Funds Okehed For Mid-Valley Urban Planning

A \$12,500 planning grant for mid-Willamette Valley urban planning was approved Friday by the Urban Renewal Administration at Washington. Associated Press reported.

The amount will be matched by an additional \$12,500 from Marion County, Polk County, City of Salem and Salem School District political subdivisions.

The money, which had been expected by planners, will be used to complete basic planning studies, such as updating maps and land use charts, before specific planning projects are started, said Robert Powell, chairman of the Mid-Willamette Valley Planning Council.

Two additional employees will be hired by the council, probably a planning engineer draftsman and a part-time stenographer, Powell said.

Planning to be carried out with the money includes population and growth, traffic, transportation, soil, drainage and public utilities studies.

Payroll Tax Increase to Become Payable in July

It is apparent that a 2.7 blanket payroll tax against Oregon employers will become payable in July to replenish the sagging unemployment trust fund, Mrs. Cecilia Gale, State Unemployment Compensation Commission chairman, said Friday.

"Unless an immediate lawsuit is filed to test the correctness of Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton's opinion and the commission is enjoined from applying the rate, it will go into effect," she said.

Thornton ruled Wednesday that the state had no authority to borrow \$14,000,000 from the federal government to keep the unemployment fund above the \$314 million mark when the 2.7 rate is applied by law.

The fund is now at \$26,106,881, said Mrs. Gale.

The 2.7 rate is over twice the average being paid. Rates vary from .6 to 2.7 per cent. Some businesses will be charged nine times as much as last year if the 2.7 rate is applied.

The higher tax rate is effective as of April 1, but employers won't be billed until July.

Businesses with a low employment turnover rate, such as banks, newspapers and wholesale businesses are normally favored by lower rates.

As yet there has been no indication that a lawsuit testing Thornton's opinion will be filed, Mrs. Gale said.

Frame, Roof of Scout Office Go Up Today

The frame and roof of Salem's \$40,000 Boy Scout headquarters will be put up in a one-day "barn raising" today by some 25 skilled union workers and other volunteers.

Volunteers from Salem and Albany will start about 8 o'clock this morning putting up the framework. By late afternoon they hope to have completed the shell and inner roof of the new Cascade Area Council headquarters at Cottage and Bellevue Streets SE.

Union workers will be from Carpenters' Local No. 1065 under Russell Flawn, business agent; and Building Laborers' Local No. 441, under Alfred Chivers. Other volunteers will also take part in the mass project, according to E. E. Batterman, general contractor in charge of the construction.

Mastodon's Bones Found In California

SANTA MARIA, Calif. (AP) — A partial skeleton of a mastodon, the huge, elephant-like creature that roamed the United States during the ice age, has been found near Santa Maria.

Phil C. Orr, a curator at the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History, said it is only the third mastodon skeleton to be unearthed on the West Coast. He estimated its age between 12,000 and 15,000 years.

Orr described it as "a very fine specimen and an important scientific discovery."

The discovery was actually made last January in a coastal canyon 10 miles from here but announcement was withheld until Friday so that excavation of the skeleton could be completed, Orr said.

He and his museum associates moved tons of earth by hand to uncover the bones, which were first found by a rock hunter, Thomas McGregor of Santa Maria. McGregor noticed a tusk and another bone protruding from a canyon wall.

Orr said a skull four feet long and three feet high, jaw bones, tusks, a shoulder blade, half a pelvis and several ribs and vertebrae were recovered. It had been covered by approximately 150 feet of earth, he said.

The mastodon, a native American animal, stood about 11 or 12 feet tall, the height of Jumbo, largest African elephant ever captured. It was slightly smaller than the mammoth, which roamed the earth during the same period.

Navy Planes Collide; Death Toll at Three

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Two Navy planes, a jet fighter and a photo reconnaissance plane, smashed together in flight near the mouth of the St. Johns River Friday and at least three lives were lost.

The Navy said the fighter pilot ejected himself from his F9F8 Cougar jet and was picked up by a Navy rescue plane.

The Navy said four persons — the normal complement — were aboard the photo reconnaissance ship. The bodies of three have been recovered and searchers are still looking for the fourth, listed as missing.

Navy helicopters and surface rescue crews rushed to the area north of the St. Johns River on Little Talbot Island, one of a series of islands some 20 miles east of Jacksonville.

The Navy jet pilot was identified as Lt. J. G. David McCutley, 24, based at nearby Cecil Field. He was reported in good condition.

The Navy had no explanation how the planes collided. Nor could McCutley, whose home is in Garden City, N. Y., say what happened.

John Kovach Found Dead

John Kovach, 69, of 265 McNary Ave. NW, died Friday, apparently of a heart attack. He was found in his car in the 600 block of Chemetka Street NE.

Kovach came to the U.S. from Yugoslavia at the age of 16. A warehouseman for Fitzmaurice & Son, for the past five years, he had previously worked 20 years for Chandler Brown Equipment Co.

He is survived by relatives in Yugoslavia. Arrangements are pending at Clough-Barrick Funeral Home.
