

# Solon Cries 'Dole' In House Debate of Jobless Pay Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cries of "Dole" and "socialism" punctuated House debate Wednesday over a 1½-billion-dollar emergency unemployment compensation bill.

The measure, drafted by Democrats, came under fire from Republicans and many Southern Democrats who contended its cost was anybody's guess and that it would wreck the present federal-state jobless pay program.

## Seven Cars Damaged in Salem Area

## Ike Denies He's Grooming Successor

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower said Wednesday he isn't grooming a successor. So far as he is concerned, he said, the Republican party will be free to pick its 1960 nominee from a list of "darn good men."

Eisenhower spoke out in language that indicated Vice President Nixon will get no presidential pat on the back when the time comes to select the next party nominee.

The President also made it clear he is not thinking of resigning, so that Nixon could become president before 1960 and thus have an overpowering advantage over nomination rivals.

Eisenhower's views on these political matters were given at a White House news conference.

He went on to say that he thinks there should be a choice among men the public and the parties think have the qualities to make a successful president.

## Newell Williams Dies; Native Of Wisconsin

Newell Williams, who died Wednesday, was past commander of American Legion Post in Superior, Wis., and a prominent Salem resident since 1924.

Williams was born Feb. 3, 1889, in Hayward, Wis., and moved with his parents at an early age to Superior, where he attended schools.

He was married to Marion Schaller in 1919 at Superior. She survives.

Before his marriage Williams served 18 months in the Army in France and was presented with a medal by the French Government for outstanding service. He was a graduate of the University of Wisconsin.

Williams was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Salem, Masonic Lodge, former member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion Capital Post 9 and the Salem Lions Club. He organized Williams Investigation Service in Salem and operated that firm for seven years. For several years he was in the Oregon State Employment Service and Federal Internal Revenue Department.

Survivors in addition to the widow are two daughters, Mrs. Harold MacHugh, Mrs. Richard E. Givens, both Albany, Ore.; two sons, Glen Williams, Salem, and Newell Williams, Jr., in the Navy at Hershamp, Pa.; sister, Mrs. George A. Stratton, Oakosh, Wis.; and 10 grandchildren.

Arrangements of service are pending at Clough-Barrick Funeral Home.

## Salmon Run Protected by Fishing Ban

ASTORIA, Ore. (AP) — The Columbia River salmon run will be protected by a voluntary 72-hour halt in commercial fishing.

Fishpackers and gillnet fishermen made the decision to prevent the run from being wiped out. Some 800 fishermen are affected. The fish normally move steadily upriver. But so far they have been massing in the lower part of the Columbia.

High, muddy water from recent flooding in the Columbia's tributaries apparently was delaying movement of the run.

As a result, downstream catches have been a poor. Wednesday morning several boats had half-ton loads.

The Columbia River Packers Assn., a spokesman for packers, and William Westerholm, secretary of the Columbia River Fishermen's Union, announced the closure effective at 6 p.m. Wednesday.

They said they would extend it if Oregon Fish Commission biologists recommended it. The commercial season opened Monday.

In the three days before the season started only 122 Chinook salmon were counted going over fish ladders at Bonneville Dam. Last year at a comparable time, 24,064 were counted.

## Woman Hurt April 17 Remains Unconscious

Mrs. Willard Aldrich of Vancouver, Wash., who was injured in a two-car crash on Salem Bypass April 17, remained in critical condition at Emanuel Hospital in Portland, attendants said Wednesday night. Mrs. Aldrich has been unconscious since the accident.

## Fire Destroys Garage Near Dallas

DALLAS, Ore. — A fire caused either by an overheated stove in a Swedish steam bath or electrical wiring destroyed a one-car garage of Hardin Smith at Smithfield Wednesday night.

The Smith house, rebuilt after a fire two years ago, was not damaged in the blaze. The call was answered by volunteer firemen from Rickreall and Dallas.

## Driver Flees, Drags Officer

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — A motorist rolled up his window on the arm of a policeman and drove 2½ blocks with the policeman dangling outside.

Patrolman W. L. Perrault, 29, survived the ride Tuesday with out any broken bones, although his arms were bruised and skinned.

Perrault halted Quille Cethus Robertson, 23, a Negro porter for driving on the wrong side of the street.

"He refused to come out of the car," said Perrault. "When I reached in to grab him, he rolled up the car window and took off."

## Youth Shoots Classmate

MASSAPEQUA, N.Y. (AP) — A schoolboy, climaxing a bitter feud with a classmate, waylaid him in a high school washroom Wednesday and killed him with a shotgun blast full in the chest.

"This is for you, Timmy, you creep," police quoted the boy, Bruce Zator, 15, as saying as he sprang from concealment in a toilet booth with a sawed-off shotgun in his hands. Both boys are white.

## Deputies Check Gang War Report

SILVERTOWN, Pa. (AP) — Marion County sheriff's office said early Thursday morning that sheriff's deputies were dispatched to the Silvertown area late Wednesday night to investigate a threatened "gang war" which reportedly was developing between teen-agers.

Details were unavailable early this morning. Deputies said investigation would continue today. No violence was reported in the area, deputies added.

## Noted Chemist Kills Wife, Then Himself

DOYLESTOWN, Pa. (AP) — Noted chemist, inventor Dr. Earl W. Flofodorf, killed his wife with a 16-gauge shotgun Tuesday night as their 12-year-old son watched horrified, then took his own life with the same weapon.

The two deaths were ruled murder and suicide by Coroner Thomas C. Lamb of Bucks County who investigated after the son, William, ran to a neighbor's house and sobbed, "Daddy shot mommy. Daddy shot mommy."

Investigators arriving at the century-old Flofodorf farm home near here found the body of Mrs. Flofodorf, 50, in a hallway near the front door.

Flofodorf, 54, was found dead in a living room chair. Lamb said he had removed his left slipper and sock, inserted the barrel of the shotgun in his mouth and then used his big toe to pull the trigger.

Authorities said the shootings apparently climaxed an argument and that Flofodorf apparently had been drinking.

He had a distinguished career in which he invented a method for the freeze-drying of human blood for plasma, and a method for making powdered bone for use in treating fractures. He also developed a skin test for determining susceptibility to and immunization against whooping cough.

## Salem Man Arrested

Robert Gene Grimes, 30, Salem, Route 4, Box 655, was arrested by Marion County Sheriff Denver Young Wednesday night on a charge of statutory rape, deputies said.

A Marion County Grand Jury secret indictment was returned against Grimes Wednesday afternoon, they said.

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## Vegetable Fats in Diet Win Praise

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Serious consideration should be given to fortifying the American diet with certain vegetable fats as a means of preventing some kinds of heart and artery disease, a veteran researcher in that field reported Wednesday.

People with these diseases definitely should include the vegetable oils in their diet, he said. And those without such disease would be justified in taking the oils as a matter of protection, he asserted.

The report was made in a paper before the California Medical Assn. by Dr. Laurence Kinzell of Oakland, a leading researcher in the effect of unsaturated fats on the health of humans.

Fatty deposits slowly accumulate on the insides of arteries and clog them. Animal fats and hardened vegetable oils in the diet
