

Demo Chief Hopes for Passage Tonight of Pension, Welfare Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Armed with an agreement to limit debate, Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas said Sunday he hopes for passage by Monday night of a bill requiring public reports on employee pension and welfare funds.

During a Sunday lull in the debate, Democrats and Republicans differed on the political results that will stem from persistent but thus far futile efforts of Republican Leader Knowland of California to broaden the bill with a series of controversial labor control amendments.

Eternal Flame Will Burn at '59 Centennial

PORTLAND—A towering 80-foot "eternal flame" will be a major attraction at the 1959 Oregon Centennial Exposition.

The spectacular display will be installed near the center of the exposition grounds by Portland Gas and Coke Company and will burn the entire 100 days of the event, officials announced.

James F. Bell, executive vice president of the gas company, said the exhibit will cost an estimated \$35,000 and the Olympic-like torch will be fed by a huge natural gas pipeline.

Anthony Brandenthal, chairman of the Centennial Commission, said the gas company is the first to announce plans for a key exhibit building, which will be 60 feet in diameter and 10 feet high. Brandenthal said negotiations are being made with several other firms for construction of "new" exhibit buildings.

Gas Executive Bell pointed out that Portland Gas and Coke also celebrates its 100th birthday in

1958.

"There has been a great deal of politics on both sides," Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.), one of a group of Republicans who voted against all of Knowland's moves, said in an interview.

"I believe it will help some Republicans this fall," Aiken said of the floor battle that started last Thursday. "It certainly will make Sen. Knowland the leader of the conservative forces of the party in California and nationally."

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.), in a separate interview, agreed with Aiken that the labor bill fight had a heavy background of politics.

"I believe it will hurt the Republicans," Magnuson said. "Sen. Knowland has been running for governor on the Senate floor and in doing that he's tied up the business of the Senate."

Indians Vote to Quit Klamath Tribe in Report

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland television commentator Tom McCall said Sunday he has learned that 1,600 of the 2,133 enrolled members of the Klamath Indian Tribe have voted to withdraw from tribal membership.

Balloting on the matter was held last week under the government program to withdraw federal jurisdiction from the tribe.

Those who voted to withdraw want their share of the tribal assets in cash. The maximum individual share has been computed at about \$58,000.

Knowland has been defeated on five straight roll - call votes to amend the bill thus far, but says he will continue the fight.

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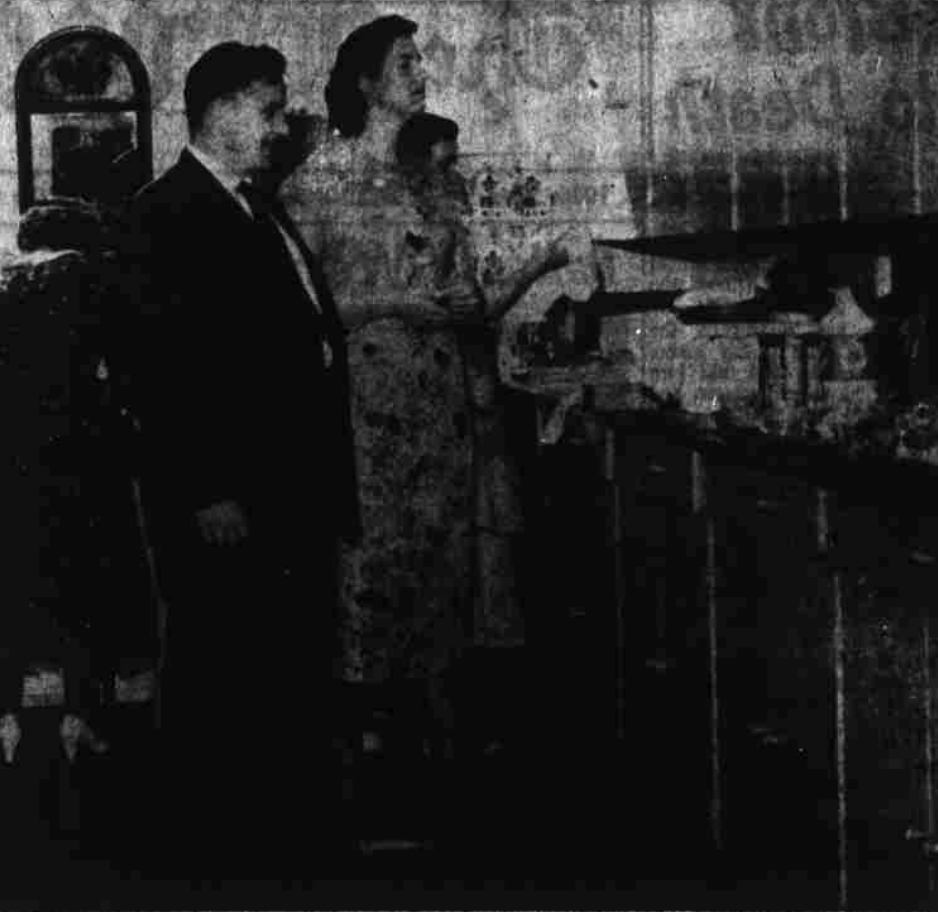
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Kitchen Improvements Viewed at Mission

Paratroopers Jump Today

FT. CAMPBELL, Ky. (AP)—Operation Eagle Wing, a practice war involving the 101st Airborne Division, put off Sunday a scheduled mass drop of nearly 5,000 troops because of unfavorable weather conditions.

Maj. Gen. W. C. Westmoreland, division commander said the drop probably would be made Monday morning.

