

Moose Out Indefinitely

May Be Put on Disabled Roster

NEW YORK (AP)—Bill (Moose) Skowron, the bruising but often bristled first baseman of the New York Yankees, remained "awfully uncomfortable" at Lenox Hill Hospital Monday and worried club officials were debating whether to place him on the disabled list.

Yankee doctor Sydney Gaynor said he could not give an accurate estimate as to how long Skowron, who tore a muscle in his back Sunday, would be out of the lineup. All indications pointed to the slugger being sidelined for a minimum of three weeks.

Bob Fishel, club public relations director, said Skowron would remain in the hospital for at least three more days and then he would be forced to wear a specially fitted corset for another week. He could not say when Skowron would rejoin the team.

"The doctor had nothing new to report on Skowron's condition," Fishel said, "except to say that Bill is awfully uncomfortable. It is too early to tell just how serious is the injury, but if we find that he won't be able to play for at least three weeks, there is a possibility he might be placed on the disabled list. That would mean he could not play for 30 days. We should know soon."

Fishel said X-rays showed no vertebrae break as was originally feared. The injury was diagnosed as a simple muscle tear in the upper left lumbar region. It has no connection with the dislocated sacroiliac Skowron suffered last season in his new home.

The off-injured Skowron sustained his latest mishap during the fourth inning of the second game of Sunday's doubleheader with Washington. With runners on first and third, Clint Courtney hit a bouncer down the first base line and Skowron, fielding the grounder, fell in a crumpled, anguished heap right by the bag.

He gloved the ball and was able to roll over just enough to tag the bag for the out. But he couldn't get up. Teammates helped him to his feet but he couldn't walk and had to be carried off the field on a stretcher and taken to a hospital.

"Nestor Chylak, the first base umpire, said he heard a terrific pop," Fishel said, "and it was feared at first he had cracked his vertebrae. But it was just his muscle tearing."

Fangio Will Drive Novi

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—World auto racing champion Juan Manuel Fangio of Argentina switched cars at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Monday and stepped into one of the nearly legendary Novi Specials.

Fangio told owners of the Dayton Steel Foundry Special he was dropping out of their car and will try to qualify one of the two Novis for the 500-mile race May 30.

Although long regarded as the fastest pieces of machinery at the track, the Novis have been dogged by bad luck and never have won a Memorial Day classic. This year they come powered with new eight-cylinder engines with two spark-plugs for each cylinder.

Speedway entries are by cars, not drivers, and it is not uncommon for drivers to change entries right up to race time. Mike McGill of Haddonfield, N.J., will replace Fangio in the Dayton car. He qualified the same auto last year but crashed on the 101st lap.

Pilot Surprised

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Are the Pittsburgh Pirates playing over their heads and surprising even their manager?

Manager Danny Murtaugh just grins and doesn't answer the first part of your question. But steady Danny frankly admits he's surprised by the 15-9 record which has carried the Pirates into a second place tie, only one game off the pace set by defending champion Milwaukee.

"Sure, I'm surprised by the kind of ball we're playing," Murtaugh said today. "A lot of people are surprised and I hope we can keep on surprising them."

The Pirates, off to a so-so start in the opening days, got their winning ways on their first long road trip when they compiled a 9-5 record. Since their return home they've gotten a four-game series from the Philadelphia Phillies.

"We've gotten good pitching, a real outstanding defense, timely hitting," Murtaugh reflected. "That's a good combination. And we've had a different here just about every day."

Bench strength has much to do with the Pirate surge. Roman Mejias took over for centerfielder Bill Virdon one day when Virdon suffered a knee injury. Mejias hit 3 homers to wreck the San Francisco Giants.

Ted Kuszewski, the hulking first baseman obtained from the Cincinnati Redlegs, is hitting only .240 but his home run bat has come back to life. He now has four homers and has driven in 12 runs. Taking over for big Klau at first occasionally and stepping in as a pinch hitter is R. C. Stevens, a 24-year-old Negro who played last year with Columbus.

