Graham Tells Crowd How Jesus Saves

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — Switching from his announced sermon on the world's end to one on how Jesus saved the world, evangelist Billy Graham told an overflow crowd of 18,500 at the Cow Palace Sunday that "coming to Christ is not dependent on understanding."

"I do not understand the digestive system, but I eat," Graham said. "I don't understand all about our respiratory system but I continue to breathe."

Although Jesus lived only 33 years, never traveled more than 100 miles from home and moved in an area smaller than Rhode Island, Graham said, he transformed civilization.

Claiming that Christ had a tremendous influence in art, human freedom and emancipation of women, Graham said "labor unions owe their very roots to the teachings of Jesus."

The rally marked the beginning of the second week of Graham's six-week crusade here. About 117,000 came to hear him during the week, 20,000 more than during the first week of the 1957 New York crusade.

Tourists Quit Haiti When Curfew Put On

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (U) — A government-imposed 8 p.m. curfew had American tourists edging out of Haiti Sunday. Gunfire and noise bombs rattled this capital city all night.

The curfew was imposed by the government of President Francois Duvalier under the state of siege proclaimed in this Negro republic Friday after a rash of home-made bomb blasts. No army officials were available to explain last night's shootings.

Duvalier's opponent in last year's election, ex-Sen. Louis Dedeaux, has been accused of hatching a bomb plot to overthrow the government. A \$5,000-reward was placed on his head.

Pickle Relish Stops Gunman

CHICAGO (U) — Mrs. Ruth Friedman didn't need a gun. She found a bowlful of pickle relish sufficient.

Mrs. Friedman told police a young man walked into the hot dog stand which she runs with her son Sunday and ordered three hamburgers.

"Do you want relish on them?" asked Mrs. Friedman.

"No, but I want all the money in the register," the man replied, drawing a gun.

Mrs. Friedman let him have the relish anyway—a bowlful in the face.

The gunman fled, leaving his hamburgers and Mrs. Friedman's money.

Two British Tommies Shot

FAMAGUSTA, Cyprus (U) — Two British servicemen were shot dead in Famagusta's Greek sector Sunday by a gunman who escaped.

Hundreds of British troops and police rushed to the area, set up roadblocks and began rounding up Greek youths. At one time almost 500 were held in a barbed wire enclosure, but most were released after questioning.

Hit-and-run gunmen have now killed 106 Britons since the struggle over the future of this British crown colony began. The 400,000 Cypriots of Greek descent want the island to become Greece; the 100,000 of Turkish descent resist this demand.

VATICAN CITY (U) — Pope Pius XII received several thousand persons in general audience Sunday in St. Peter's basilica.

Holmes Hints at Commutation Of Death Sentence for Killer

PORTLAND (U) — Gov. Robert D. Holmes said today there is a strong possibility he will commute the death sentence of convicted sex slayer Billy Junior Nunn.

Appearing on Tom McCall's television program "Viewpoint," the governor said he will make no definite statement until the courts have completed action on the matter.

The question was brought up by Lew Wallace of Portland who also is seeking Democratic nomination as governor. Wiley Smith, the third Democratic gubernatorial candidate, also was on the program.

Holmes said he is opposed to capital punishment on religious grounds and because he is not convinced the death penalty is a deterrent to murder.

"No, no, no" when asked if she wanted help from any relatives or friends.

Rebel Capital Taken Over By Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia (U) — Government forces have captured the rebel Sumatran capital of Bukit-tinggi. West central Sumatra was one of the last major rebel holdouts on the island.

The mountain stronghold fell Sunday 12 days after the rebels pulled out their main force and moved their headquarters to Batangkar, deeper in the Barisan mountain range.

Jakarta radio said Col. Jani, chief of the loyalist force, had called on government officials and police to return to their posts and urged rebel soldiers to surrender.

An army intelligence officer told reporters, however, he could not say yet whether any rebel leaders had been captured.

Buittingi fell a day after government forces had seized the town of Padangbandj, some 12 miles south of the capital.

The rebels lately have stepped up their activity in east Indonesia, posing President Sukarno's government with the necessity of stepping up its campaign on that side of the archipelago, 1,800 miles to the east of Central Sumatra.

'Pepper Young' Creator Dies

NEW YORK (U) — Mrs. Elaine S. Carrington, radio writer who created "Pepper Young's Family" and other daytime dramas, died Sunday at New York Hospital. She was 66.

Mrs. Carrington introduced the serial drama, known to millions as soap opera, to radio in 1933 with a three-episode evening show called "Red Davis." When her sponsor changed, the show was switched to a five-a-week afternoon spot and named "Pepper Young's Family." Mrs. Carrington worked on this serial until the time of her death.

At one time, she was writing three shows a week—each of them with five installments.

Machine Answers

BRUSSELS (U) — The U.S. pavilion at the world fair has a machine that answers historical questions from 4 B.C. to 1958 A.D.

The machine also has its own brand of humor. To visitors asking what will happen in 1959, the machine answers in the choice of 10 languages: "You will be one year older... which will also apply to every subsequent year."
