

Pension - Welfare Bill Passes Senate; Stiffer Control Measure Fails

WASHINGTON (U)—The Senate passed Monday night a bill to regulate employee pension and welfare funds after voting down repeated efforts to broaden it into a general labor control measure.

The roll call vote was 88-0. The bill now goes to the House which already has 15 proposals on the same subject in its Labor Committee. Chairman Harkin (D-N.C.) of the House group has said he would conduct hearings once the Senate acted.

Four days of politically charged debate preceded final Senate passage. The fight was not on the welfare-pension bill itself, but on efforts to convert it into general labor legislation.

The Democratic leadership fought off all far-ranging amendments offered by Republican leaders. Knowland of California and other GOP senators. But to do this it had to pledge repeatedly that an over-all labor bill would be brought to the floor later.

Sponsors of the pension-welfare bill said amendments would kill it and thus wipe out three years' work on the legislation. One Republican amendment was accepted by the Democratic leadership and adopted 90-0. This was a proposal by Sen. Mundt (R-SD) to make it impossible for a criminal to serve as an officer, trustee, custodian or employee of a pension or welfare plan.

Republicans generally scoffed at the idea that any general labor bill considered in June or July, when the adjournment rush is starting, would have any chance of final enactment.

In all, Republicans offered 14 other amendments to the welfare fund bill. They were beaten on the same general voting pattern with 10 to a dozen GOP senators joining practically all Democrats in opposition in most cases. About 25 other proposed amendments were dropped into the trash can.

Despite GOP derision of the pension-welfare bill as a "milktoast" measure, its sponsors said it would provide real protection to the 85 million persons now covered by about 40,000 plans. An estimated 35 million dollars is held in the various funds.

The bill would require that the funds be registered with the government and full financial reports filed on their operation.

Equipment Authorized For Bush Pasture Job

With work on a Bush's Pasture water sprinkling system scheduled to start soon, Salem City Council Monday night authorized the parks department to buy some special equipment for cutting turf and digging small ditches for the pipe to be laid.

Expenditure of up to \$1,545 for the two machines was left to the decision of City Manager Kent Mathewson, pending examination of some equipment that is recommended by park and water departments. The purchase would not require bids.

Mathewson recommended the equipment as a savings in labor cost and a help in getting the job done with the least disruption of park use possible.

Pro Tem Judge Renamed
Dale Pierson, Salem attorney, was reappointed municipal judge pro tem by the aldermen. He will serve during vacation and other absences of Municipal Judge Douglas Hay.

Marion Car Rental Co., Hertz agency in Salem, asked the Council for an exclusive franchise for service at Salem airport. The request was passed along to the Airport Advisory Commission for study.

Wesley Kvarsten, Salem Planning Commission executive, told the councilmen that the commission would act in the near future on a petition for annexation to the city, submitted by the Shangkila residential area near north city limits.

Permit was granted for John Taylor to again operate an excursion boat on the Willamette from Wallace Marine Park.

Resolutions ordered several sidewalks installed along north side of B Street between 14th and 18th Streets. Several watermain projects also were ordered.

Parking Ban Passed
In the traffic field, parking was prohibited on south side of Trade Street SE between 14th and 15th; one-hour parking was ordered on Center and Marion Streets just west of Capitol Street NE; parking was prohibited in a section along north side of Belmont Street NE near Fourth.

Final legislation was passed to make the annual updating of the Salem building code in conformance with a generally recognized west coast code; to fix definite terms for the Airport Advisory Commission; to fix the assessments against property owners for a sewer between D and Center Streets near Ellis Avenue.

A bill to license tree trimmers and surgeons was readied for final action May 12.

MAN ARRESTED
John L. Lama, 60, address not known, who has been wanted on a Marion County District Court felony warrant charging obtaining money and property by false pretense, was arrested Monday night near Cottage Grove, state police reported.

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Mental Hearing Requested in Slaying Case

Helen Ruth Smith, 46, who has been indicted by the Marion County Grand Jury on a charge of second degree murder concerning the death of Gail Stacy, 32, did not appear Monday in Circuit Court arraignment.

Mrs. Smith, who has not yet entered a plea to the charge, is accused of shooting Stacy April 14 at their home at 1965 25th St. SE.

A petition has been filed by neighbors of Stacy requesting a mental hearing for Mrs. Smith, said courthouse officials. A hearing was tentatively set for this afternoon on the matter, said officials. The hearing is separate from the murder charge.

Statutory rape charges were dismissed Monday in Marion County Court against William Raymond New, 19, Aumsville.

The charge, which involved a 5-year-old girl, was dismissed on the stipulation he enter the armed forces for at least two years, said District Attorney Hattie J. Bratzel.

Daniel William Ortega, Portland, pleaded guilty Monday in Marion County Circuit Court to a charge of larceny concerning a car stolen from a Salem resident in March. The case was continued for a presentence investigation.

Charles William Exline, 44, formerly of Tijuana, Mexico, pleaded guilty Monday in Marion County Circuit Court to a charge of larceny by bail.

Sentencing will be May 5 at 1:30 p.m. on the charge, which involves \$925 of tools purchased from a Salem hardware store in 1956.

Fred Bert Grigsby, 340 Church St. NE, pleaded guilty Monday in Marion County Circuit Court to a charge of knowingly uttering and publishing a forged bank check.

The count involves a \$100 check given to a Salem department store April 23, said officials. The case was continued for sentencing pending a Federal Bureau of Investigation report, said officials.

