North Salem's Singers Lose in Close Contest

NEW YORK (AP)—A trio of Indianapolis high school girls Friday won an RCA Victor record contract in the Westinghouse Broadcasting Co.'s talent search. The trio—called "The Debs"—won over five other competing vocal groups. They will appear May 7 on NBC-TV's "The Big Record" program with singer Patti Page.

The other contestants included "The Three Teens" from Salem, comprising vocalists Janet and Janice Messmer, and Beverly Frey and accompanist Judy Winter, all juniors at North Salem High School.

(The winning girls were Linda Hirt, Karen LeMasters and Julie Wilson, all 16 and sophomores at North Central High School in Indianapolis. Other finalists hailed from Boston, Pittsburgh and Cleveland.)

(While Salem's group failed to win top honors, they won't come home empty-handed. Each of the four girls received a transistor radio and shared \$100 worth of records—and saw the sights in the Big Town. They earned the trip east by winning a regional contest sponsored by a Portland radio station.)

(There was no official second place in the national contest, but judges reportedly told the Salem girls' escort, Barney Kepp, that if there had been a runner-up spot it would have gone to "The Three Teens." That's what the parents here learned in a phone message from the girls.)

Infant Saved by Highwire Flip

CHICAGO (AP)—Judith DeHaan, 18 months old, took a big bounce on a highwire Friday. It probably saved her life.

The infant tumbled from the second floor of her South Side home, bounced on a clothesline six feet from the ground and then landed unhurt in her own baby carriage.

When her mother, Mrs. Pauline DeHaan, reached her, Judith was not even crying.

Still on the critical list Friday night at Salem General Hospital following a two-car collision Thursday on Salem bypass was Mrs. Willard Aldrich of Vancouver, Wash. She suffered a severe concussion and has been unconscious since the accident, attendants said.

Three others were also injured in the crash. Mrs. Elizabeth Bouckaert, Seattle, and Mrs. Elizabeth Naylor of Bend were in fair condition Friday night and the condition of Mrs. Naylor's husband, W. E. Naylor Sr., was "good," attendants said.

A wrecked car registered to Jarvis Koford, 4385 River Rd. N., was found on Salem-Portland Freeway near Woodburn Junction about 3:30 p.m. Friday, state policeman Ray Judson said.

The car had apparently run onto the shoulder and rolled over, Judson said. No injuries were reported and no further information was available last night, he said.

Ike's Mountain Jaunt Holds Up Construction

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House said Friday President Eisenhower's visit to Camp David caused the temporary layoff of about 150 workers on a construction project at the presidential retreat.

Details were withheld on the exact nature of the work being done at the lodge in the Catskill Mountains near Thurmont, Md. Mrs. Anne Whitson, associate White House press secretary, said the workmen are engaged on various projects involving heat, light, power, water and sewage.

A spokesman for the Joseph F. Nebel Co., contractor on the project, referred all inquiries to the White House.

Eisenhower drove to Camp David, about 65 miles north of Washington, early Friday afternoon. He plans to return late Sunday or early Monday.

In response to questions, Mrs. Whitson told newsmen: "The President is seeking a quiet, restful weekend, so the construction work was suspended temporarily—just for today or for part of the day—to assure quiet."

Mrs. Whitson said she understands the workmen ordinarily do not work on Saturdays and Sundays, and said work on the project probably will be resumed Monday.

Bride Sues Billy Eckstine For Divorce

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Singer Billy Eckstine, 43, was sued for divorce Friday by his bride of 66 days, actress-model Carole Drake, 33. She charged cruelty.

Mrs. Eckstine said in her complaint that the singer fathered two children, Edward, 4, and Guy, 21 months, before he married her in Elkhart, Md., last Jan. 31.

She asked \$2,375 a month support for herself and the children and informed the court that she expects another child in about seven months. She said Eckstine controls assets worth more than \$500,000.

The complaint also requested that Eckstine leave their Encino, Calif., home, that he be restrained from disposing of any assets pending trial and from attempting to harass her. In this respect, she alleged that he struck her on several occasions and threatened her life.

Silvertown Woman Heads Decent Literature Drive

Mrs. John Pfeifer of Silvertown was elected chairman Friday night of the "Marion County Citizens Committee for Decent Literature" in the warmest, liveliest meeting Salem City Council chambers has seen in a long while.

More than 150 attended the meeting called by Mrs. Pfeifer to organize a citizens' study of indecent literature on newsstands.

Though the group was unanimous on her question: "Who's in favor of cleaner newsstands?" there was a considerable split on the approach. The Silvertown woman, who has led several attacks on the influence of some news-stand literature, was opposed in her candidacy by Dell McManus, bookstore operator.

Higher Standards
In his campaign talk he said he was not opposed to Mrs. Pfeifer and her aim, but added he "favored higher standards of literature and hoped to map out a suitable compromise" in an attempt to increase the level of literary taste.

The vote was 48 for McManus and "more than 60" for Mrs. Pfeifer, according to the count made by Alderman Russell Bonesteel, representing the mayor's office, in helping to conduct the business meeting.

Marvin Hart, 4860 Lancaster Dr. NE, was elected secretary.

In a "battle of the Fridays" in which some of the dissenting 50 lived up to the meeting by sticking up for their parliamentary rights, the date for the next meeting was set as May 23.

Mrs. Pfeifer said she would appoint a committee "widely representative as possible" and including doctors, lawyers, teachers, to study the problem of indecent literature and present a tentative plan for consideration at the May 23 meeting.

Plenty of Heat
Taking over the chair for the election, Bonesteel sized up the tension and commented that he was sorry about the lack of chairs in the hall, but "I think we have plenty of heat."

Speaker for the evening was Dr. Goodrich C. Schaffner, Portland obstetrician and author of a recent magazine article, "It Could Be Your Daughter."

He said he was not an authority on the type of material currently appearing on newsstands and in movie books (he had never heard of Erskine Caldwell), but he deplored what he said appear to be its results.

He cited several cases of delinquency and pregnancy in which the women admitted having been influenced by suggestive material. In answer to one of several dozen questions, he said however, he could not say if eliminating the literature or movies would have eliminated the trouble.

Influence for Good
"The basic thing," he said, "is the home and family and this is more important than pornography literature." Gaining the loyalty and love of youths can give a great influence for good, he added.

Turning to Kinsey, Jung and Freud and their study and theories on sex practice and behavior, Schaffner said "they are good for research and bad on newsstands where they are used for money-making."
