

Mark Hatfield, Sen. Gill Tangle in Hot Exchange

Republican gubernatorial candidates Mark Hatfield and Sen. Warren Gill exchanged charges of ignorance Saturday.

The tangle started with a challenge made recently by Sen. Gill in Portland to Hatfield, secretary of state, and Sig Unander, state treasurer, to name who their successors would be if they are elected. All three are candidates for the GOP nomination for governor.

Hatfield issued a statement which read in part:

"I am again shocked by attorney Gill's attitude toward a legal matter. I would refer him to Oregon Revised Statutes 260.220 under which provisions it would be entirely inappropriate to promise any appointment in advance of election."

Counter-Statement Issued

From his Lebanon home, Sen. Gill issued a counter-statement:

"Hatfield is a good secretary of state but for a college professor apparently can't read very well. The law says that a candidate cannot 'promise' appointments to aid his nomination, but 'may publicly announce' what his choice would be if elected."

No statement issued from Unander's camp and he could not be reached Saturday night at his home.

Hatfield in his statement continued:

"Sen. Gill, as one of the prime movers in the Senate Special Committee, flew in the face of an attorney general's opinion and is not now content with the judgment of a Marion County Circuit Court judge concerning his legislative maneuver which has twice been ruled unconstitutional."

Prayer, Just Criticisms

Gill answered:

"It would be fortunate if the Senate Special Committee could now investigate the operations of the Centennial Commission about whose actions Mr. Hatfield makes very proper and just criticisms."

Hatfield referred to a special investigating committee of broad powers which was challenged in court. Sen. Gill referred to questions raised Friday by Hatfield regarding expenditures of the commission named to plan the 100th anniversary of Oregon's statehood next year.

Hatfield's statement went on, "Moreover, he makes loud and long claims he will veto any state property taxes, when he was a member of the 1957 Legislature which took the state out of the property tax business."

Sen. Gill replied:

"His remarks about the Legis-

lature's inability to pass a property tax law indicate that he has a sad understanding of the workings of our state government.

"The Legislature passed a property tax law several years ago and I am author of the law which repealed it in 1957. The Legislature can pass a property tax law again next session if it chooses, and if I am governor I will veto it."

4 Children, Uncle Die in Blast-Blaze

BELLEVUE, Ky. (U)—Four children and their baby-sitting uncle died Saturday night when a blast rocked a home here and touched off a small fire.

Firefighters said the five were found sprawled in several rooms of the brick home.

Aides at Speers Hospital identified the dead as:

Finley McKinney, about 14, of Cincinnati, the baby-sitter; Ivan Sizemore, 5, his brother; Greg, 4, and Edward, 1, and their sister, Karen, 2.

Fire Chief Gus Bosch said he could not immediately determine the origin of the blast at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Sizemore.

Bosch said a gas furnace in the basement was shut off when his men arrived and there were no other devices that might have caused an explosion.

The chief said the explosion originated in the basement of the two-story home, burst out windows, damaged walls and ceilings and shredded wallpaper.

There was little fire damage after the blast.

The victims' parents were not immediately located.

Two Twisters Belt Alabama; Man Perishes

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (U)—Tornadoes struck two north Alabama communities Saturday night, as violent thunderstorms moved through the Tennessee Valley.

At least one person was killed and another injured by tornadoes in the Thatch Community near Athens, Ala., and at Leighton. Bud Ford, a Negro, was killed at Leighton when his house was demolished.

Mayor Roy Berryman of Leighton said at least three more houses were demolished and many others damaged.

Newberg Boy, 10, Arrives in Boston For Treatment

BOSTON (U)—Ten-year-old Jimmie Rokowski of Newberg, Ore., arrived here Saturday for treatment of a lingering kidney ailment.

Jimmie has had nephritis since he was 17 months old.

The boy dashed to a hot dog stand after getting off a train from Portland, Ore. Then Jimmie said he would like to take a long walk.

Jimmie was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Wayne Rokowski, a polio victim. She wears a brace on her left leg and was met with a wheel chair by members of the Greater Boston Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Jimmie will enter Massachusetts General Hospital Monday. Neighbors in Newberg raised \$1,000 to send the boy here.

War on Road Toll Pays Off Across Nation

CHICAGO (U)—America's cities and states loosed a salvo of new ideas and experiments in the fight against traffic accidents in 1957. Their efforts paid off.

