

# Court Orders Delaware to Make Prompt Plans to Integrate Schools

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals Wednesday upheld a District Court decree and ordered prompt submission of a plan for racial integration of public schools in Delaware.

Warning the State Board of Education and the state superintendent of public instruction that they "stand in danger of contempt proceedings," the blunt opinion written by Chief Judge John Biggs said state officials "may not delay further in the formulation and submission of such a plan . . . the time for hesitation is past and the time for definitive action has arrived."

"The law of the Supreme Court of the United States must be obeyed," Biggs wrote.

The single opinion disposed of seven similar appeals filed by the state board, the state superintendent, and the members of seven local school boards in Kent and Sussex counties.

In two separate rulings in 1957, the U.S. District Court in Delaware acted favorably on the seven summary judgments requested by parents of Negro children in the various school districts. The court ordered the local boards to submit to state officials within 30 days a plan for integration and gave the state an added 30 days in which to submit its plan to the court. The lower court also ordered the state officials to draw up a plan for integration of the entire state and to send copies to all segregated districts within 45 days thereafter. The target date for integration was set for the autumn term of 1957.

In the course of subsequent litigation and the current appeal, the plans were never drawn. Wednesday's opinion ordered the lower court to set a new date for the prompt submission of the plans for integration.

# Veteran's Memorial Funds Go to 4 Clubs

After more than 10 years of legal battles, the Veteran's Living Memorial Building Association, Inc., has finally set-up its memorial—though not the club building it started some 12 years ago.

Ten thousand dollars, all that is left of some \$40,000 it had raised in the late '40s for its ill-fated building, were given Wednesday to four Salem youth organizations: YMCA, YWCA and Boy Scouts each received \$3,000, and the Girl Scouts \$1,000, according to James Beard, chairman of a citizens advisory committee for the Memorial Association.

Hoping to build a war memorial, several members of the Salem Disabled American Veterans chapter formed a corporation in 1946 to collect money and erect a meeting place for veterans groups at the northeast corner of Marion and Church streets.

Lack of funds and internal DAV legal disputes halted construction in 1947 with the foundation, plumbing and floor complete and portions of the wall up. Court costs, legal fees and other expenses reduced the amount to about \$10,000. The Oregon Supreme Court gave the final ruling in the dispute last November.

"The money is now clear and we wanted to do the most with it we could," Beard said.

He said he is "very glad" the money would find good use after so many years.

"Living War Memorial" plaques will be put up by the four organizations in their own buildings.

# Jobless Pay Bill Sent to White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate passed and sent to the White House Wednesday a bill authorizing federal advances to the states to finance a temporary extension of unemployment benefits. The vote was 80-0.

The legislation, somewhat modified by the House from the form requested by President Eisenhower, nevertheless had administration backing as a way of easing the recession's impact.

It permits the federal government to advance funds to the states to extend by as much as one-half the number of weeks in which workers eligible for unemployment insurance may draw benefits.

# Ike Believes Recession Dip About Spent

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said Wednesday the downward force of the recession is largely spent and does not justify a federal tax reduction.

Eisenhower showed as much concern over price rises as over the business slump. The latter he was weathering well, he told his news conference, but persistent inflation can lead us into "very, very serious trouble."

The President deplored any attempt at wage-price control as being incompatible with the free economy. Yet if inflation continues, "something will have to be done, sure," he said.

"I don't know what the government can do," he admitted, "as long as it insists upon the freedom of an economy to establish its own wage and price levels."

As one stabilizing approach, Eisenhower called for sanity in spending on military programs. The country has recovered from the atmosphere of urgency and crisis generated by Russia's Sputniks and the onset of recession, he said. Now it can examine critically every dollar spent on defense — and, he added, achieve economies by reorganizing the Pentagon.

# AF Launches Jet Without Using Runway

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Air Force said Wednesday it has rocketed an F100D Super Sabre jet into flight without a runway.

The "zero - length launching" was achieved at Edwards Air Force Base on the Mojave Desert north of Los Angeles.

