but he hopes there may be a recording which can later be broadcast locally.

He has been approached by the Lawrence Welke program, and expects the group to be guests at a broadcast, he was not told whether they will be only introduced without appearing before the cameras. They will not play he knows, as the programs are planned months ahead.
