Health Advisory Group to Have Annual Meeting

Citizens' advisory committees to the Marion County Health Department will hold an annual luncheon meeting Monday noon at the First Congregational Church.

Chronic illness, mental illness, accident prevention and communicable diseases will be stressed in the talk, "In Tune With the Times," by Dr. Richard Wilcox, director of local health services for the State Board of Health.

The meeting will include committees of medical and dental societies, allied health agencies, mental health council and area committees on public health, said Mrs. Bernice Yery, director of nurses of the Marion County Health Department.

Officers will be elected for the coming year.

Governor Describes Sputnik Shock

DENVER — Gov. Robert Holman of Oregon said Tuesday people who have devoted a great deal of time to American education have been brought together by shock.

He described this shock as originally administered last October by Sputnik I "but prolonged because all sorts of people-wise and well-meaning as well as foolish and malicious have jumped all over us, bludgeoning us with reproaches, criticisms and a bewildering number of off-the-cuff suggestions."

And, of course, we have charged ourselves, partly to down out those who most vituperatively attacked us and partly to cover up the still small voices of our own consciences which have softly suggested that just maybe we hadn't been thinking very clearly about the meaning of education."

Holmes was a speaker at the Legislative Workshop on Financing Higher Education. The workshop, which closed its three-day session Tuesday, was sponsored by the Western Governors' Conference, representing 11 Western states and Hawaii, the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education and the Council of State Governments.

Soviets Unroll Red Carpet

MOSCOW — President Nasser flew into Moscow on a Soviet jet liner Tuesday for 18 days of red carpet treatment. He said his visit will strengthen the ties between his United Arab Republic and the Soviet Union.

Thousands of workers and students at half a day off to greet him at Moscow's Airport. He looked tense and tired as he stepped down the ramp on the shining TU104 plane. The crowd burst into cheers, and military guards snapped salutes.

School children rushed him with flowers, and a group of Egyptian students chanted: "Hail to the leader of the Arab world."

Cardinal's Arm Healing

ROME — Doctors said Tuesday night the remaining part of Samuel Cardinal Siri's right arm is healing rapidly and well. He underwent an amputation Monday to foil a blood clot.

A few visitors allowed to see the 70-year-old archbishop of Chicago said he looked and felt fine.

One said the cardinal looks forward to leaving the hospital within two weeks and hopes to begin his new duties as primate of the Roman Catholic Church's Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith shortly.

Payment Delayed

AMMAN — Britain has agreed to let Jordan delay for six years payment of a \$1,400,000 installment due May 1 for British military stores and installations taken over by Jordan in 1957.

Curriculum Discussion Attracts 200

An unexpectedly small audience attended a public meeting Tuesday night to discuss the curriculum in Salem high schools. The number was estimated by school officials at 200 although almost 300 present at a similar meeting last month had asked for another.

The parents of 5,800 junior and senior high school students had been invited through the schools to the meeting in Leslie Junior High School and several members of a question-and-answer panel expressed disappointment that a larger share of them had not turned out for the discussion.

School district superintendent Charles D. Schmidt said the district administration would try to figure out how to create more interest in possible future meetings, of the same type.

Schmidt announced one definite result of last month's meeting. High school handbooks will contain information on scholarships available for higher education, as suggested by a discussion group at that meeting.

The question of driver training, popular throughout the state but not offered in Salem schools, was raised last night.

Panel members Schmidt, Mrs. P. H. Brydon, representing Salem School Board, and Miss Barbara Henken, South Salem High School student body president, agreed that if it is given it should be outside regular school hours.

Another question asked why physical education is compulsory for 11th and 12th graders.

North Salem High School Principal E. A. Carleton said, "We feel that it is good for the youngsters and the public seems to agree." An exception is made for 12th graders where necessary to get in other subjects desired.

Textbook Purchases Discussed

Some sentiment was expressed for purchase of textbooks by parents and Carleton agreed with panel member Irwin Wedel, Leslie Junior High School Parent-Teachers Association president, that they should be sold to parents who want to buy them.

Schmidt said the cost would range from \$21 to \$32 a year. He explained that ninth and high school books are purchased with a revolving fund and rented to students for \$4.50 to \$5.50 a year.

Miss Henken said she would like to be able to buy her books because she finds underlining an aid in reviewing.

Youngsters properly disciplined at home are no problem at school, Schmidt said in answer to another question.

Habit Start Early

Proper study attitudes and habits should be instilled in early grades. Other panel members emphasized the importance of proper atmosphere and regular scheduling of study at home.

The best way for parents to find out about the schools and how their children are doing is to visit the schools.

Salem pupils read well, according to standardized tests.

Indications are that Salem graduates are better prepared for college than those of most other Oregon high schools.

Educational standards should be established by the community, within a statewide pattern for graduation requirements.

Still to be heard from are Central Union, Cascade Union, Stayton Union and Falls City high schools, where candidates are to be elected by students, and North and South Salem, where applications are being taken for volunteers.

Candidates are to meet Saturday at Charlotte School of Charm & Modeling, North and South Salem girls at 2 p.m. and other candidates at 3.

