Norris Paint Firm Given State Contract

A \$18,200 contract for 30,000 gallons of paint was awarded to Norris Paint and Varnish Co. of Salem by the State Department of Finance and Administration for the highway department, it was reported Thursday.

The order includes 30,000 gallons of yellow paint and 10,000 of white—enough for a 3,000-mile long, Robert W. Norris Jr., company president, said.

The contract was the result of strip-paint tests conducted on North Portland Road to determine durability.

Although the federal government recently specified that highway stripes must be white, Oregon will continue with yellow for this year, Norris said.

Some 24 carloads of material will be required to prepare the paint in the company's Salem plant, which employs 20 men.

Morse Visits Salem, Denies Rift Exists With Neuberger

Sen. Wayne Morse said in Salem Thursday there was no personal rift between him and Sen. Richard Neuberger, Oregon's other senator.

"We disagree on some things," said Sen. Morse, "but we vote together 85 per cent of the time. Neuberger is a great and able senator and I'll campaign for him in 1956."

In Oregon for a three-day visit Sen. Morse said the nation's economic recession was "more serious than some people seem to think. The unemployment figures only tell a part of the story."

He said small businesses all over the nation were in a slump and that they needed immediate tax relief.

"Currently Oregon's unemployment picture is one of the worst in the nation," he said. "Only Montana is worse off."

"I'm for deficit spending right now," he said. "I believe in the sound principle of Lincoln that the government should do for the people what they can't do for themselves."

He said he has introduced in bill form a group of social security amendments which propose to increase the amount of social security payments, cover more people and lower the eligibility age.

Sen. Morse said there has been no indication whether the Air Force has heeded new requests that plans for building an Air Force Base near Woodburn be revived.

It was reported this week that the Oregon congressional delegation recently asked the Air Force and the House Appropriations Committee to reconsider cancelled plans for the base.

A campaign to engender nationwide "talk about Oregon" was explained to Salem civic leaders and press-radio men by officials of Blitz-Weinhard Co. Thursday at a Marion Hotel luncheon.

Purpose was explained by Joseph M. Rothchild of Portland, Blitz president. It coincides with promotion of Oregon's Centennial year, 1959.

Death Laid to Liver Condition

Marion County Coroner Charles Edwards said Thursday Joseph Reis, 57, North Bend, died at Oregon State Hospital Tuesday night from a cirrhosis of liver condition complicated by a sedative.

Reis died shortly after he was admitted and after a routine administration of a sedative. Edwards described the cause of death after a post mortem examination. He said the sedative, chloral hydrate, went into Edwards' system all at once instead of being filtered evenly through the liver.

Four other patients who showed marked effects of lethargy after recovering. Dr. Herbert Nelson, clinical director at the hospital, said Thursday.

He added that there is no reason to discontinue use of the drug as it has been used a long time and has proven its value.

Oregon Rural Road Traffic Up Last Month

Oregon rural highway traffic increased 2.2 per cent last month over February 1957 with the biggest single increase of 26.7 per cent recorded at Amity on Highway 99W.

State Highway department officials could give no reason for the apparent shift of traffic to 99W.

Automatic traffic recorders at 43 stations throughout the state were used to survey rural traffic.

Decreases were generally noted on Highway 99 last month but Salem-Portland Freeway, checked at Chemawa, registered a slight increase over February, 1957.

At Gates on Highway 22 there was an increase of over 24 per cent in motoring. Highway personnel said that light snowfall in that area during the early months of the year was apparently responsible.

Traffic fell off over 14 per cent at Gervais on Market Road 629, and at Woodburn on Highway 99E a slight decrease was noted.
