MONTE CARLO, Monaco (U)—Little Princess Caroline stole the show Saturday as her month-old brother, Prince Albert, was officially presented to the citizens of Monaco.

The year-old princess interrupt-

ed a speech by the mayor of Monaco with a loud "Ahi!" into the microphone. This evoked a burst of laughter from the crowd of 1,500 persons standing in the palace courtyard.

Former Iran Queen to Dry Tears, Shop

NEW YORK (U)—Beautiful Princess Soraya, former queen of Iran, has decided to dry her tears and buy herself a new hat or two.

The 28-year-old princess, divorced by Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi because she failed to produce an heir, is aboard the liner Constitution en route to New York. She was interviewed by the New York Journal-American by ship-to-shore telephone.

"I've cried enough these last few months," the lovely Soraya said. "Now I've got to remake my future."

Soraya, who was married seven years to the Shah before he divorced her, said she planned to spend most of her time in New York shopping.

"I'm going to shop and shop," she said. "You have such wonderful stores."

The princess, who has said she still loves the Shah and always will, plans to spend three days in New York, then 10 in Bermuda, and back to New York for an indefinite stay.

Daring Rescue Flier Killed

ADELANTO, Calif. (U)—Bob Symons, one of the nation's widest known and most daring rescue pilots, was killed Saturday in a glider accident about 13 miles west of this San Bernardino County town.

Symons, 48, was trying out a new type glider when a wing tore off the plane. He plummeted to death.

Symons' most recent publicized exploit was rescuing four stranded Stanford University students from an 11,700-foot ledge in the high Sierras above Yosemite National Park.

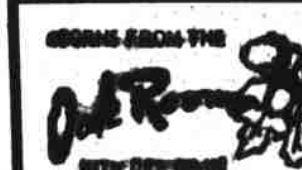
He once held the world glider altitude record, set with the aid of unusual air currents near his Bishop, Calif. home.

BRUSSELS (U)—Courtiers barred the doors against a swarming throng of onlookers early Sunday so King Baudouin would have room to dance with a flock of European princesses.

Earlier, the bachelor King of the Belgians left the ballroom when the crush of onlookers made dancing impossible.

The scene was the first royal ball the 27-year-old King had given in his seven-year reign and the first in Belgium for 24 years.

From the expression on Baudouin's face it may be a long time before he gives another.

The presentation was a prelude to Prince Albert's baptism Sunday.

Princess Grace, radiant in a light beige suit with a salmon colored scarf, stood smiling at the top of the palace staircase with the baby prince in her arms. Beside her was Prince Rainier holding little Caroline. Little Albert was quiet almost to the end, when he began to cry.

Half-Billion Slash Seen in Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (U)—Cuts of up to a half-billion dollars in President Eisenhower's \$3,900,000,000 foreign aid bill were predicted Saturday as the House Foreign Affairs Committee prepared for closed-door voting sessions on the measure.

Rep. Vorys of Ohio, a senior committee Republican and pilot of aid legislation on the House floor, said he expects the bill will reach the floor within two weeks.

The Ohioan declined to specify how much might be trimmed from the legislation which Secretary of State Dulles has called a rock-bottom amount for American and Free World security next fiscal year.

But two other committee members ventured figures of up to a half billion dollars in separate interviews.

Rep. Wayne Hays (D-Ohio) said he would like to see a slash of around 500 million dollars, concentrated on military and defense support items.

Eisenhower wants \$1,800,000,000 for arms aid and \$35 million dollars for economic help to support foreign defense programs.

Mrs. Willard Aldrich, Vancouver, Wash., underwent brain surgery shortly after arriving at the hospital. Attendants said she was still in critical condition Saturday night.

The other woman, Mrs. Elizabeth Bouckaert, Seattle, was reported in good condition, attendants said.

Mike Shord of Portland won a tri-area Toastmasters speech contest Saturday night in Salem. Jeff Rogers of Corvallis was runner-up. Both will compete in a district contest May 24 in Portland.

More than 100 persons attended the contest in VFW Hall. Six speakers were heard. Mid-Willamette Valley Area was represented by Lloyd Hammel and Douglas Helder, both of Salem, who were winner and runner-up respectively in an area contest last month at Silverton.

BEND, Ore. (U)—Forest management and conservation is a rapidly-changing art, the president of the Society of American Foresters said here Saturday.

"The future of forestry will be molded not by the foresters of the present—but by students not yet in school," said Dr. George Garratt.

Graduate of the university school of journalism in 1947 and former editor of the Oregon Daily Emerald, Mrs. Wright has taken an active role in politics and is prominent in church and civic affairs of Salem. During the last legislative session she served as lobbyist for social service agencies.

The wife of Thomas G. Wright Jr., an executive assistant to Gov. Robert D. Holmes, she continues to write occasional editorials for The Statesman. The Wrights have three daughters.

Carpet Layers' Strike Ended

PORTLAND (U)—A 19-day strike of 200 Portland-area Linoleum and Carpet Layers Union members ended Saturday.

The union began the strike April 1 after failing to reach agreement on a new contract with the Floor Covering Industry Inc., an employer group.

Ray Kyes said both the union and management agreed to a new contract Saturday. The men will report back to work Monday morning.

The new three-year pact includes an hourly pay boost of 37½ cents an hour, said Kyes, president of Local 1236 here.

Wool Broker's Death Suicide

PAYETTE, Idaho (U)—The death of a Portland, Ore., wool broker was officially ruled a suicide Saturday by Payette County Coroner Gifford Shaeffer.

Shaeffer said no inquest was planned in the death of James M. Coon, 55, who was found dead in his car Friday with a hose running from the exhaust pipe into the car.

Coon was president and general manager of the J. M. Coon Wool Co. of Portland.

Trucker Escapes Injury on Highway

A truck driver escaped injuries when his vehicle was forced to a ditch to avoid an approaching car near the Y Junction on Dallas Highway about 5:15 p.m. Saturday.

State police officer Walter Karau said the car driven by Miss Glenda Kae Elvin of Independence swerved into the truck path while attempting to stop behind a motorist turning off the highway.

She was cited with "failing to drive on the right side of the highway," Karau added.

Unemployed in Portland Dips

PORTLAND (U)—The state Employment Service Saturday said Portland's number of unemployed declined by 1,500 persons in March.

The service said 3,300 persons went back to work in the period from March 1 to April 1.
