## Act by Lally-Gagging Kids Not Truly Love

Dear Ann: My niece, 19, was recently engaged to a boy, 22. At the engagement party they were constantly kissing in the hallway and talking baby-talk. They couldn't keep their hands off one another. I was appalled at their behavior. My husband was annoyed beyond endurance.

He took the mother of the girl aside and suggested she speak to the young couple at once. He said bluntly that such parading of affection was sickening.

The mother became indignant. She said there's nothing wrong with "young love" in fact it's "beautiful." My husband asked me to write to you for an opinion. Who is correct?—AUNTIE ANNA

Young love IS beautiful. But a pair of moonstruck kids, lally-gagging and pawing one another in full view of an audience is NOT love—and it's NOT beautiful. It's nauseating.

Couples who inflict this sort of performance on others are usually unsure of themselves. They're attempting to convince the gallery and themselves that their love is real.

It's the young lady's prerogative to set the standards for conduct. If she's wise she'll insist on reserving the expression of "young love" for private moments, and give it the dignity it deserves.

Dear Ann: My husband is making a nervous wreck of me. Our son is nine years old. He's a fine student, popular with his classmates and active in Boy Scouts.

You'd think his father would be proud of him, but he isn't. He tells me the boy isn't "normal" because he doesn't care to fight. He says there's something wrong with a boy who has never come home with a bloody nose or a black eye. He insists his son is a coward or a weakling.

Every evening at dinner he asks "Have you had a fight yet, Son?" The boy doesn't know quite what to make of it. Please set my husband straight—or am I the one who needs it?—HEARTSICK

Fighting is neither a sign of courage nor manliness. While it's "normal" for boys to fight, a boy who doesn't care to fight is not abnormal. Many boys don't fight because they neither enjoy receiving blows nor inflicting pain on others.

There's an increasing emphasis on destruction these days and it's refreshing to find a boy who is not impressed by violence.