Leslie William Tolbert, West Linn, pleaded guilty Monday in Marion County Court to two charges of obtaining money and property by false pretenses.

Pre-sentence investigations were ordered on the charges which concern a \$20 check given to a Mt. Angel service station in February and a \$15 check to a Salem laundromat in January.

Donald Eugene Smith, San Francisco, was sentenced to two years and nine months at the Oregon State Prison Monday in Marion County Circuit Court on a charge of larceny.

Smith pleaded guilty to the charge earlier, which concerns the theft of a car from Marion Car Rental Co. of Salem, said officials.

Richard Lee Davidson, 1195 4th St. NE, changed an innocent plea to guilty Monday in Marion County Circuit Court on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses.

The charge, formerly uttering and publishing a forged bank check, involves a \$48 check given to a Salem grocery last month. The case was continued for a presentence investigation.

Fishing Pole Theft Report Cleared
The reported theft of a fishing pole from a 12-year-old Salem boy who was fishing from a wheel chair in Mill Creek Saturday was cleared Monday.

Ivan Osterman, 1853 Court St. NE, who resides near the fishing spot said his son took the pole home by mistake thinking it belonged to his younger brother.

The pole and reel were then returned to Roger Dunsmore, 12-year-old crippled son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Dunsmore, 2015 34th St. NE.

MOTORIST CHARGED
A Salem motorist was arrested by city police on a charge of reckless driving Monday night after a power pole was struck at Highland and Brooks avenues in North-Salem, city police reported.

Officers identified the driver of the car, registered to Marion Car Rental, Salem, as Thomas L. Snethen, 4106 Silverton Rd. NE.

Three Bludgeoned
ROANOKE, Va. (U)—The bludgeoned bodies of a mother and two of her children were found Monday in their slum-area apartment. A third child was discovered similarly beaten and in critical condition. Murder charges were lodged against Grover Lucas, 49, father of the children.

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WILD AND WACKY IN KHAKI

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—Evangelist Billy Graham preached Monday night to a near-capacity audience in his first night appearance in the cavernous 16,500-seat Cow Palace.

Attendance was unofficially estimated at 14,500. There was no overflow crowd. The audience joined the 2,000-voice choir and then bowed heads as leaders of Graham's "Crusade" led them in prayer.

Many came with Bibles in hand, as Graham had asked. "This is the largest Monday night crowd we've ever had," Graham said.

He asked those with Bibles to hold them up.

Subversion Control at State Level Supported
WASHINGTON (U)—Two hotly argued proposals to upset Supreme Court decisions on subversion and Communist activity were approved Monday by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

In one of these decisions the court held that states have no right to prosecute persons for subversion, ruling that the federal government has pre-empted this field.

This is known as the Steve Nelson case after the Pennsylvania Communist who was its central figure.

The committee sought by its action to restore the power of the states to pass and enforce their own laws against subversion or sedition.

In the other decision the court held that the Smith Act did not forbid the advocacy and teaching of forcible overthrow of the government as an abstract principle, provided it was not linked to any positive action.

To "correct" this finding as Chairman Eastland (D-Miss) phrased it, the committee voted to make the act read:

"Without regard to the immediate probable effects of such advocacy, whoever knowingly or willfully advocates, abets, advises, or teaches the duty, necessity, desirability or propriety of overthrowing or destroying the government of the United States . . . by force or violence" shall be guilty of a felony.

Annexation to Scio's School District Vetoed

The proposal that a portion of Stayton Union High School district be annexed to Linn County Scio district was vetoed Monday night by the Marion County School Reorganization Committee.

The proposal was one of three made by the Linn County Reorganization Committee. The Marion County committee voted to accept an unclaimed, sparsely populated 40-square-mile area in the northeast part of Linn County to be added to Detroit school district.

The Marion committee also accepted a proposal that Marion and Linn areas of Detroit, Mill City and Gates school districts be combined into a single administrative unit.

The group vetoed a provision that the east three quarters of the Marion-Linn district be added into this unit.

The proposals will be debated by both groups at a joint meeting next Tuesday at 8 p.m. at the county courthouse.

Marion County's proposal to enlarge Jefferson district by extending the south boundary about two miles into the present Scio district will also be considered at the meeting.

With actual reorganization finally getting underway, Monday's meeting centered around methods of combining school units, including the county's 13 non-high school districts, around present high school centers.

A tentative plan must be completed by the committee by October. The next regular session was scheduled for June 30.

Men Charged With Furnishing Liquor to Girl, 15
Three men were charged Monday night with furnishing liquor to a minor after being arrested in the Donnell area, the Marion County sheriff's office reported.

The minor, a 15-year-old Woodburn girl, was charged with creating a disturbance in a private place while intoxicated, deputies said.

The three men were listed by deputies as Don Lee Harrel, 47, Prosser, Wash.; George Lin Warn, 20, and Dave Oliver Warn, 25, both of Portland. All three were jailed under \$250 bail and the girl was placed in juvenile detention.

Board Delays Cut Of Tax Levy Ratio
Marion County Board of Equalization members Monday delayed approval of a proposed cut from 22 per cent to 20 per cent in the county's tax levy ratio to true property cash value.

The delay was to allow an exchange Clackamas County assessor to review the proposal, which has been set up by Harold Domagala, county assessor. The group is expected to accept the proposal at a meeting today at 2 p.m. Final approval comes from the State Tax Commission.
