VFW Post, Auxiliary To Install

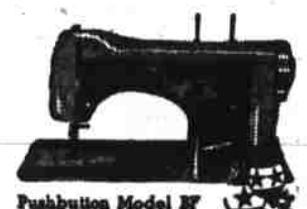

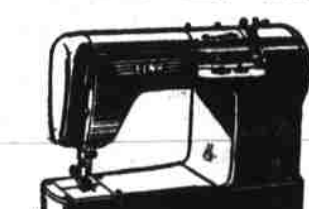
