

Ex-Price Stabilizer DiSalle Picked in Ohio Primary Vote

Incumbent Republican Gov. C. William O'Neill and Democrat Michael V. DiSalle, former Toledo mayor and federal price stabilizer, were picked by Ohio primary voters today to stage a rematch of their 1956 race for the state governorship.

With 4,976 of the state's 12,499 polling places counted, O'Neill had 128,778 votes to 75,988 for

Charles P. Taft, brother of the late Sen. Robert A. Taft. DiSalle's lead for the Democratic nomination in the light primary assumed unbeatable proportions. The count near the halfway mark he led his nearest opponent, Cleveland Mayor Anthony J. Celebrezze, by more than 2-1.

In a state's Indiana primary, the state's 11 incumbent congressmen had wrapped up their parties' nominations.

Returns from 586 of the Alabama's 3,361 precincts in a Democratic contest gave Atty. Gen. John Patterson 30,221; Judge George Wallace, 27,285, and Jimmy Faulkner, a newspaper editor, 17,751.

A runoff by the two top men in June seemed assured.

Bad weather kept many voters away from the polls in the two Northern states. But rain failed to prevent a big turnout in the Alabama Democratic primary, in which 14 candidates vied for the gubernatorial nomination, equivalent to election in that traditionally Democratic state. Gov. James E. Folsom was ineligible to succeed himself under state law.

In Indiana, all nine Republican and two Democratic incumbent House members were given the edge for renomination, although two Republicans faced strong opposition.

They were Rep. Cecil M. Harden and Rep. Charles B. Brownson. Mrs. Harden was favored to win over Robert S. Webb, and Brownson over David C. Bruce. Six incumbents, including Republican Charles A. Halleck, were unopposed.

Indiana voters also chose delegates to the two parties' state conventions in June, which will nominate candidates for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Republican William E. Jenner.

Alabama's indicated record vote followed a noisy campaign in which each of the 14 aspirants to the governorship favored a continuation of racial segregation while differing by degree. Some advocated closing schools facing possible integration. Others promised to fight to keep them open on a separate but equal basis.

Mrs. Daniel A. Poling, president of the American Mothers Committee, Inc., announced the selection of Mrs. Coker at the opening of the annual Mothers' Conference at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

Mrs. Coker, 68, will be honored along with mothers from each state at the committee's annual awards luncheon at the Waldorf Friday. She will lead a delegation of mothers to the World's Fair in Brussels next week, and will later meet Queen Juliana of the Netherlands and attend functions in France.

A soft spoken, self-effacing woman, Mrs. Coker was reluctant to give advice on the rearing of children or to tell large cities how to cope with teen-age crime.

"I don't want to be an authority," she told newsmen.

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Woman Gets 20 Years

SHELTON, Wash. (AP) — Mrs. Lorraine Fay Storer, 25, who was convicted of manslaughter two weeks ago in connection with the beating death of her 2½-year-old adopted son, Wesley, last September, Tuesday was sentenced to serve a maximum of 20 years in prison.

Superior Judge Charles T. Wright also fined Mrs. Storer \$1,000, suspended. Her actual prison term will be determined by the State Board of Prison Terms and Paroles.

Mrs. Storer was accused of killing the boy by throwing him repeatedly against the floor and other objects. She told authorities the boy had refused to obey her commands that he pick up his toys.

Baker Man Killed by Car

BAKER, Ore. (AP) — Howard Harrison Hull was struck and killed by a car as he walked along a Baker street Tuesday.

Police said the 69-year-old Baker man was hurled about 70 feet after the car struck him.

The driver of the car, police said, was Bill Crawford, 70, Baker.

It was Oregon's 119th traffic fatality of the year in the Associated Press tabulation. Two have perished in May.

Ike Aims Plea for Foreign Aid, Military Shakeup Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower said Tuesday night vigorous Republican support of his controversial defense reorganization, foreign aid and world trade programs offers a way for the party to capture control of Congress.

Addressing applauding GOP members of the House and Senate, the President said prospects for taking over control from the Democrats in the November elections are bright. He stressed a need for vigorous leadership to meet the Communist threat "in a situation of balanced terror in the world."

As for the political campaign, Eisenhower pledged his support to every GOP congressional candidate "who carries forward the never ending fight for peace, for security, for sound, sane and progressive government in America."

At no point did he specifically say he would reserve his support for those who backed such administration projects as the Pentagon reorganization, world trade and foreign aid programs. But there was speculation that he had in

Kentucky Flood Threat Grows

PIKEVILLE, Ky. (AP) — National Guardsmen and volunteers Tuesday night began evacuating families as the rain-swollen Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River rose two feet over flood stage.

The river, rising at the rate of 14 inches an hour, threatened a repeat performance of the disastrous floods which hit this area last spring.

