Seeks Top State Post

SHERIDAN — Ed Manary, past president of the FFA unit in Sheridan, and now studying to be an agriculture instructor at Oregon State College, will be nominated Thursday for the state office by Lakeview's Dan Dunham, past national president of FFA, at the State Farmer degree, available only to the top two per cent of 1,500 FFA members in Oregon.
