## Cooperative Pays Half-Million To Nut Growers for '57 Crop

More than \$500,000 will have been paid out to members of the Salem Nut Growers Cooperative for the 1957 crop when the present market season is completed, Glenn Hansberry, cooperative manager, said Monday.

Of this amount, all but \$60,000 has already been paid. The remainder may be paid shortly, Hansberry expected.

Although the open filbert market dropped to 12 cents a pound when the crop was 60 per cent harvested, the Cooperative has held steady at more than the 15 1/2 cents at which the market opened. Cash payout

for filberts at the Cooperative has been 15.59 cents a pound. Further book allocated credits will bring the total filbert crop proceeds to 15.87 cents a pound.

Walnuts have held in the open market at around 20 cents a pound, although cash payout to the cooperative growers has been 20.67 a pound to date.

## GOP Primary Candidates To Make Appeals Tonight

Republican candidates for political offices in Friday's primary election will make their last major public appeal to voters in this area at two activities tonight.

All Republican candidates for office, plus those running for non-partisan posts, will participate in a mass rally at 8 o'clock at the Senator Hotel. Aspirants to state, county and congressional office will speak briefly.

Earlier tonight, at 7 o'clock, at Baxter Hall on the Willamette University campus the six Republican candidates to the office of Marion County commissioner will engage in a panel discussion.

Otto Wilson Jr. will moderate the panel on county problems. The activity is sponsored by the Willamette University Young Republican Club and is open to the public.

It also was reported that U. S. Rep. Walter Norblad, in the state since last Thursday campaigning for re-election, will pause briefly from 3:30 to 4:30 p. m. today at his Salem downtown headquarters to greet visitors before leaving for Washington.

## Petition Asks Plant Site on Hines Street

A petition seeking to convert approximately an acre of residential property to light industrial land on the south side of Hines Street SE will come before the Salem Planning Commission at their regular meeting this evening.

The petition has been submitted by Leo N. Childs, 320 14th St. NE, in an attempt to change the acre from R1 to M1 for use as a possible light industrial plant site.

Also scheduled for consideration is a report on a petition from Ralph Maddy, Salem real estate salesman, for rezoning of an area near Commercial Street for the building of a 15-unit court.

A report will be presented on the proposed expansion of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints at Madison and 5th streets, which also needs rezoning approval.

SUBLIMITY—Jacob Schmitt, 77, died unexpectedly at his home here Monday morning from what was apparently a heart attack. He had lived in the Sublimity area since 1891.

## Ruling Explains Obligations of District Attorney

The district attorney has no duty or authority under state statutes to represent a former public official in a form of action arising out of contract, according to Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton.

Thornton rendered the opinion Monday on request of Leo Smith, District Attorney of Multnomah County.

Thornton pointed out: "In the absence of any statute, such as ORS 8.690, there is no duty upon a county or other governmental unit to provide counsel for one of its public officials in the defense of a tort claim."

"It will be observed in the language of ORS 8.690 that the duty of the district attorney to defend county officers is limited to actions 'for an alleged wrongful act or omission in the performance of his official duty.'"
