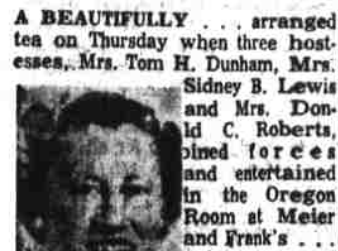


Seen and Heard...

Miss Stephens Is Named Woman of Achievement

PORTLAND — Recognition of outstanding service will be given to Miss Eleanor Stephens of Salem, one of four "Women of Achievement" to be honored at the annual Matrix Table banquet presented by the Portland alumna chapter of Theta Sigma Phi on April 29 at the Columbia Athletic Club.

Miss Stephens, state librarian since 1941, has been selected as a "Woman of Achievement" by the journalism group for her leadership in the field of library science, according to an announcement by Miss Dorothy Lois Smith, president. Other women to be honored at the dinner are: Miss Gloria Chandler, director of public service and education for KGW and KING-TV in Portland, KING and KING-TV in Seattle and KREM in Spokane; Mrs. Warren C. Hunter, outstanding Portland civic leader; and Dr. Dorothy O. Johansen, professor of history and humanities at Reed College and chairman of the Portland school board.

Invitations are being received in the Salem area this week for the event which is presented annually throughout the nation by college and alumna chapters of the journalism honor society. This year's Matrix Table will be the tenth annual banquet sponsored by the Portland group.

Miss Stephens is credited with perfecting a service that brings to Oregon's large rural population fine books, music and language records and educational films. Under her direction some 663,466 volumes and documents are made available to the public.

Almost every community in Oregon has been visited by Miss Stephens in connection with her work. In addition to her inspection trips and talks she finds time to counsel and assist those wishing help. Her very enthusiasm is stimulating to those whom she meets, and she has proved herself dedicated not only to her profession but to the people as a whole.

Miss Stephens began her library career in the state of Washington, later moving to the Los Angeles Public Library, and finally coming to Oregon 17 years ago.

Held National Offices

In 1944 her leadership was recognized by her election as president of the Pacific Northwest Library Association and again in 1950 when she was elected to a two-year term as president of the National Association of State Librarians. She is now a member of the council of the American Library Association and is on the board of directors of the American Association of State Librarians. In 1955 the Oregon Division of the American Association of Uni-

versity Women named one of its 300 study grants in her honor and in 1956 she was one of 20 library administrators chosen to attend a six-weeks course on Advanced Library Administration at Rutgers University.
