

'Fashionable' Health Council Draws Attack

The best community health council is one formed to fight a specific health problem and not "to keep up with the Joneses," Marion County Health Council members were told Monday.

Dr. Donald Dukelow of Chicago, consultant with the health education bureau of the American Medical Association, said too many councils were formed after the war "because it was fashionable."

"I hope I don't step on any toes," he said in diagnosing the general problem of health councils.

The general characteristic of such councils after 12-15 years is "to grow senile and to block the formation of other groups that could carry out its functions," he contended.

A council should not do a job which one of its member agencies is designed to do, Dukelow said. It works best when it serves as clearing house where agencies talk over a problem and put the solution to work within their own organizations, he concluded.

Report Due On Highland Traffic Study

A Highland Avenue traffic study will be reported Thursday to the Salem Citizens' Advisory Traffic Council.

City Manager Kent Mathewson said one or two spokesmen from the Highland Avenue neighborhood protest group would be invited to the City Hall meeting.

The protest followed recent removal of stop signs that put an end to Highland's through-street status. Then further traffic studies in the area were ordered to see if the stop signs should be restored on cross streets near Highland and St. Vincent's School.

Ex-WU Student Named Klamath County Attorney

Arthur Beddoe, Klamath Falls lawyer and onetime football player at Willamette University, was appointed Monday by Gov. Robert Holmes as district attorney of Klamath County.

Beddoe, 29-year-old Republican, will succeed Richard C. Beesley, Klamath Falls, who resigned the office effective May 1.

A 1951 graduate of Willamette, Beddoe was a standout tackle for the school. He was a Marion County deputy sheriff for a year and also was with the State Parole Board for a time. He received his degree from Northwestern College of Law in Portland in 1956.

Under the new management, pizza pie, seafood, and dinners will be served. Children's plates, steaks and chops are also on the menu.

A two piece combo will play for dinner dancers six nights a week in the cocktail lounge, Wilson said. The restaurant will be closed Sundays, the new owner added.

Shattuc's will continue to be known by the same name and will cater to the family. No remodeling is planned.

Donald Howe, who has a background in Portland restaurants, has been named manager of the Salem restaurant and is planning a grand reopening next week.
