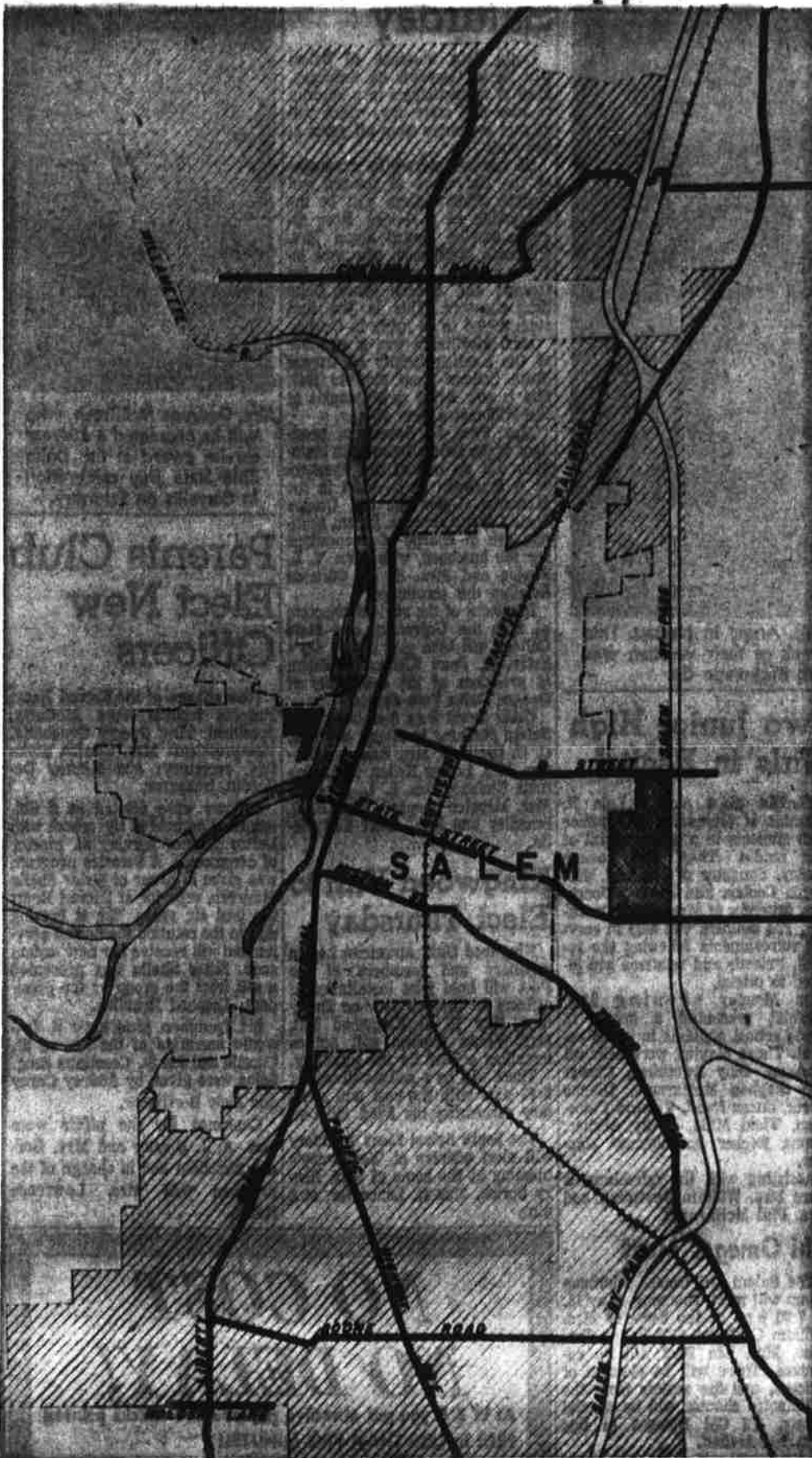

Voters to Decide Zoning Matters



Facing voters Friday will be acceptance or rejection of two separate zoning and two separate annexation measures. The areas involved in each is outlined by this map. Zoning areas, diagonal lines, are bounded in north by precincts 78 and 83 and in south by precincts 168 and 51. Annexation areas, crisscross lines, include "figure 7" in west Salem and parts of precincts 57, 58 and 64 east of Salem adjacent to Salem Bypass. Annexation of Two Areas Also Major Issues Friday

Two zoning measures affecting areas both north and south and south of Salem, and two annexation measures, one for a 110-acre area east of Salem and the other for a 30-acre piece in West Salem, will be among important issues facing voters in Friday's primary election.

The East Salem annexation area includes parts of precincts 57, 58 and 64. Whether it will become part of Salem is entirely up to the 418 people who live in the area. They will vote on the annexation at a special polling place, 1047 Vinyard Ave. NE. The area is bounded by D Street, Salem Bypass, State Street and east city limits.

The West Salem annexation area, a figure seven-shaped piece between Wallace Marine Park and Wallace Road, in precinct 44, is surrounded by the corporate limits of Salem so must be annexed by a majority vote of all Salem residents. This differs from the east annexation area where only the people in the proposed area have the right to say whether they wish to join the city or not. About 30 people live in the seven-shaped area.

No Tie to Annexation

The zoning measures, which have nothing to do with annexation, would safeguard against establishment of undesirable business or industry in residential areas and places where such business would not benefit adjacent property owners.

The proposed zoning areas include 21 precincts inhabited by well over 15,000 people. Included in the north are 10 precincts in the general area of Keizer and McNary Corners. Some 11 precincts in the Liberty, Salem Heights, Morningside, South Village and Pringle areas, are included in the proposed South zoning area.

It is entirely up to the people within these areas to accept or reject the zoning measure. Each

area will vote separate of the other, that is, acceptance of zoning in one area will not depend on the vote in the other. One or both areas can accept or reject the measure.

Boundary of North Area

The extremity of the proposed south zoning area is bounded by precincts 68 and 51 and includes voters in Marion County precincts numbered 45 through 53 and 167 through 169.

Extremity of the north area is bounded by precincts 78 and 83 and includes voters in precincts 72 through 79 and 81 and 83.

Residents of the proposed annexation areas who favor joining the city have received support from Salem Planning Commission, City Council and Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Establishment of the zoning areas has received avid support from Willamette Valley Planning Council, Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce and several service clubs.

If the zoning measures are passed they would empower the county court to set up regulations governing certain land uses in the areas.
