

State Board Approves Budget For University, Colleges; Rise In Fall Enrollment Forecast

PORTLAND (U) — The State Board of Higher Education, meeting as a committee, Monday approved a budget of \$33,945,000 for 1958-1959 for the state's universities and colleges.

Board members were told to expect a 6.8 per cent increase in enrollment on tax-supported campuses next fall, to a total of 21,560.

Plans to Curb High Court's Power Voted

WASHINGTON (U) — Two controversial proposals to curb the powers of the Supreme Court were approved 9-6 today by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

A third proposal, designed to circumvent the Supreme Court's ruling that government workers may be fired as security risks only from sensitive jobs, was defeated 9-5.

Chairman Eastland (D-Miss.) announced the committee had okayed legislation which would strip the high court of power to act on appeals from cases involving the admission of lawyers to practice in state courts.

He said it also had approved a proposal by Sen. Butler (R-Md.) to block appeals to the Supreme Court or any other lower federal court by witnesses challenging the pertinency of questions asked them by congressional investigating committees.

The Judiciary Committee is working on a bill by Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.) to strip the supreme court of authority to review lower court decisions in five categories of cases.

One of these categories covers the admission of lawyers to practice in state courts, and another covers security dismissals.

Researcher at Harvard Held As Spy Link

BOSTON (U) — A U.S. commissioner held Mark Zborowski, 50, a short, balding, Russian-born Harvard researcher, in \$200,000 bail Monday on perjury charges linked with the Jack Soble espionage ring.

FBI agents took Zborowski into custody at his suburban Brookline home a few hours earlier on a New York indictment. They said it was the result of "clandestine activities" by Zborowski with Vasili Zubilin, formerly secretary of the Soviet Embassy who was mentioned in charges against Soble.

Unable to raise bail Zborowski was taken to Charles Street Jail. The one-count indictment, opened Monday in New York, said Zborowski had committed perjury by denying before a federal grand jury Feb. 20, 1957, that he had ever met Soble.

U.S. Atty. Paul W. Williams said in New York that Zborowski had had more than 50 meetings with Soble between 1944 and 1947 in this country and had been a Soviet agent since early in the 1930's.

Zborowski is a research associate in the Harvard School of Public Health.

POST FALLS, Idaho (U) — More than 60 persons searched the hills around this small community near the Washington border Monday for two grade-school aged girls, missing since early Sunday morning.

Four parties, including townspeople, sheriff's officers, police and boy scouts, searched the wooded areas around the town Monday without finding any trace of the young sisters, Murray said.

He said a state-wide search alert was being distributed through the Idaho State Police office.

Harriman Attacks Administration For Its Attitude Toward Recession

WASHINGTON (U) — Gov. Averell Harriman of New York accused the Eisenhower administration Monday of taking a do-nothing, indifferent attitude toward the recession.

The Democratic governor made the charge in a speech to a national conference of Democratic women while these other things were happening on the economic front:

1. Chairman Spence (D-Ky.) of the House Banking Committee predicted that Congress will pass a bill to lend states and cities up to two billion dollars for local public works. The Senate has passed such a bill, limited to one billion.

2. Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) offered a bill to increase individual exemptions on income taxes from \$600 to \$800 and to repeal federal taxes on many items, including cars. He acted in the face of indications that Congress will delay a decision on tax cutting until June or July.

3. Chairman William McClellan of the Federal Reserve System predicted "that interest rates on home mortgages and small business loans will go down as a result of new federal money policies."

4. Sen. Kuchel (R-Calif.) indicated he will support an attempt to override President Eisenhower's veto of a bill to authorize 1 1/2 billion dollars for rivers and harbors projects. More often than not Kuchel goes along with the administration.

Herbert Hoover Still Improving

NEW YORK (U) — Former President Herbert Hoover, 83, continuing to progress very favorably Monday at the Harkness Pavilion of the Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, where he underwent a gall bladder operation Saturday.

The hospital reported he was brighter and more alert and was permitted to stand up for five minutes. He later walked a few steps and sat in a chair.

Colonel Draws 5-20 Years for Crosby Stickup Try

SALINAS, Calif. (U) — Lt. Col. Melvin Russell Blair, 42, a retired Army veteran, was sentenced to five to 20 years in the penitentiary Monday for trying to rob the Bing Crosby golf tournament of more than \$40,000 last January.

The colonel, who served in Burma during World War II and in Korea, pleaded guilty and asked for probation. But the Superior Court judge who heard the case denied the probation application and sent him to Vacaville Prison.

Gun Battle Around Old School Bus Kills Three

DANA POINT, Calif. (U) — Sheriff's officers said three persons died in a burst of gunfire Monday night when deputies tried to halt an old school bus passing through this seaside resort. Two other persons were wounded.

The dead were tentatively identified as Deputy Sheriff Robert Schultz; Charles Safford, owner of the bus; and Safford's son Tommy, 8. Taken to Hoag Memorial Hospital at Newport Beach were Deputy Ed Johnson and Alan Safford, 16.

Investigators said they understood the Safford family drove the bus into California from Arizona earlier in the day. They said a woman had telephoned the sheriff's office prior to the shooting to say that a mentally ill person was aboard the bus.

Authorities gave this account: Deputies Johnson and Schultz approached the bus at a corner to investigate. Safford was heard to shout to his sons: "Shoot anybody who tries to stop the bus. Don't let them take you."

The 16-year-old boy then began firing from a window. The officers returned the fire.

When the shooting ended, the father and the 8-year-old were dead and both deputies were wounded. Safford had a .22-caliber pistol in his hand.

Schultz was dead on arrival at the hospital.

Stayton Man To Head State Water Board

LA GRANDE, Ore. (U) — John D. Davis, Stayton, was named chairman of the State Water Resources Board Monday night at a meeting here. He succeeds L. C. Binford, whose term expired.

The board decided to ask Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton to rule on whether a board statement of policy is binding on other state agencies.

The request stems from some opposition on the board to an action by State Public Utilities Commission Howard Morgan. The commissioner recently denied Idaho Power Co. permission to sell bonds in Oregon. Morgan said he was required to do this because the Water Resources Board had not approved IPC's program of building its dams in the Hells Canyon section of the Snake River.

Morgan said the actions of the board are binding on his agencies and all other state agencies.

Four Injured In Santiam Road Crash

ASTORIA (U) — Four persons were injured when two cars crashed just west of here on the Santiam Highway Monday night, state police reported.

Officer William Wetstein identified them as Charles Edward Weisenhaus, 69, and his wife, Mabel Weisenhaus, 64, and injured in the other car were Donald Dale Vaughan, 25, and a passenger, Lawrence Dively, 20.

Weisenhaus, the only one who was hospitalized at Salem General, suffered a dislocated shoulder. The injured were all from Astoria except Vaughan who is from Marion. Wetstein said the accident was at 7:40 p.m.
