PORTLAND (U)—Oregon Highway Commission Thursday directed state Highway Engineer W. C. Williams to submit a plan for a new office building in Salem to the state Board of Control.

Ike Warns of Job Losses Unless Trade Act Extended

WASHINGTON (U)—President Eisenhower said Thursday night America faces "deadly peril" from communism abroad and possible loss of jobs at home unless Congress extends the administration's foreign trade program.

The President sounded those cautionary notes in a speech prepared for a dinner to rally bipartisan support for the program.

Eisenhower, whose talk was carried nationwide on television and radio, hammered hard at both the international and domestic aspects of foreign trade.

He has asked Congress for a five-year extension of the Reciprocity Information Act and for authority to cut tariffs gradually up to 25 per cent under present laws.

As for the picture at home in relation to trade, Eisenhower said: "World trade makes jobs for at least 4 1/2 million American workers."

At a time of slack in the economy like the present, these jobs should not be placed in jeopardy by crippling our trade program.

The President's speech climaxed a daylong rally at which Democratic as well as Republican administration leaders plugged for enactment of the trade program.

Secretary of State Dulles, who also addressed the rally attended by more than a thousand, said Congress would "endanger our Republic" if it failed to pass Eisenhower's foreign trade bill.

The theme of Eisenhower's talk was that "trade is good for all America—for its workers, its businessmen and its farmers."

"The issue before the Congress is whether we are going to let our trade program expire."

Wounds Fatal To Man Facing Murder Count

PORTLAND (U)—Eugene Franklin Taylor, 43, awaiting trial on a first degree murder charge, died Wednesday in the county hospital. An autopsy was ordered.

He suffered chest wounds in an exchange of shots with William W. McKennie, 71, a grocery store proprietor, last year. McKennie was wounded fatally.

Taylor was hospitalized for two weeks and was seemingly recovered. But on March 15, he developed a lung ailment and was sent back to the hospital from the jail.

Franklin Leroy Brewton, 24, formerly of Turner, also was charged with first degree murder in the attempted holdup of McKennie's store.

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Meany Clashes With Kennedy On Measures

WASHINGTON (U)—AFL-CIO President George Meany and Democratic Sen. Kennedy of Massachusetts, who has been friendly to labor, clashed sharply over legislation Kennedy has introduced to curb corruption in unions.

At one point in the exchange Meany exclaimed: "God save us from our friends!"

Meany complained that one of Kennedy's bills would discriminate against union leaders by making them disclose their personal finances in detailed reports to the government.

"I resent this singling out of union officers and setting us out as a class apart," Meany told the Senate Labor subcommittee Thursday. Kennedy heads the group.

Meany also took exception to a second Kennedy bill proposing stiff curbs on the authority of unions to place legal units under trusteeship or in receivership.

He said that the men who drafted the legislation "do not know the subject."

The UAW president told the Senate Rackets Committee he thought the President should appoint a fact-finding board to explore "the inhuman working conditions" in Kohler's plumbing fixtures plant at Kohler, Wis., and then "deal with the issues."

Reuther conceded that mass picketing of the Kohler plant in 1954 had been "improper" and that the many acts of violence which have occurred during the strike should not have happened.

But the labor leader accused the Kohler Co. of refusing to bargain in good faith, of amassing an arsenal of riot guns and tear gas and of hiring strikebreakers and "labor spies."

The UAW walked out of the Kohler plant April 5, 1954, in a dispute over wages and working conditions. It has been on strike ever since, at a cost of more than 10 million dollars to the union treasury. The company's costs have not been disclosed.

Miss Keller Bust Due
OSAKA, Japan (U)—Miss Helen Keller is to receive a bronze life-size bust of herself on behalf of the blind, deaf and dumb of Japan for her 70th birthday June 27. The bust was cast by Yoshimasa Yokoyama, adviser of the Japan Art Academy.

WASHINGTON (U)—The Senate Thursday passed a highway construction speedup bill designed to create thousands of new jobs and get the nation's giant roadbuilding program back on schedule.

Passage was by a rollcall vote of 84-4. Those voting against the bill were Sens. Byrd (D-Va.), Robertson (D-Va.), Bennett (R-Utah) and Curtis (R-Neb).

The bill also would set up for the first time a system of federal incentives for the states to control billboards on the 41,000-mile superhighway network—the interstate system.

The Senate debated the bill for four days, remaining in session on it 13 hours Wednesday.

Sponsors of the Senate road bill hope to get it into conference quickly with a different highway measure passed recently by the House. They would like to see the final version sent to Eisenhower before Congress starts an Easter recess April 3.

Third Place Westerberg Once Speculated 'He Might Have Caused Pal's Death'

ALBANY, Ore. (U)—Bruce Westerberg once speculated that he might have caused the death of a friend he is charged with killing, a prosecution witness testified Thursday.

Westerberg, 26, who lives near Dayton, is charged with second degree murder in the Feb. 19 gun-shot death of Thomas Glenn Phillips, 47, Lyons, Ore.

Jed Peperly of Lyons testified Thursday that Westerberg came to his home Feb. 19 and told him that Phillips had died.

Peperly said Westerberg had talked of shooting a gun in his home the previous night.

And Westerberg then said that he might accidentally have shot Phillips, Peperly testified.

Phillips was found dead on a davenport Feb. 19 after spending a night in the Westerberg home. An undertaker preparing Phillips for burial later found a bullet wound in the body.

Earlier Thursday, four witnesses said Westerberg, an unemployed logger, had told them Phillips died of a heart attack.

Stacyton Police Chief Everett Norflett also was called as a prosecution witness Thursday, and said he had helped arrest Westerberg.

Norflett said that when Westerberg was placed in a jail cell the logger had remarked "I guess this is it. I guess I've done it this time."

Sheriff's deputy Kenneth Goin, who also helped arrest Westerberg, testified that he found 37 bullet holes in the walls of the logger's home.

The final prosecution witness called Thursday was Hazel Westerberg.

Dist. Atty. Courtney Johns asked the tall, attractive woman if she was Westerberg's wife.

"We never were married legally," she replied.

At this point, defense attorney Robert McKennie said the woman should not be allowed to testify.

The couple had a common law marriage of legal status in California.

Salem School Board Thursday night moved to hasten opening of Leslie and Olinger swimming pools and approved several administrative staff pay raises for next year.

And it heard a brief explanation of a Mid-Willamette Valley Planning Council arterial street development program with a request that purchase of future school sites be coordinated with the plan.

Beyond Limits
A delegation headed by Carl Arnest, Macley School Board chairman, explained that the number of children in their two-room, eighth-grade school would jump from 43 to 54 or more next year, overcrowding it beyond limits set by the state.

Salem School Board agreed to take the youngsters into Parrish Junior High School if the Macley district can arrange transportation to a collection point at Four Corners School. Tuition will be charged. Macley ninth graders now attend Salem schools.

Pay raises allowed in a 1958-59 budget approved Wednesday night were granted to:

Assistant principals of the four junior high schools, four ratio points or about \$360 in addition to the teacher scale raises allowed in the budget.

The same raise for the four district supervisors of the school lunch program, instruction material, adult education and adult vocational education.

One ration point, about \$90, for the four district consultants in art, music, physical education and audio-visual education.

Wesley Kvarsten, Mid-Willamette Valley Planning Council director, asked the board to plan future schools near the centers of square miles by a grid of arterial streets planned about one mile apart for the Salem area.

He commented that Judson and Waldo junior high schools, under construction for use next year, are well-placed in the grid.