Stevens already has captured the fancy of Pirate fans. He's hitting .286 and 3 of his hits have won extra-inning games.

How far will the Pirates go under steady Danny Murtaugh? "I'm not making predictions," Murtaugh said. "I'll tell you can get in trouble that way. But maybe we'll keep on surprising everyone."

Others Show Improvement

NEW YORK (AP)—Mickey Vernon of Cleveland and Ted Kuszewski of Pittsburgh are heading an imposing list of major leaguers who are making spirited comebacks in the 1958 baseball season.

Vernon, 40-year-old first baseman, hit only 241 for Boston in 1957 and the two-time American League batting champ was expected to be used only as a pinch-hitter when the Indians acquired him during the winter.

But a broken leg suffered by Vic Wertz, Cleveland's regular first sacker, thrust Vernon into the postfield and the veteran has come through handsomely. Mickey is hitting .273 with two home runs and 10 runs batted in.

Kuszewski, who missed most of last season because of back trouble, started off slowly for the Pirates. But he has hit safely in his last seven games and wallowed four homers in his last four games. He has lifted his average to .340 with 12 runs batted in.

Among the other players showing improvement over their 1957 performances are Harvey Kuenn of Detroit, Jack Harshman of Baltimore, Pete Runnels of Boston and Bobby Avila of Cleveland.

Kuenn slumped to .277 last year after winding up with a solid .332 average in 1956. His current percentage is .347. Harvey also has made a successful switch from shortstop to centerfield.

Harshman compiled an 8-3 hitting mark for the Chicago White Sox last season. But Baltimore manager Paul Richards decided to take a chance on the left-hander who has been plagued by a chronic back condition. And the gamble paid off. Harshman has won five games and has yet to be beaten.

Runnels, a .230 batter with Washington last year after putting a .310 mark in 1956, has come back to post a current .326 average with the Red Sox. He filled the first base position adequately before moving to second base when the club traded Ken Aspromonte to Washington two weeks ago.

Avila, the American League batting champion with a .341 average in 1954, has hit no higher than .272 since then. His 1958 figure is .313.

Pitchers Ned Garver of Kansas City and Billy Hoft of Detroit also are moving smartly along the comeback trail. Each has won three games and lost one. Garver, a 20-game winner with the St. Louis Browns in 1951, had a 6-13 record last season. Hoft won 20 in 1956 but tumbled off to a 9-11 mark in the following campaign.

ROME (AP)—Australian veteran Mervyn Rose overpowered the strong defense of Chilean Luis Ayala 6-4, 4-6, 16-14, 6-1 Monday in the men's semi-finals of the Italian International Tennis Championships.

The marathon match was one of the most exciting played on Rome's red clay courts in the eight days since the tournament began.

Rose, second seeded in the tournament and ranked as the sixth best amateur in the world, will meet Italian Nicola Pietrangeli in the finals Tuesday.

Britain's Shirley Bloomer and Christine Truman won the women's doubles title by beating the Australian pair of Mary Hawton and Thelma Long, 6-3, 6-2.

