

Educator Warns Of Overemphasis On U.S. Scientists

PORTLAND — T. M. Stinnett, an executive in the National Education Assn., said Thursday night that schools should beware of over-emphasizing science.

Speaking at the annual banquet of the Oregon Education Assn., Stinnett said he was fed up "with what I consider to be a shabby propaganda campaign aimed at control by certain vested interests of the curriculum of the American schools—a campaign largely led by government-subsidized science agencies, and all in the sacred name of national defense and security... I wonder how much of it is really in the name of cost-plus-per cent industries."

He said that overemphasis on science and over-recruiting of students into science careers will lead to an over-supply of scientists.

Head of NEA Board

Stinnett, who is head of the NEA commission on Teacher Education and Professional Standards, said a scientist had told him of a firm competing for government contracts and keeping a year's graduating supply of engineering manpower "stashed away and doing nothing but waiting for the event the firm was on hand to serve in American business."

He deplored what he said was the tendency of American business to be less interested in "education to the American child than in the education of young people to serve in American business."

He criticized the Eisenhower administration's plans to increase employment. "With all this yelling about education, still plans to spend money to increase employment all are for post offices, waterways, harbors—everything except school buildings."

Top Education Citizens

J. W. Forrester, Jr., of Pendleton, publisher of the Pendleton East Oregonian, was named "Education Citizen of the Year" at the banquet. He was cited for "his contribution to the improvement of Pendleton public schools and to the welfare of youth and adults throughout Oregon."

James C. Yeomans, Portland, president of the Oregon School Boards Assn., spoke at an afternoon session.

The convention, attended by 2,500, will continue Friday.

Stayton Canning Firm Contract for Building Awarded

STAYTON — Contract for construction of an office building at Stayton Canning Co. has been awarded to A. N. Minden Co., Portland. The low bid of \$91,837 will be paid to \$75,000 by altering plans, F. M. Smith, cannery manager, said Thursday.

Dimensions of the two-story building, which also will contain cutting room and other laboratory equipment, are 324 by 106 feet.

Work on the project will begin Monday, he added, with completion time 30 days.

Pastor, Wife Deny Being Communists

NEW ORLEANS — A New Orleans minister and his wife Thursday denied a charge made before the House Committee on Un-American Activities that they were dues-paying members of the Communist party.

The Rev. Albert D'Orlando, 63-year-old minister of the First Unitarian church here and his 45-year-old wife, Pauline, were identified in Boston earlier today by Mrs. Carol Foster, 41, of Nashua, N.H., as Communist party members from whom she had collected dues.

The minister, a native of Boston, and his wife said they had known Mrs. Foster when he was minister in a church in Wilton, N.H., about 25 miles from Nashua. Mrs. D'Orlando described her as "a disturbed person."

"She—Mrs. Foster—had been to my house on one or two occasions with friends and she'd bring literature with her, something like 'Daily Worker,' and I purchased it," he said. "I buy many books and read many things. I'm interested in world affairs."

The minister denied he had ever been a member of the Communist party. Asked if he had belonged to any Communist-front or subversive organizations he replied: "Now you're getting into an area that might get me in trouble. By that, I mean I don't know which organizations are Communist-front or not. So I must refuse to answer any further questions along that line."

Continued Reflection

"I'd like to say that this is a continued reflection of the kind of distrust, suspicion and fear in which people are living today. His wife said she had not belonged to the Communist party and added: "And I don't think that's a question you should ask."

Referring to Mrs. Foster, the minister's wife said, "We've known this woman for a number of years as a disturbed person."

Mass Search For Boy Ends Minus Success

GALLIPOLIS FERRY, W. Va. — The mass search for 5-year-old John McKinney ended Thursday night, three days after the boy wandered away with two dogs.

Chief Det. Sheriff D. M. Harshbarger said the organized part of the hunt for the child had ended. Sheriff's deputies and other officers, however, continued the investigation.

Up to 1,000 persons had aided in the hunt for Johnny in the hilly and wooded area near this Ohio River city.

Going for Hike

He had told a 10-year-old sister he was going out for a hike "just like the Boy Scouts" he admired. Then Johnny toddled off with Lassie and another dog at the tenant farm home. The dogs returned later without him.

Speculation entered the case that the boy might have been the victim of foul play, when authorities found a stained T-shirt and other articles Thursday.

The small shirt was found on a trash pile half a mile from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul McKinney, where they live with three other children.

