Fire Districts May Consolidate Units

AMITY—An election to consolidate the North Polk County Fire Protection District with the Amity Rural Fire District is slated May 5, according to Ernest Robertson, chairman of the Amity Rural Fire Board. Polls will be open in each area from 8 to 9 p.m., with Amity balloting located at the city hall and North Polk county polls at Perrydale school.

Should voters approve the measure, the combined districts, which have functioned together since inception, would be known as the Amity Rural Fire Protection District. Assessed valuation of the new district would be approximately \$1,500,000, according to Robertson.

Since organization of the districts five years ago, the North Polk County district has subscribed for assistance from the Amity district. In the event of consolidation, fire equipment would continue to be centered at Amity.

Tentative plans may place a truck at Perrydale during the fire-hazardous harvest season.

School Operation Cost Larger at Amity Grade

AMITY—Voters of elementary school district 4-53 will be asked to approve an increase in estimated operation expenditures May 5, when they ballot on the proposed 1958-59 school budget. Balloting will begin at 2 p.m., at the grade school building in Amity.

In recent session, the budget committee estimated receipts for the coming year at \$35,954, as compared with \$34,454 for the current year. Costs of district operation were estimated at \$100,885, outside debt service at \$100,885, with \$7,034 for the current year.

Major increases in formulating the new budget were centered in the instruction section, which was increased from \$62,510, to \$67,300 to cover minimum increases of \$100 for district teachers. Principal's salary was upped from \$5,500 to \$5,800. Textbook funds were increased from \$1,300 to \$2,000.

Operational expenses for the school plant remained at \$8,300. General control expenses increased \$50, from \$1120 to \$1170. Maintenance and repair budget allocations remained at \$1300.

Budget committee cut an estimated emergency fund from \$200 for the current year to \$100 in the proposed budget.

Total expenses of the auxiliary agencies section was increased from \$12,380 this year to \$12,905 in the new budget, primarily with an increased estimate of \$500 for transportation. Fixed charges, insurance, rent, etc., were raised slightly from \$410 to \$570, while estimated expenditures for capital outlays is \$1400, compared with the current allocation of \$1414.

The district will require \$6000 for bond retirement, plus \$100 for interest, in its debt service budget.

New Pool Levy On May Ballot

SHERIDAN—Proposal of a five year continuing levy for a municipal swimming pool will be on the ballot in the May primary election. The Sheridan City Council gave unanimous approval of the proposal this week. Plans call for a five-year continuing levy to raise approximately \$60,000.

No announcement has been made as yet, on the amount of the millage levy. Mayor Bostman said this week he expects it to be 12 to 15 mills. He added that according to his estimates, the pool would cost the average home owner \$10 to \$15 a year in increased taxes for a period of five years.

Sheridan's council is planning for a pool that will be heated and enclosed, and tentative location is at the city park. In recent months Councilmen have consulted designers of public pools.

Repair Work Nears Finish

DAYTON—New boxes, lighting, an asphalt tile floor and other repairs and remodeling are part of the new program for the Dayton post office. Much of the work, including installation of the new boxes, is almost completed.

This has made the post office a popular place with most of the population of the community coming in to locate their new boxes and learn the numbers and combinations.

The post office department is providing the new boxes and fixtures. Building owner, George Webster, Dayton, is taking care of the work on the building itself.

Farmers Vote 4-H Scholarship

HAZEL GREEN—Henry Ahrens, Turner, candidate for county commissioner, was guest speaker this week at the Hazel Green Farm Bureau meeting. The program included a movie on fruit and berry production in the Northwest and California.

Monmouth Man Gets 3-Star Army Position

MONMOUTH—Major Herbert B. Powell, a native of Monmouth, left his Ft. Benning, Ga., post Thursday to accept a three-star post at Ft. Monroe, Va. according to word received by his brother, C. C. Powell, Monmouth insurance man.

Gen. Powell, commanding general of the U.S. Army infantry center and commandant of the U.S. Army infantry school since August, 1958, will replace Lt. Gen. Ridgely Geither as deputy commanding general for reserve components at U.S. Continental Army Command.

Powell was graduated from Monmouth high school, and from the University of Oregon in 1926, receiving a regular army commission as a second lieutenant a few months later. His army experiences have been varied.

In March 1958, he was named assistant chief of staff for intelligence and operations, Hq. Com., U.S. Forces, Europe, and six months later became chief of staff. He was appointed assistant G-1 of 2nd army, Ft. Meade, Md., in July 1957. After graduation from the National War College at Ft. McNair, Washington D.C., in 1949, Gen. Powell commanded the 17th regiment, 7th division in Japan until September 1950, when he moved with the unit to Korea. From January to May 1951 he served as chief of staff of the 7th division, Korea.

In addition to the Distinguished Service Cross his decorations include the Silver Star, Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster; Bronze star with two oak leaf clusters; air medal and the purple heart. He was also awarded a Czechoslovakian war cross; Korean presidential distinguished unit citation; and the Korean Ulefil and Chung M distinguished service medals.

His wife is the former Beryl King of Portland.
