

# Saxons Win Sub-District Track Meet

ALBANY (Special) — South Salem's powerful Saxons coasted to a 40-point victory in the sub-district 8 A-1 track meet here Wednesday night and sent 20 qualifiers into the district meet this weekend at Corvallis.

The Saxons compiled 158 1/2 points to 116 for runner-up North Salem. Corvallis was third with 79. Lebanon had 38 1/2, Albany 27, and Sweet Home 14 1/2.

South went into Wednesday's events with a 35 1/2 to 3 lead over North. The Saxons built that up in the high jump, pole vault, and broad jump finals Tuesday, but still managed to extend their lead by 10 points during the final day.

Marks generally were good, but three stood out above the rest.

Wednesday. The biggest surprise of the meet was turned in by about 10 yards in 2:04, and Jim Sweet Home's unheralded Nikki Litchfield of North was third. Clark, who came out of nowhere Denny Pieters of South broke to win the 800 in 2:01.1. South's own city shot put record with a heave of 50-10 1/2 to win that event easily. His old record of 50-2 1/2 was set earlier this year.

The other standout performance came in the high hurdles, where Corvallis' John Coleman toured the route in 15.4. Bob Bartlett of South pushed him all the way, and Albany's favored Elmo Keck was third.

Dan Moore turned in the outstanding mark of the meet Tuesday however, with a 23-7 leap to win the broad jump. That was nine inches better than the existing state record of 22-10.

# Solons Win 2-1 in 11th

## Kindsfather Gets 3rd Win of Year

KENNEWICK, Wash. (Special)—Salem was out-hit 10 to 6 and committed four errors, but veteran pitcher Vern Kindsfather proved stingy in the pinches here, Wednesday night, as the Senators nipped Tri-City 2-1 in 11 innings.

In the process of taking a two-one edge in the series, the Solons handed the Braves' top reliever pitcher Joe Drotar his first defeat of the year against four victories. The two clubs close out their action here Thursday night with Tom Flynn (3-3) to hurl for Salem. This will wind up the Senators' 11-game road trip, and they return to Waterfront Park Friday night to host Yakima.

Kindsfather was nursing a 1-0 lead—provided by Cal Bauer's 300-foot homer in the sixth frame—until the eighth inning rolled around. Then Tri-City evened the score when Ray Looney parked his third hit of the evening, a double off the rightfield boards and Frank Williams singled him home.

That's the way things stood until Denny Peterson opened the Salem 11th by beating out a bunt down the firstbase line. But Roy Parker, the Senators' leading RBI man, parked a double to left-center which chased Peterson home with the winning run. Bauer was thrown out at the plate attempting to score also.

Tri-City made a belated bid in their half of the 11th on singles by Len Lindborg and Jack Riley. They both moved up a base on Jerry Gregg's fielding error, but Kindsfather stiffened to get the final batter, Roy Stodler, on a bounce out.

Bauer, with three hits including his first homer of the campaign, and Parker with two safeties were practically the whole Salem batting attack. Kindsfather fanned seven and walked but one in registering his third victory.

# Beats Ballarin Durelle in Fight Win

## YMCA Sports Awards Due

MONTREAL (AP)—Yvon Durelle, the fighting fisherman from Baie Ste. Anne, New Brunswick pounded out a 10-round unanimous decision over Germain Ballarin of France Wednesday night. Durelle out-weighted his opponent 178 1/2 to 171 1/2 pounds.

Durelle was in command almost from the start of the televised fight as he chalked up his 73rd victory in 94 outings.

A left hook to Ballarin's body in the eighth round sent the Canadian far out in front. And in the 10th he floored the Frenchman for the mandatory count of eight with another left to the jaw.

The fight was the second that has been beamed from outside the country into the United States. The first was Joe Brown's one-round knockout in a non-title lightweight match at Havana, Feb. 28.

Durelle, Canadian and British Empire light heavyweight champion, made the fight all the way against the back-peddaling Frenchman.

The fight drew approximately 7,000 in the Montreal Forum.

Ballarin had a clear-cut margin in only one round—the fifth—when his left caught Durelle over the right eye. Durelle was bleeding for the remainder of the round, but from there on Ballarin was unable to open the cut again although he kept shooting with lefts.

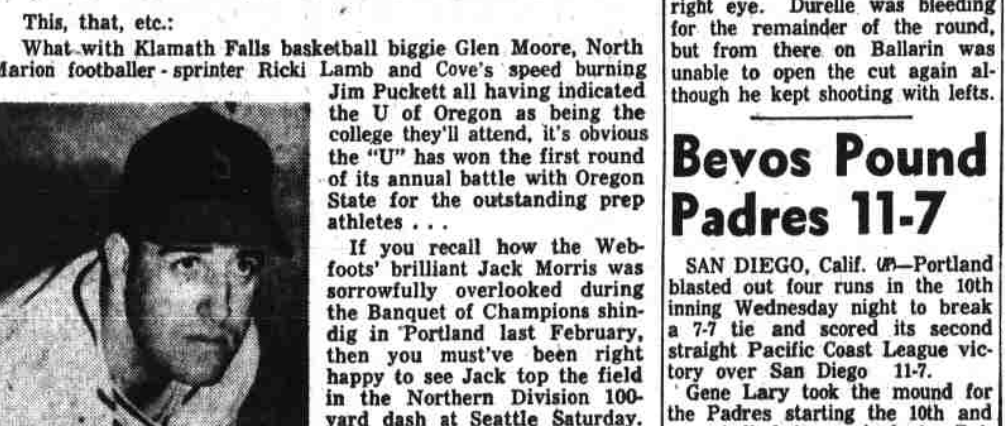
# Savage-Sakata-Sasaki Team Wins