William Ferguson is chairman of the queen's committee.

British Plan To Continue Atomic Tests

LONDON — Prime Minister Macmillan said Tuesday Britain intends to explode more nuclear weapons. He brushed off suggestions the tests might jeopardize summit talks preparations.

The British hydrogen bomb exploded over the central Pacific Monday was the opener in a new test series, Macmillan told the House of Commons.

Government sources suggested earlier that the central Pacific tests may be Britain's last series if the United States agrees to pool nuclear secrets.

Macmillan did not comment on that.

Doctor to Give Talk on Phoned Disease Reports

A report on a phone method of reporting communicable diseases by general practitioners will be presented Friday at Eugene by Dr. Willard Stone, Marion County Health Department Director.

Marion county was one of four counties selected by the State Board of Health to test different methods of pooling communicable disease reports, said Dr. Stone. Benton, Lane and Douglas counties also participated.

Mrs. Ethel Lerman, vital statistics clerk at the health office, will help present the report, which covers the first three months of the year.

Big 3 Rejects Pre-Summit Talk Plan

WASHINGTON — Russia's proposal to add Communist Poland and Czechoslovakia to pre-summit talks was reported rejected Tuesday by U.S., British and French envoys.

Instead, informants said, the representatives of the allied Big Three chose a less unpalatable course: Agreement to meet separately with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko in Moscow, as he demanded last week.

Thus, the Big Three apparently picked what they considered the lesser of two evils. Final approval, however, depends upon London and Paris.

The agreement was signalled by French Ambassador Herre Alphonse after he met with British Ambassador Sir Harold Caccia and C. Burke Elbrick, assistant U.S. secretary of state for European affairs.

"We have agreed on the draft and the agreed text goes now immediately to London and Paris for final approval by our governments," Alphonse told newsmen.

No hitch was expected in the allied capitals. A formal notice to the Kremlin was looked for before the end of the week.

Billy Graham Gives Rousing Sermon on Sin

SAN FRANCISCO — Evangelist Billy Graham attacked man's sinfulness Tuesday night in a rousing sermon before an estimated crowd of 15,000 at the 16,500-seat Cow Palace.

Sin, he said, is the root cause of war.

"We've had only 277 years of peace in the last 3,000 years."

"A man from Mars would say that our major industry is war," he declared.

"I have toured the world and have seen social injustice, crime and racial prejudice."

"What is wrong with man that these things happen in a civilized society?"

"We are morally sick," he answered. "The cause of this sickness is sin — which defiles the heart, paralyzes the will, dulls the conscience."

The remedy is Christ, who has promised to forgive every sin and to give power over temptation, Graham said.

The crowd was a thousand less than Monday night's first evening meeting of the six-week crusade. The first meeting drew 14,500.

More Storms Hit Texas

DALLAS — North and central Texas suffered from more tornadoes, hail, heavy rains and destructive winds Tuesday.

Tornadoes struck near Comanche, southwest of the Fort Worth-Dallas area; in Hunt County, northeast of Dallas; and near Wills Point, southeast of Dallas. No casualties were reported.

Accompanying rains added to the flood threat along the Trinity River in central Texas and in northeast Texas.

At Downing, 100 miles southwest of Fort Worth, a tornado destroyed seven farm homes and their outbuildings last night. Damage was in excess of \$100,000.

In Hunt County, a tornado ripped along the Celeste-Kingston highway. It toppled telephone and power lines on both sides of the road. High winds damaged much of the northern part of the county. Trees were uprooted, TV aerials toppled and barns demolished.

Leukemia Takes Life Of Youth

James C. Darby Jr., 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Darby Sr., 875 Capitol St. NE, died Monday at Veterans Hospital in Portland of leukemia.

Darby was born Dec. 24, 1934 at Port Arthur, Tex., and settled with his parents in Salem about 1935. He graduated from North Salem High School and attended Willamette University for 2½ years where he majored in pre-medicine. Darby was a member of First Presbyterian Church.

He joined the Army July, 1956, from ROTC at Willamette and was later stationed in Germany. Darby, who was not married, was stricken with leukemia in September 1957 while in Germany. He received a medical retirement from the Army about three months later and entered the hospital in Portland.

His father is Sgt. James C. Darby who has been with the Oregon State Police for 15 years.

Survivors besides the parents are a brother, Thomas Darby, Salem; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. I. L. Darby, Salem; and grandmother, Mrs. Mittle Lindenmeyer, Wylie, Tex.

Final rites will be in Clough-Barrick Funeral Chapel at 1:30 p.m. Thursday with Rev. Everett A. Barker officiating. Burial will be in Belcrest Memorial Park.

Midnight tonight is the legal deadline for Oregon employers to pay unemployment compensation contributions on employees' wages paid during the January-March 1958 quarter.

The State Unemployment Compensation Commission who issued the announcement cautioned employers Tuesday night that failure to pay this tax before the deadline would result in increased costs to the employer in interest, penalties or court costs.

All reports postmarked and paid on or before April 30 will be credited, commission members said.
