Navy Tries Simulated Moon Flight

PHILADELPHIA (U) — Six Navy men took off Tuesday on a simulated flight to the moon in the latest test designed to prepare man for flight to distant space.
The six, sealed in a specially rigged chamber where they will remain under observation for seven days, are expected to supply leads to physical, material and psychological requirements for a successful space flight.
The experiment started at the air crew equipment laboratory of the Naval Air Materiel Center at the Navy Yard here. According to plan it will end next Tuesday noon.
Until then the six men will be observed by biological and engineering scientists. The volunteer spacemen are not able to communicate with or see the scientists who will be observing them through one-way glass.

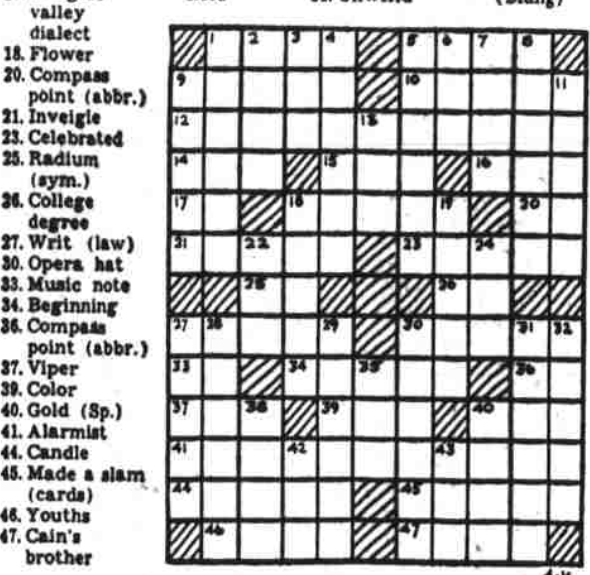

Salem Teacher Selected For Second Scholarship

George Birrell, South Salem High School science instructor, already scheduled for a nine-month scholarship starting next fall at Oregon State College, recently was notified of his selection for a summer fellowship at Stanford University.
Birrell is one of 90 high school mathematics and science teachers in the U.S. and Canada chosen on the basis of education merit and leadership by Shell Companies Foundation for seminars at Stanford and Cornell Universities.

At Stanford the Salem teacher will receive training in math, chemistry, physics and educational techniques, and the applications of math and science in industry. Shell Foundation will pay travel, tuition and living costs plus \$500.

A Salem teacher 16 years, Birrell lives with his wife Jean and three sons at 310 Richmond St. SE. He has been granted a leave of absence for his National Science Foundation scholarship to OSC.

SILVERTON — Ralph W. Francis, 72, former Silverton resident, died Tuesday night at San Diego, Calif., after a long illness. He lived prior to coming to Silverton in 1945.
At Silverton Francis and his wife were both active in club and fraternal work. He served as commander of Delbert Reeves Post, American Legion, while she was president of the auxiliary in 1951. They moved three years ago to San Diego.
Besides his widow, Ann Francis, he leaves one adopted daughter, Mrs. Mary Ann Durschmidt, Salem, and one grandchild.

Fairchild Tests New Type Jet

HAGERSTOWN, Md. (U) — Fairchild Engine and Airplane Corp. Tuesday announced the successful maiden flight of America's first twin-propeller transport, the 40-passenger F27.
Richard S. Boutele, Fairchild president, said the 25-minute flight was extremely successful.
"It's more than another new aircraft," Boutele added. "It is the first time in civil aviation history that the local service airlines have had a brand new piece of flying operations."
"Even better, it is a modern jet age aircraft designed for their very own short-to-medium range operations."

Fourteen airlines in the United States, Alaska, Canada and Latin America, and 13 major corporations have placed orders for 68 F27s, with options for 25 more.

The first is to be delivered late in June to West Coast Airlines, Seattle.

The F27, powered by two Rolls-Royce Dart jet engines driving propellers, cruises at 300 miles an hour and has a range of more than 1,600 miles. It is air-conditioned, pressurized, and has weather searching radar.