Right-to-Work Law Opposed By Young GOP

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Young Republican pre-primary policy convention, which ended here Sunday, went on record as opposed to so-called "right to work" legislation.

Such legislation would make the closed or union shop illegal.

Other resolutions called for: Revision of the state's anti-picketing law to allow both labor and management "freedom and equal status as regards bargaining for union shop contracts."

Two Commissions

The creation of two commissions from the one that now administers the Industrial Accident and Unemployment Compensation laws.

Opposition to compulsory automobile insurance.

Housing legislation to assure "rights, liberties and privileges" of minority groups.

Federal agencies to provide a full allowable cut of timber.

Continuation of reciprocal trade agreements.

Support of the administration's Defense Department re-organization plan.

More Nuclear Tests

Continuation of nuclear testing. Statehood for Hawaii and Alaska.

Voting privileges for 18-year olds.

State Sen. Warren Gill and State Treasurer Sig Unander addressed the session. Both are Republican candidates for nomination as governor. Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, another candidate, was invited, but was unable to attend because of a prior commitment.

Historian Lists Two Errors in Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Historian Arnold Toynbee said Sunday there are two fundamental errors in American foreign policy: One, he said, is United States' refusal to recognize Communist China; the other, the American antagonism toward Arabs in the Middle East.

Toynbee, an Englishman and world-famed historian who recently has been lecturing at Washington and Lee University, Lexington, Va., gave his views on a television program, ABC-TV "Open Hearing."

He was uncertain, he said, whether the Middle East would develop under a democratic or Communist system. He was confident that Red China would develop into one of the world's major powers.

Toynbee said the West and Russia must learn to trust each other to relieve existing tensions. As the basis of trust he said the peoples of Russia and the West must have personal knowledge of each other.

America's greatest strengths, Toynbee said, "are your powers of improvisation and your initiative; your greatest weaknesses are the profit motive and your high standard of living because it cuts you off from the rest of the world."

Ike Picks White House Aide for Secretary Role

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—President Eisenhower picked Robert K. Gray, now a White House aide on job patronage, to be secretary of the Cabinet.

In his new assignment starting about mid-May Gray, 36, will succeed Maxwell M. Rabb whose resignation to enter private law practice in New York was announced last week.

Gray, who temporarily will combine his job patronage work with duties as Cabinet secretary, is a native of Hastings, Neb.

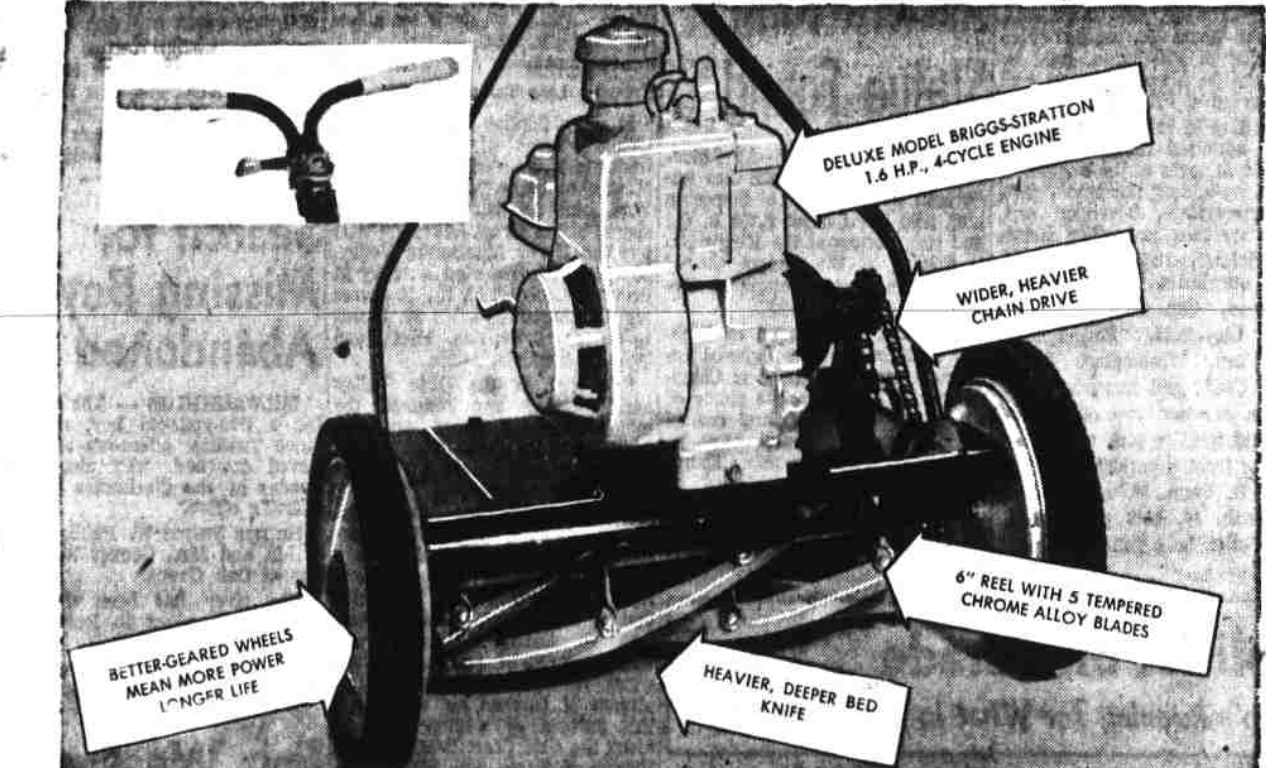