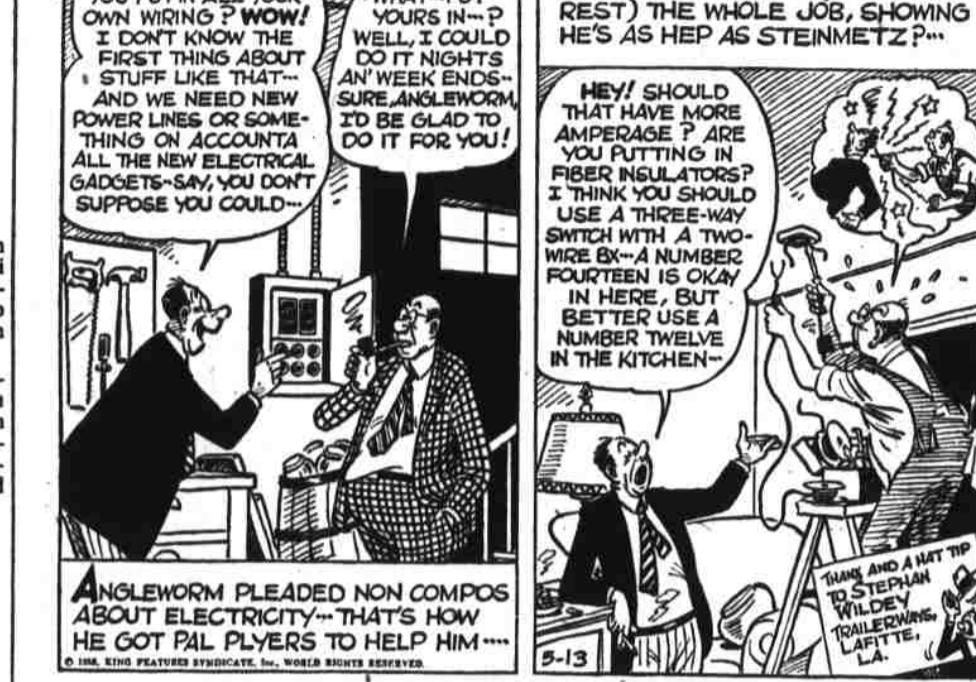

Auto racing is normally a strictly-for-the-men game, and it requires heavy cars at that.

But such won't be the entire case at Hollywood Bowl here Saturday night when the modified souped-up hard tops make their first appearance of the 1958 season. One female pilot will be in the field of entries, and if her debut at Portland some two weeks ago is any indication, she'll make it tough on the rough and rugged male hard-toppers.

She is Laverne Cavitt, of Portland, and she has a full membership in the Modified Hard Top Racing Association. In her debut she was doing splendidly until motor trouble forced her out of the action.

"Miss Cavitt will have a new and better car for her efforts in Salem Saturday," Valley Sports promoter Ron Al reported yesterday. "She's really keen on this thing."

All will have upwards of 25 of the swiftest here Saturday for their first appearance. One of them will be driven by Cecil Hunt, of Eugene, the 1957 Northwest modified hard top champion. He'll be accompanied by other entries from Portland, Vancouver, Seattle, Eugene and Roseburg.

The modified hard tops are not to be mistaken for the Capital Auto Racing Association's species. The modifieds are equipped with full racing motors that buzz up to speeds of over 100 miles per hour. The CARA cars are in no way "souped."

Saturday's card gets started with time trials at 7:30 p.m. The races commence at 8:30.

Kepler Flubs Big Chance

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP)—A member of the 1952 and 1956 Olympic wrestling teams, Del Kepler, flubbed his change to take over first place in the singles division of the American Bowling Congress tournament in dramatic fashion Monday.

The 40-year-old printing salesman opened his singles series with games of 247 and 279, a towering two-game combination of 526. Impaglazzo needed only 202 in the finale to unseat Don Phelps of Minneapolis, who has reigned in the singles since April 10 with 727.

NEW YORK (AP)—Dan Hodge, the Olympic wrestler turned boxer, made news Tuesday on several counts.

1. He officially announced he has entered the pro fight ranks.

2. He doesn't want to fight heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson. Not this year, anyway.

3. He would like to fight Pete Rademacher, the 1956 Olympic heavyweight champion, who has had a one-fight pro career. Bidding Pete was knocked out in the sixth round by Patterson in a title fight last Aug. 22.

4. George Gainford, longtime advisor to Sugar Ray Robinson, has been hired by Hodge's backers to teach the boxing tyro.

"I made up my mind to turn pro about three weeks ago," said Hodge, a former college and National AAU wrestling champion while at Oklahoma. "I think I can go places. I sure want to give it a try."

A member of the 1952 and 1956 Olympic wrestling teams, Hodge became a boxer only about seven months ago. He won all 17 of his amateur bouts, 12 of them by knockout. In his last Simon Pure scrap, he knocked out Charley Hood of Washington in the second round to win the national Golden Gloves championship at Madison Square Garden.
