

Over \$1 Million Asked for County Roads' Upkeep

Budget requests of \$1,138,015 were submitted Friday by Marion County Court members for maintenance of county roads and facilities for the coming year. This represents an increase of \$332,185 over last year's budget.

Of the total, \$215,500 would be

for county roads, bridges and ferries; \$290,000 for market road maintenance and improvement; and \$632,515 for general road maintenance and construction.

Requests were also received for \$100,000 for an emergency fund, same as last year, and \$60,000 for matching of federal road funds, same as last year.

A request for \$300,000 was also placed on the proposal list for completion and equipping of county road equipment shops on Silverton Road. In last year's budget, \$100,000 was set aside for planning and foundation work.

A \$35,835 budget was also submitted by District Attorney Hattie J. Bratzel for operation of her office. This is an increase of \$12,525 over the amount allocated last year.

The increase would be \$8,000 for an additional office deputy with the rest being absorbed in office expenses, equipment and salary increases.

Teachers To Vote in Pay Issue

All classroom teachers in Salem Public Schools are being asked to vote on whether they want placed on the May 5 school election ballot the question of a \$120-a-year teacher pay raise in addition to a \$100 raise allowed in next year's school budget.

Ballots were distributed Friday on the motion which was passed by a 65-51 vote in a Salem Classroom Teachers Association meeting Thursday, association President Joseph Formick said.

Requested at Keizer

The overall poll was requested by Keizer School faculty, he said, adding that it is customary for the association to poll all teachers when requested by the faculty of any school.

Ballots are to be counted Monday and if the overall vote is favorable the request is to be presented at a public hearing on the school budget 7:30 p.m. Monday in the Administration Building.

The motion is to request Salem School Board to put the additional \$120 raise on the May 5 school election ballot as a separate question from the budget.

Parred to \$190

The association had requested a \$300 raise which was parred to \$190 in the budget recommended by the school administration and accepted at that figure by the budget committee.

Formick said all classroom teachers are asked to vote regardless of whether they are members of the association.

Th association has 496 members and there are about two dozen classroom teachers who are not members, he said, not counting teacher principals who are eligible for membership but by custom join the principals association instead.

Barbs Traded On Halting of Nuclear Tests

WASHINGTON (U) — East and West traded verbal brickbats Friday on the issue of halting nuclear weapons tests. Government officials taunted and glibed at each other.

Meantime, within the Western world, groups opposed to nuclear test blasts dramatized their stand with legal moves and demonstrations.

A number of scientists, churchmen and others filed suit against Washington officials to halt U.S. tests, and anti-bomb demonstrators marched in New York and London.

No Propaganda Gimmick

At the government level, Soviet Premier Khrushchev denied that Russia's suspension of nuclear tests is a propaganda gimmick, as President Eisenhower described it, and said: "If Eisenhower really thinks we have stopped atomic and hydrogen bomb tests for propaganda reasons, then why don't he and other Western statesmen try the same propaganda and halt the tests themselves?"

The U.S. State Department last November called for international agreement on a step-by-step disarmament program. Press officer Lincoln White noted the Russians blocked efforts to carry through a resolution setting up a 25-nation Disarmament Commission.

White said the Soviets had turned back "the greatest expansion of intentions of good will" which had been made in recent months.

There were these developments:

WASHINGTON — A group of scientists, churchmen and other individuals sued Secretary of Defense McElroy and the five members of the Atomic Energy Commission in an extraordinary attempt to halt U.S. tests.

LONDON — Four thousand British demonstrators set out on a 50-mile, four day protest march to Aldermaston, Britain's nuclear weapons research center.

NEW YORK — An estimated 500 peace marchers, some of whom had arrived by foot from Philadelphia and New Haven, Conn., demonstrated in front of the United Nations. They carried a petition asking the U.N. to urge a halt to nuclear tests.

SAN RAFAEL, Calif. — Plans for what was described as part of a nationwide series of protests were announced by the Marin County Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, just north of San Francisco. Members will participate in a "non-violent demonstration" Easter Sunday in front of the University of California Radiation Laboratory in Berkeley.

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Jobless Total Dips in State, But Still High

The number of unemployed persons in Oregon dropped from 73,600 to 65,300 during March, the Oregon Unemployment Compensation Commission announced Friday.

However, the 65,300 total on April 1 was 17,200 more than it was a year ago.

The improvement last month was largely caused by mild weather, with pickup in lumbering, construction and farm work.

Every local office of the commission reported improvement during March except Astoria and Ontario.

Payments to the jobless totaled \$5,836,921 during March, highest March total in history. The only higher totals were reported in January and February.

The number of insured jobless now stands at 39,000, plus another 6,000 who have exhausted their benefit rights. The total in mid-January was 52,000.

WASHINGTON (U) — New job data indicated Friday night that unemployment was still increasing at the end of March.

The Labor Department's Bureau of Employment Security said reports from the states showed that unemployment among workers insured for benefits increased by 14,700 to a total of 3,478,900 during the week ended March 22.

Langley Fails To Wiggle Out Of Indictment

PORTLAND (U) — Former Multnomah County Dist. Atty. William Langley failed in his attempt Friday to get out from under a vice indictment.

Langley asked that the charge be lifted because, he said, the grand jury that indicted him was illegally selected.

Circuit Judge Charles Redding ruled against Langley.

Langley was accused by the grand jury last year of conspiring to receive a bribe. It was one of a number returned against numerous persons here in the course of Portland's long vice probe.

Langley was removed from office after being convicted of deliberately failing to prosecute gambling.

Another indictment pending against Langley accused him of obstructing public justice.

Boy Indicted On Attempt to Kill Charges

PORTLAND (U) — Larry Robert Molstrom, a 17-year-old Portland high school student, Friday was indicted on three charges of assault with intent to kill.

Police said the mid-appearing youth has admitted savage bludgeon attacks on five lone women over a period of several months.
