

Rain Again Douses Senators at Clarkston; Club to Break Camp, Due in Salem Today

The steady rains that have been pounding the entire Northwest in recent days washed out another Salem Senators spring camp game with Lewiston at Clarkston Sunday. So Mgr. Don Lundberg, figuring his athletes can get just as wet here at home as they've been getting at Clarkston, will herd the troupe into town sometime today.

"We were going to leave here Tuesday, after playing Monday," Lundberg reported via phone. "The weather doesn't look as if it will let up, so we might just as well come home."

Two members of the team departed for Vancouver, Wash. on Sunday. Pitchers Vern Kindsfater, who opens the season (he may have to swim to the Waters Field mound) here Thursday

against Eugene, and Ev Aldridge live in Vancouver. They'll rejoin the rest of the gang here Tuesday.

"If it's at all possible," Lundberg continued, "we'll work out Tuesday at Waters Field during the afternoon, and will then hold a final workout under the lights Wednesday."

Coming with Lundberg are pitchers Gus Carmichael, Hal Larned and Humberto Marques, infielders Dick Genette, Dennis Peterson, Ozzie Williams and Rigoberto Mendoza and outfielders Roy Parker, Vince Moreel and Jerry Gregg.

Yet to join the club and expected to do so at any time today or Tuesday are the AWOL infielders Julio Perla and Alfredo Conton, pitcher Tom Flynn who's en route from Savannah, Ga., and the pitcher and infielder being sent by the Los Angeles Dodgers from the Vero Beach, Fla., campsite.

"If we were get 'em all together, I think we'll have a pretty good outfit to start out with," Lundberg summarized.

Outfielder Jack Dunn, the Portland school teacher who has been a center fielder in the last three years will join the club here.

During their rain-pocked stay at Clarkston, the Senators were able to get in only two exhibition games with Lewiston. Each club won once. However, a number of lengthy workouts were experienced.

EUGENE (Special)—The veteran players listed by the Eugene Emeralds for the opening of the Northwest League baseball season at Salem Thursday night are all recognizable by loop fans.

Manager Hugh Luby once again has the two mainstays of his pitching staff of last season, righthander Ollie Brantley and lefty Beryn Hodges, along with Danny Holden, Mel Krause and Bill Eastburn.

We have often wondered why a small minority of fly fishermen seem to feel "short changed" if their dry flies do not have enough hackle on them to resemble a king sized caterpillar. They seem to feel that a dry fly is not a dry fly unless it can be substituted for a shaving brush on short notice.

Stream insects are certainly not a bushy breed and to imitate them even roughly, is a tough job. The many many fly patterns which predominate the dry fly world certainly should not be dressed with any more hackle than is necessary to make them float. The hackle on any insect imitation is placed there for only two reasons. One reason is to keep the fly floating as well as possible. The other reason is to imitate the insect's legs.

The idea that the more hackle the better the floating quality is erroneous in most cases. The quality of the hackle itself is the determining factor in whether or not the fly will float well. A dry fly which is sparsely dressed, but with top quality game cock hackles, will float higher and longer than will a heavily dressed fly of poor quality hackle.

Some tiers insist on using nothing but a few strands of "hen" hackle for wet flies as the webby hen hackle will absorb water quickly and cause the fly to sink. Using hen hackle or a poor quality, webby rooster hackle on a dry fly will only defeat the purpose of the fly no matter how much hackle is wound on.

A perfect dry fly would be one that had no more than six or eight strands of hackle but which would still float high and dry. Unfortunately this is rarely possible except maybe on six 18 or 20 mils.

Select Fly for Type of Water . . .

Fly fishermen should select their fly patterns more to the type of water being fished than to any one other single factor. By that we mean, a small, sparsely dressed dry fly will have a hard time staying afloat on heavy, fast water. On streams such as the Metolous, lower Deschutes, and Crooked rivers, a sparsely dressed fly in very small sizes is difficult to fish properly.

On small, slow moving streams like the little Deschutes, Crescent creek, and others in central and eastern Oregon, the small mayfly imitations on long, fine leaders will produce fish when the large, rough dry flies will do no more than put the fish down.

But, even on the larger, faster rivers it is not wise to use a fly

SEATTLE (AP)—Rain at the start of the ninth inning Sunday afternoon gave Seattle pitcher Art Fowler a 3-0 Pacific Coast League baseball victory over Spokane in the first game of a scheduled doubleheader. The second game was postponed.

Fowler had pitched 19 consecutive scoreless innings up to the ninth inning in Sunday's game. Tom Saffell and Tony Rolfe, the first two Spokane batters to face him in the ninth, singled. Manager Connie Ryan called in ace reliever Bill Kennedy. Kennedy had just finished his warm-up pitches when the rain, which had started lightly in the eighth, came down with such force that umpire Al Mutart called the game.

Honor Voted To Southern

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP)—A pair of great runners, sprinter Eddie Southern of Texas and rider Archie Moore of Oklahoma, swiped the individual honors in the 33rd running of the Kansas relays.

Southern, the fastest quarter-miler in the country this spring, edged Hodgson in the voting for the most outstanding athlete award in the 2-day meet concluded Saturday. He anchored the "Longhorn" to a 3:09.1 victory in the university mile relay. That was three tenths of a second under the intercollegiate record set by California in 1941, and 2.5 seconds under the old relay record.

Caught as low as 44.6 seconds by two watches and 44.9 by another, in the mile relay, Southern also anchored Texas to victory in the 440-yard relay, 40.3 seconds, and to second place in the university 880-yard relay.

Hodgson, a spirited sophomore from South Africa, was clocked in 4:07 for the mile in anchoring Oklahoma to a meet record in the distance medley. The time was 9:56.5.

BOSTON (AP)—Montreal's mighty Canadiens captured their third straight Stanley Cup hockey championship, defeating battling Boston 5-3 Sunday night behind a blistering attack touched off by a pair of goals in the opening two minutes.

Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffron, Maurice (Rocket) Richard and big Jean Beliveau—the list reading like a hockey who's who—made it possible, but only after Montreal survived a magnificent third period rally by the losers.

Boston, stirred by a steady outpour by the capacity crowd of 13,009, scored on goals by Norman Johnson and Larry Regan that pulled them with a single goal of the Canadiens in a frantic third period of pressure. But the cinderella Bruins couldn't quite make it.

Geoffron was directly in front of the Bruins net when he flicked in Beliveau's long centering pass only 46 seconds after the game got under way at Boston Garden.

O'Connell Leads Win With Two Home Runs

Musial Raps Pair to Pace Cards To Win; Redlegs, Braves Downed

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Danny O'Connell popped two home runs over the convenient left field screen at the Coliseum Sunday as the San Francisco Giants again thumped the Los Angeles Dodgers 12-2 before 47,234 fans in 95-degree temperature.

A total of four homers sailed out of this sun-baked concrete bowl that Walter O'Malley had converted into a baseball field from a football stadium. The three games produced 12 home runs.

The crowd boosted the three-day weekend attendance total to 167,209 for the first series of major league baseball ever played in Los Angeles. Although it had been expected the Sunday turnout might approach the all-time record, the heat held the actual count 31,433 below the opening day crowd.

In addition to O'Connell's two blows that slid over the top of the 48-foot high screen guarding the left field wall, Daryl Spencer also homered for the Giants. Spencer's blow traveled about 320 feet, passing into the stands a few feet past the end of the screen that extends from the 250-foot foul line toward left center.

The Giants wound up with 15 hits, including three doubles, a triple and the three homers off three Dodger pitchers.
