

Vernonia Man Convicted of Manslaughter in Well Case

PORTLAND (AP)—A circuit court jury Thursday convicted Harold R. Keith of manslaughter in the death of a man whose body was found in a lime-coated well.

The jury deliberated four hours before returning its verdict against the 43-year-old Vernonia

farmer, who had been charged with first degree murder.

Keith was charged with killing Robert Holloway, 44, Portland, whose body was found in the backwoods well near Vernonia last winter.

Circuit Judge Frank Lonergan

said he will sentence Keith next Tuesday.

Remains Impassive

Keith remained impassive when the verdict was read.

Earlier, Lee Allen Parker, 31, Portland, was convicted of second degree murder in Holloway's death. He was sentenced to life in prison.

Shortly before the verdict was announced Thursday, a grand jury indicted a witness at both trials on a charge of perjury.

The indictment was returned against Mrs. Violet Bostwick, 39, who said in court this week that parts of her earlier testimony were untrue.

Never Really Told Her

The former barmaid said that Parker never really told her that he had lowered Keith into the well in an unsuccessful attempt to recover Holloway's body.

The grand jury also indicted her on a charge of false swearing. She was lodged in the county jail. Bail was set at \$17,000.

Child Dies of Malnutrition; Four Charged

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—A grand jury charged four members of the Dooling family Thursday with letting little Sheila Dooling die by not giving her proper food, shelter and medical care.

The 7-year-old girl was found dead from malnutrition May 3 at the home of her foster parents, Jerome Dooling, 58, and his wife, Clara, 56, in suburban Snyder. They had adopted the girl last year.

Indicted on charges of first-degree manslaughter with the Jerome Doolings were their son, Kenneth, 33, and his wife, June, also 33, the natural mother of Sheila.

Also Had Custody

The indictment charged that the Kenneth Doolings also had custody of the child shortly before her death.

A few days after Sheila's death, her sister, Helen, 9, was found in a rented room with a daughter of the elder Doolings. Helen was thin and undernourished and had a black eye. She is recovering at a hospital.

The four Doolings pleaded innocent to the indictments, which also charged second-degree manslaughter, failing to provide for a minor and endangering the life or health of a child.

Had Just Married

June Dooling also was indicted for perjury on the charge that during the adoption proceedings she said she was unmarried, but had just married Kenneth Dooling, a supermarket clerk.

A first-degree manslaughter conviction carries a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison.

Jerome Dooling and his wife were released in \$5,000 surety bond each pending trial.

County Judge Jacob A. Latona also set \$5,000 bail each for the younger Doolings.

Strike Halts Italian Ships

ROME (AP)—Italian seamen were called out on strike by their unions Thursday. The move could cripple this Mediterranean country's vast shipping.

The transatlantic luxury liner Cristoforo Colombo was the biggest vessel caught in the strike. One thousand passengers for New York had boarded the ship when the strike was called. They were to be lodged in Genoa hotels.

The seamen are members of both the Communist-led Italian Federation of Maritime Workers and the Independent Maritime Union. They demand higher pay and altered working conditions.

Violent Storms, Hail Strike Czechoslovakia

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP)—Violent winds and hail destroyed homes and forests and caused millions of dollars of damage in central Czechoslovakia Wednesday.

The official Czechoslovak News Agency said the storm demolished the hamlet of Zahradiste and destroyed more than 100 buildings in the other communities in southwestern Moravia.

No lives were lost, the agency said.

Vegetable Crop Curtails Spiral for Farm Prices

WASHINGTON (AP)—Increased marketings of vegetables helped to bring a halt this month to a six-month rise in the general level of farm prices.

On the average, they remained unchanged between mid-April and mid-May, the Agriculture Department reported Thursday.

This was the case although prices farmers received for cattle, hogs and cotton strengthened further in May. These increases reflected a strong demand for meats, and short supplies of some grades of cotton.

Previous to May, farm prices had staged a comeback that carried them in April to the highest point since the Eisenhower administration took office in January, 1953.

The Agriculture Department said the level of farm prices in mid-May was 9 per cent above that of a year earlier.

Officials said the April-May level of farm prices may well be the peak for the year. They said marketings of meat animals were expected to increase enough in the weeks immediately ahead to turn livestock prices downward a little.

Further modest declines can be expected, they said, in vegetable prices, as a result of seasonal increases in production. Winter wheat damages had pushed vegetable prices to unusually high levels.

Hull claimed his wife died of tuberculosis while being wrongly treated by Carroll and that he and his little daughter contracted the disease because they were not informed of the nature of her illness.

Carroll claimed he had given Mrs. Hull proper treatment according to his drugless profession.

Girl Graduates While in Bed

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—A high school diploma Thursday was given Ann Walpole, who hasn't gone to school in more than five years.

The girl was stricken with polio in the seventh grade. Until last September she studied at home, with the aid of an intercom system hooked up to Clatskanie High School.

Last fall she was brought to Good Samaritan Hospital here for a series of operations. Since then she has been taught by a Portland teacher at the hospital.

After receiving her diploma while lying in the hospital bed, Ann said she wants to attend Lewis and Clark College next fall.

Fresh Hope Flares for Summit Meet

LONDON (AP)—The big powers are making a fresh approach to the summit—in secret this time.

They hope diplomatic negotiations conducted behind closed doors will lead to a definite of possible areas of agreement in any subsequent meeting of heads of government.

For six months East and West have made their summit moves publicly through a series of letters, notes and speeches. But summit maneuvers being resumed now in Moscow are being played quietly.

A British Foreign Office spokesman told a news conference Thursday both East and West have agreed to keep the Moscow discussions confidential.

He declined to be drawn into any discussion of what British Ambassador Sir Patrick Reilly talked about with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko for 45 minutes Wednesday.

Reilly's conversation and the expected individual meeting of American Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson and French Ambassador Maurice Dejean with Gromyko revived summit discussions, dormant since May 5.

The pleas were entered by Mrs. Vernice Rasmussen, 38. No date was set for sentencing.

Infestation of Field Mice in Coos, Reported

COQUILLE, Ore. (AP)—A fast spread of the field mice, infestation was reported Thursday by the Coos County Health Department and the agriculture extension office here.

County Sanitarian Eugene Fields said the rodents may be the same species that extensively damaged crops, gardens and fruit trees in the Klamath Basin and other Oregon areas the past year.

Bait for fighting the mice is being supplied by the extension office.

Half of Oregon Crops Sold Outside State

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State College Thursday said half the state's farm products are sold outside Oregon.

The products bring more than 280 million dollars from out of the state annually.

Some specialty crops, like the 15 million dollar pear harvest, are sold almost entirely outside the state. Some 90 per cent of the pear crop goes outside Oregon. So do strawberries and snap beans, each of which grosses about 10 million dollars a year.

Berries Peppermint

In the plus-90 per cent groups going outside the state are other berries, peppermint oil, filberts, hops, cannerly beans, green peas, cherries, prunes, and more than a dozen grass and legume seed crops.

Cattle and wheat are tops in dollar volume. From 25 to 50 per cent of the 60 million dollar annual sales of cattle and calves comes from outside the state. More than 75 per cent of the cash yield for Oregon's 50 million dollar wheat harvest comes from out of state.

75 to 90 Per Cent

Sales outside Oregon are estimated to account for 75 to 90 per cent of the cash income from farm forest products, a 15 million dollar yearly business, and from such crops as walnuts, onions, sweet corn and barley.