Gen. O.P. Weyland, tactical air commander, said fighter bombers now can be launched from hidden remote sites, untroubled by the presence of runways.

Using its own engine, plus the kick of a 130,000-pound rocket, the jet accelerated to 270 mph in an hour in less than four seconds.

Forty-foot flames hissed from the plane's tail as North American test pilot Al Blackburn, former Marine infantry officer, guided it aloft.

# Hearst's Wife Gets Divorce

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—The fifth wife of George R. Hearst, eldest son of the late publisher, William Randolph Hearst, obtained a divorce Wednesday.

The decree granted on a charge of mental cruelty by Mrs. Collette Lyons Hearst, 43, former New York stage comedienne, ended more than two years of litigation. Attorneys for Hearst, 54, did not contest Wednesday's proceedings.

The court giving a property settlement giving Mrs. Hearst \$50,000 cash and an equity in a Beverly Hills residence on condition that she waive claims to alimony and an interest in a Hearst trust from which George Hearst receives much of his income.

# 2 Girls Viciously Beat Classmate at School

PITTSFIELD, Mass. (AP) — Two teen-age girls, neither weighing more than 70 pounds, face court action in the vicious beating of their petite classmate, Patricia White, 13.

A ruptured kidney was removed from Patricia Tuesday shortly after a fight which authorities said occurred in a washroom at South Junior High School. Pittsfield General Hospital listed Patricia's condition as fair.

Police Capt. Camille Marcel identified the girls only as a 4-foot, 70-pound, 13-year-old eighth grader and a 4-5, 70-pound 15-year-old high school freshman. Both, members of good families, were expelled by School Supt. Edward J. Russell.

The captain said his investigation showed that the fight stemmed from a name-calling incident three weeks ago. He said Patricia's alleged assailants would be arraigned in Juvenile Court at a time dependent on the White girl's recovery. Neither was jailed.

Patricia's father, Irving M. White, a General Electric Co. clerk, said his daughter, who also is a 70-pounder and 4 feet in height, had been the target of a tough gang of girls at the school for four months. He said the fight began when Patricia refused to obey an order of a girl.

Both Russell and the high school principal, Joseph J. Canavan, denied a gang existed at the 900-student school.

Canavan said that Patricia and one of the girls were neighbors and had been engaging in "a backyard feud."

CHICAGO (AP)—John DeWolf, adventurer and banker, beat odds of 100,000 to 3 Wednesday and started collecting \$75,000 insurance.

DeWolf turned 96 Wednesday, outliving insurance policies on his life.

Hale and hearty, he attributed long life and good fortune to "wine, women and song."

He started buying life insurance from Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co. 56 years ago and had paid \$17,000 in premiums. The policies now are worth \$75,000 in cash to DeWolf.

Insurance actuaries said the odds of DeWolf living to collect were 100,000 to 3.

# Coal Mine Accident Kills Four; Two Saved

MADISON, W.Va. (AP) — A slate fall dropped without warning in a southern West Virginia coal mine Wednesday, killing four men.

Two others, trapped for several hours, saved themselves by digging beneath machinery seconds after the top let go in the Wharton No. 2 mine at Barrett. One of the survivors was seriously injured.

Rescue teams dug their way to the four bodies but were able to remove only one of them. The body of Harry Hartman, 28, of Unedda, was taken to a mortuary.

Company officials identified the other victims as William Bain of Birch, 34-year-old section foreman; James Stone, about 36, Unedda; and Cecil Brown, about 47, Barrett.

"I just looked up and saw it fall," said George Walls, one of the 13 men working in the affected section when the massive fall came.

"It hit about 20 feet from me. I managed to talk to Drennen but I couldn't do anything by myself to get him out. He was hurt and was having trouble breathing."

The two men trapped for more than four hours but able to get out alive were Holley Drennen, about 35, Barrett, and Pat Jarrell, also of Barrett.

Mine Supt. D. B. Shupe said the crew of 13 was working about two miles from the mouth of the mine. They were making new cuts to open mine rooms when the slate fell. It was about 36 inches thick and 100 feet long.