Home Burglarized While Resident In Salem Hospital

A Salem home was burglarized Tuesday night but city detectives said it was not determined if anything was stolen as the occupant is in a Salem hospital.

The home of Mrs. Kay Henshaw, 1480 Pearl St. NE, was entered through a rear door and the house completely ransacked.

A neighbor, Beas Zurawski, 1565 Pearl St. NE, saw someone moving around in the home about 5:15 p.m. When officers arrived, she told them she saw a young boy leave the scene on a bicycle with a sack on the handlebars.

Automobiles Collide

State police said cars driven by Junior Davis, 1390 Harmony Dr. NE, and Ida May Weston, 4634 Clark St. NE, collided about 5:30 p.m. Tuesday at Chemawa and Claxton Roads NE. No injuries were reported.

Truck Drivers Tell Probers Of Beatings

WASHINGTON (U) — Three truck drivers told a Senate inquiry Tuesday they were brutally beaten on for opposing Ray Cohen when he took over Philadelphia Local 107 of the Teamsters Union in 1954.
The hearing also produced evidence of forged endorsements on union checks issued by Cohen and the local's president, William Grace, and evidence that financial records had been "kited" to give someone a \$4,003.75 profit.
Cohen is a right-hand man of James R. Hoffa, international president of the Teamsters. Witnesses testified that as secretary-treasurer of Local 107, Cohen runs the show in Philadelphia.
Vincent A. Minicci told the Senate Rackets Committee that because of his opposition to Cohen strong-arm men worked him over on two occasions, using feet, fists, pipes and a hammer. Finally they drove him out of the state in fear of his life, he said.
Another witness, William G. Roberts of Philadelphia, said he was beaten into unconsciousness after supporting Edward Crumback against Cohen for Secretary-treasurer.

WASHINGTON (U) — A bill to police labor unions and punish wrongdoing by their leaders was introduced in the Senate Tuesday by Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.).

Exploitation of union members and the public by arrogant and crooked union leaders, McClellan told the Senate, has reached a point where it constitutes a serious threat to free trade unionism.

His bill would give the secretary of labor broad new powers to investigate and clean up union affairs.

184 Russian Subs Said Sighted Off U.S. During 1957

GREENSBORO, N.C. (U) — Rep. Carl Durham (D-NC) said Monday night that 184 Russian submarines were sighted off our Atlantic Coast in 1957.
The chairman of the Joint House-Senate Atomic Energy Committee said the Red subs had been sighted as close to shore as seven miles and that the Navy had been successful in photographing some of them.
The presence of Russian submarines off both coasts of the country has been known for some time, but Durham's statement is believed to be the first to mention actual numbers.
He said the vessels had been carrying out ship trackings and had been observing activity along this country's guided missile range which runs from Cape Canaveral, Fla., into the south Atlantic.

Model Plane Record Falls

VAN NUYS, Calif. (U) — American aviation snatched a world's record from the Russians Tuesday. It was done with rubber bands.
A little monoplane cracked a Russian-held record—the endurance record for radio-controlled model planes.
The little plane circled lazily in the warm air currents over Sepulveda flood control basin for 5 hours and 29 minutes, topping the Russian record of 3 hours and 6 minutes.
Ken Willard, 40, who built the plane, controlled it from the ground by radio. It was powered with a quarter-horsepower engine, but old-fashioned rubber bands activated the controls.
Willard's radio gear unwound twists in two long lengths of rubber inside the plane.

Portland to Study Jobless Pay Plan For Its Employees

PORTLAND (U) — The city of Portland Tuesday launched a study that could give its 3,200 employees state unemployment compensation.
The City Council ordered a study of what it might cost Portland if its employees were brought under the umbrella of compensation benefits.
The council said that it will give special study to how park bureau and street workers might be affected. Many of these jobs are seasonal.
Also slated for study is whether policemen and firemen who are compelled to retire, still able to work, would be eligible for compensation.

Narcotics Stolen

PORTLAND (U) — A drug store was broken into here early Tuesday and more than 1,000 capsules of narcotics stolen, Portland police said.