But Harshbarger declined to guess whether the stains might be blood. He sent the garment to the state police laboratory for analysis.

Salem Order Stops Walnut Tree Cutting

The city park department is ever vigilant to save as many trees along city streets as possible in continuing the policy of beautification that started a number of years ago.

In line with the department's stand, an order has gone out stopping the cutting of black walnut trees on the Haste Hospital grounds in vicinity of Park Avenue and D streets NE. Park Supt. Walter Wirth said five walnuts toppled by hospital crews actually were on parking strips—property which belongs to the city.

All cutting or trimming of trees on parking strips must have the approval of the park department.

Recent Request

Wirth said a request came from a resident on Haste Street SE between High and Liberty to cut down a big, black walnut "because it was dangerous." The superintendent added that the request was denied after investigation showed the tree to be "in good shape."

Wirth pointed out that in this case and others, a root of the tree was buckling the sidewalk. This can be remedied by properly cutting the root, he said.

Wirth said recent heavy cuttings of black walnut in the area, most outside city jurisdiction,

reflect a heavy demand for the wood.

Cutting of trees has not been the only problem for the department in recent days. There also is the cutting of city-owned logs.

Salvages Old Logs

Wirth said the city has been salvaging old logs at Wallace Marine Park for use as barriers along park roadways. But this week came reports that logs were being cut up for use as firewood. Police put a stop to it.

The park department's saw-logs policy originally was given impetus by the Salem Chamber of Commerce's beautification committee.

But the policy won't prevent the city from losing a flock of stately trees along East State Street one of these days when a street-widening project gets under way. Victims of the axe will be maples, walnuts and other varieties along both north and south sides of State east of 12th.

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What Salem Wants From Schools Eyed

An attempt to find out what the residents of Salem School District want to be taught in their high schools will be made at a public meeting 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in Leslie Junior High School auditorium.

The meeting is sponsored jointly by Salem School Board and the parent-teacher associations of Salem Junior and senior high schools.

Following a 20-minute explanation by Charles D. Schmidt, district superintendent, of the present curriculum and guidance programs in Salem secondary schools, the audience will be separated into discussion groups.

Questions will then be presented to a panel consisting of Irwin Wedel, president, Leslie PTA; Dr. George Martin, assistant superintendent of Salem schools; Elmer Berglund, Salem businessman; Gardner Knapp, chairman, Salem School Board; Mrs. L. E. Marshack, regional PTA vice president; and a student to be selected from North Salem High School.

Airliners Skid, Loop in Show

NEW YORK — One airliner groundlooped and another skidded off the runway at Idlewild Airport Thursday night in a snowstorm. No one was injured.

A Pan American Airways DC8 bound for Bermuda had taken off but reported trouble, returned to the field and spun around on landing. The 13 occupants were shaken up.

Earlier, the nosewheel of a Scandinavian Airlines DC7 collapsed during takeoff. The plane skidded 100 feet off the runway. Fifty persons aboard escaped injury.

Plane Circles Town, Crashes Near Vehicles

KANAB, Utah — A small plane circled in distress Thursday night over this tiny community just north of the Utah-Arizona state line.

In a few minutes, the townspeople rushed an estimated 300 cars to the darkened, infrequently used municipal airport to light up the runway with headlights.

Aboard the plane were K. L. Lincoln, 37, Alamo, Calif., contractor, and his wife Audrey, 35, en route to Las Vegas, Nev., from Phoenix.

The plane managed a precarious landing just short of the runway, narrowly missing some of the cars. The small, one-engine craft hit a tree on alighting and was demolished.

The couple was taken to Kane County Hospital where their injuries were described as not serious.

Driver Bows To Inevitable

DETROIT, Mich. —Forty-five policemen showed up in traffic court Thursday to answer Lawrence A. Bower's demand for a trial.

The 33-year-old unemployed appliance salesman faced charges on 75 traffic tickets he had collected since 1952. He had asked trial on each charge.

When Bower walked into the courtroom he found virtually every seat filled with policemen. Some had given him more than one ticket.

After a look around Bower pleaded guilty. He got 30 days in the Detroit House of Correction.

The youth was above normal in intelligence, Dr. Richard E. H. Duisberg testified, but was a "moral moron." He knew right from wrong the way a blind man knows about sunsets, the doctor added, but he can't feel or understand moral concepts.

County Atty. Larry Cantor did not ask the death penalty, but noted that if Russell is given life, he could be paroled in 10 years and might endanger society.

At 5, he lied blantly and frequently.