The first evacuations were from the low-lying areas. Water in some streets was knee deep.

Last year's flood here caused more than \$8 million dollars damage in the city and county and resulted in three deaths.

Panama Wants Own Flag Flying Over Canal Zone

PANAMA (AP) — Panama took steps Tuesday to get its flag raised in the U.S.-run Canal Zone.

President Ernesto de la Guardia Jr. instructed the foreign office to confer with the National Council on Foreign Relations to decide the best way to open negotiations.

De la Guardia promised a student demonstration Monday night that his government would take such action. The students had paraded to the palace with Panamanian flags they placed in the Canal Zone Friday in what they called "Operation Sovereignty."

U.S. authorities had sent back the flags.

NATO Nations United on Plan For Summit Talk

COPENHAGEN (AP) — The NATO foreign ministers Tuesday established a solid front on summit talks by agreeing that Secretary of State Dulles was right all along in his cautious approach.

A diplomatic source said Russia's recent maneuvers "have opened the eyes of many Europeans." He reported a marked change in Western thinking since the North Atlantic Council meeting in Paris last December.

Now, the informant said, not one of America's allies believes it wise to rush to top-level meetings with the Russians.

All agreed during two days of consultations here that any summit meeting must be adequately prepared and must show in advance some prospect of East-West agreement on a basic point of world tension.

That is what Dulles has insisted on from the start. But last December, in the wake of the Soviet Sputnik launchings, some of the NATO members seemed disposed to try out the summit idea regardless.

The latest Soviet note on summit preparations created little stir in the NATO Council. French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau said it contained "absolutely no new element."

7 Idaho Falls Officers Held For Burglary

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP) — Seven members of the Idaho Falls police force were charged with burglary today.

The seven made up almost the entire night shift of the city's police force of more than 40 men.

Police Chief A. L. Cramer, City Atty. Arthur Smith of Bonneville, and County Prosecuting Atty. Edward W. Pike said that under questioning all seven admitted they had participated in the looting of business firms and a model home.

The seven, all of whom were in jail, are:

Lt. Marvin Jorgensen, patrolman Leroy Fowler, William Decker, Reno Barbisan, Don Jenkins, Joe Moser and John L. Crook.

Five of them, Jorgensen, Decker, Barbisan, Jenkins and Moser, were arraigned today on charges of first degree burglary. Police Magistrate Jack G. Voshell set their bail at \$10,000 each.

Chief Cramer said the investigation failed to show any of the men tried to sell the loot. He said they took most of it home for their own use.

North Umpqua Projects Open for Bids Until May 21

PORTLAND (AP) — Grading and bridge construction on the North Umpqua Highway will be open for bids until May 21, the Bureau of Public Roads said Tuesday.

The projects will be located about 52 miles east of Roseburg. B. M. French, regional engineer, said the grading will cover 2.5 miles and the bridge will be 95-foot reinforced concrete girder type.

Tong War Threat Fades

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Chinatown put away its hatchets and sublime place reigned over the tongs that had been about to go to war.

The show, directed by student Myra Wilson, drew more than 1,000 persons with 200 more being turned away, school officials said.

Astronomer Soars to 40,000 Feet In Big Balloon for Look at Heavens

CROSBY, Minn. (AP) — A giant balloon launched from an open pitflight represented a milestone in the history of astronomy Tuesday as an astronomer went much higher than the earth's atmosphere for an open-air look at the heavens in observation.

The first heavenly body being observed was the planet Jupiter.

With scientist Alfred H. Mike, 44, was Cmdr. Malcolm D. Ross, veteran Navy balloonist who last year reached a height of 84,000 feet in a balloon-borne sealed gondola launched from the same site. Mike, astronomer at the U.S. Naval Observatory in Washington, is the father of eight children.

The Navy said it probably would come down sometime Wednesday morning in the vicinity of Dubuque, Iowa.

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Marion, Linn Groups Okeh Proposal for Consolidation

Agreement was reached Tuesday evening by Marion and Linn County School District Reorganization Committees that Detroit, Mill City and Gates school districts should be combined into a single administrative unit.

Warren Stoll, Detroit School District member, voiced an opinion that residents of the area would be opposed to the three-way combination. Detroit has voted four previous consolidation attempts, officials said.

Both committees agreed Tuesday that an unclaimed sparsely populated 40-square mile area in northeast Linn County should be included in the Detroit district.

A previous Linn County suggestion that the east three-quarters of Marion-Linn district be included is opposed by Marion County.

A Marion County proposal that Jefferson district be extended south about two miles into the Scramble Hill district of Linn County was opposed strongly by the Linn County committee.

The extension is unacceptable mainly because of problems of industrial growth expected in the area, officials said.

Another meeting of the two committees is expected.