A survey showed Saturday that officials in states and cities scoring improved safety records tore into the traffic accident problem with nearly every device offering a glimmer of success.

The nation's traffic death toll was cut 3 per cent last year, totaling 38,500. Thirty states and 24 cities of more than 200,000 population figured in the decline.

The officials directly involved credited these factors for the drop:

Stepped up police activities, public education, cooperation of public media, public acceptance of safety drives, activity of safety organizations, court activities and traffic engineering.

Polk Zoning Board Picked

DALLAS, Ore.—A five man board of directors has been appointed for the newly created Wallace, Sheridan, Orchard Heights Road county zoning district.

Named by the Polk County Court were Howard Jenks, feed dealer; Robert Yungen, merchant; Dr. Forrest Goddard, osteopathic physician; Dr. K. K. Adams, dentist;

and Mrs. Emmett Rogers, housewife.

About 18 persons live in the affected area across the Willamette River from Salem. They approved the zoning district 42 to 6 in an election March 24.

Blaze Set at Salem Home

City patrolmen and detectives investigated fire apparently set intentionally at the home of Glen Bill Boyle, 945 Market St. NE, Saturday.

Two others were set Tuesday elsewhere, officers said.

Boyle told officers someone placed papers under a floor mat on the front porch and set fire to them. The floor mat was burned but apparently the culprit extinguished the fire before it got out of control.

Other fires set were at Piggy Wiggly store, 1240 Capitol St. NE, and a garage at a Salem residence, police stated.

Mothers of Hatfield Breaks Leg in Fall

Mrs. C. D. Hatfield, mother of Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, broke her leg in two places in a fall Saturday afternoon on the front steps at her home, 490 Waldo Ave. SE.

She crawled to the phone and called her son who was at work in his office in the Capitol. Attendants at Salem Memorial Hospital said her condition was satisfactory Saturday night.

Girl Slain; Relative Charged

NEWARK, N.J. (U)—A 5-year-old girl was slain Saturday night and her body stuffed head first in the cellar coal bin of her home.

The girl, Elizabeth Murray, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fredrick Murray, was found by her father, police added. Most of her clothing was found rolled in a ball near the bin.

Police said Elizabeth's death was caused by either strangulation or suffocation.

Charge Lodged

Arrested and charged with murder in the killing was Mrs. Murray's 22-year-old stepbrother, Daniel Sutcliffe, who visited the girl's home today. He is the father of a 7-month-old daughter visiting at the home.

Here is the police account of the case:

Elizabeth, called "Betty Boop" by those close to the family, left the house at about 5:45 p.m. to play with a cousin. Sutcliffe left shortly after.

Under Coal Pile

At 7:30 p.m., Sutcliffe's 18-year-old wife, Loretta, telephoned the Murrays and said:

"Are you still looking for Betty Boop? You'll find her under the coal pile in the cellar."

According to police, Mrs. Sutcliffe told them her husband had returned home and told her:

"I think I've just killed someone," adding Elizabeth's body was in the Murray cellar.

Navy Seaplane Falls; 2 Die

IWAKUNI, Japan (U)—A U.S. Navy P5M1 Marlin seaplane crashed in the water on takeoff Sunday from the Marine Corps Iwakuni seadrome and at least two of the 11 men aboard were killed.

Three survivors were picked up and two bodies were recovered.

The Navy said it was still searching for the six others.

Names of those involved were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

The Navy reported the Japanese fishing vessel Dai-ichi Kokka Maru gave valuable assistance at the scene of the accident.

The captain of the vessel is Torakichi Nakagawa, 28, of Hiroshima prefecture, across Hiroshima Bay from this city.

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Atlas Missile Test Successful

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (U)—An Atlas ICBM raced hundreds of miles out over the Atlantic from Florida Saturday in a successful test of its guidance, power and strength.

Representatives of Convair Division of General Dynamics Corp., builder of the Atlas, were jubilant.

A Convair spokesman said, "It looks real good, but we won't know just how good until telemetry information is analyzed."

It was the third successful test flight of the huge intercontinental weapon over a limited range of about 600 miles.

The first test for the full range of more than 6,000 miles, to a water target beyond Ascension Island in the South Atlantic, probably will come within the next two months.

Gen. Thomas D. White, Air Force chief of staff, witnessed what the Air Force officially described as a "successful launching."
