

Rebel Students in Panama at Peace

PANAMA (AP) — President Ernesto De La Guardia Jr. and Panama's rebellious students effected a truce Saturday night. Several hundred students holed up in National University more than a week turned over to their professors shotguns, small caliber rifles, pistols, a large number of gasoline fire bombs, and wooden facemasks of weapons. Anti-American Feeling Dips in City of Algiers

ALGIERS (AP) — Anti-Americanism—rampant in Algiers at the start of the army insurrection May 13—has declined with the evolution of events in Paris. Two weeks ago reporters arriving in Algiers were greeted by a stern French major with the comment: "We don't like Americans here. You'd better watch your step." Now paratroopers salute, and French officers often smile at U.S. newsmen. Crowds, demonstrating wildly every day in the city, smilingly make room for Americans to pass. It's a far cry from the day three weeks ago when mobs attacked the U.S. Information Center in Algiers. Frenchmen seem to want to forget about that. "It was a mistake, the whole thing got out of hand," some say. "What brought the change?"

Nationalists Inflamed Some think the attitude of non-interference on the part of the United States has something to do with it. For some time, French nationalists here have felt the United States was trying to replace France in North Africa. The U.S.-British good offices effort in the recent French-Tunisian crisis inflamed French nationalists here. The Algerian press daily reports U.S. press reaction to the French-Algerian crisis. "America has finally understood us," one publisher said.

Rescuers Find Fisherman, 78

TILLAMOOK (AP)—A search party Saturday found a 78-year-old man who spent the night in the open after being separated from his son on a fishing trip. Herbert Fawk of Portland said that aside from being cold, he was unharmed by the ordeal. A 30-man search team, using bloodhounds, came upon Fawk after following a ribbon of smoke from his campfire along the Nestucca River.

Three Accused Of Selling Dope to School Children

CHICAGO (AP)—Police charged a man and two women with sale of narcotics Saturday and said the trio were peddling dope to grammar school children. Those charged are Thomas Flynn, 43, who police said was an ex-convict; Miss Corinne Miller, 64, and Miss Lavonia Baskin, 17, all are Negroes. Police said the three had been selling narcotics to elementary school pupils in a predominantly Negro - Puerto Rican South Side area. The arrests stemmed from a complaint by parents of a 13-year-old boy that their son was buying narcotics at a grocery store operated by Flynn.

Waggoner was a press agent more than 60 years, 10 of them with RKO Pictures. Among his clients were Adm. Richard Byrd, Rank Chance, Florence Ziegfeld, Earl Carroll, the Shubert brothers, George White, Fanchon and Marco, Velox and Yolanda, Tritle Frigiana, Lon Erroll, Dennis King and the Theater Guild. He is survived by his widow, Genevieve. Funeral services will be Monday at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Los Angeles.

Supply Plane Falls; Two Die

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—A Reeve Aleutian Airways C-46 crashed into the North Pacific Ocean near Dutch Harbor Saturday, killing the two men aboard. Bob Reeve, president of the airline, said one of the men was from Anchorage and the other from Seattle, but he refused to release their names until after their relatives had been notified. One body was recovered. The two-engine plane, on a supply mission to Distant Early Warning Line stations, crashed shortly after takeoff from Driftwood Bay, near Dutch Harbor in the Aleutian Islands chain. Reeve said he did not know what caused the plane to crash.

Patients Attend Nurses' Wedding—Iron Lungs and All

NEW YORK (AP) — When Delores Sinsak, 23, a nurse at the Goldwater Hospital, announced her engagement she invited all her patients to the wedding. She doubted they would make it. Most of them were in wheelchairs and one was a polio victim in an iron lung. The patients told hospital officials how badly they wanted to attend Delores' wedding. The hospital's Volunteer Services Department managed to arrange enough cars and trucks for transportation. So when Delores walked to the altar Saturday with Donald Law at St. Alphonsus church in Brooklyn, there were 25 wheelchairs and an iron lung, all occupied by her happy patients, along the aisle.

He knew the cafe, dialed the number and got a hearty hello. "Any trouble at your place to-night?" he asked. The man at the other end said: "No trouble here. Quiet as can be. Why do you ask?" "Just had a call from someone who said he was at your place and that we'd find a dead man there," said the sergeant. "Sure," said his name was Blatt. "Well, my name is Blatt. I'm the bartender. Paris Censor Works Quietly At News Desks

PARIS (AP) — The man sits quietly beside each news desk in Paris, watching the flow of reports on the great political struggle in France and North Africa. From time to time, he points to a dispatch or photograph and says, "Non." He usually uses more polite language, embroidering it with more words, but the effect is the same — "No." He is the censor. In the Communist world, he is a fixture. Now he is operating—for the first time since World War II—in France, traditionally vehement champions of freedom and human liberties. He is at work now in every newspaper office in Paris, and in the offices of all American and other foreign news agencies that distribute news to French newspapers.

Powers Limited He is not empowered to interfere with news or pictures going out of France, destined for publication in the United States or elsewhere. The usual absurdities of censorship have become commonplace. The Paris edition of the New York Herald Tribune appeared today with a large blank space, filled only with the word "censored," on the front page. It was supposed to be a report on Friday night's disturbances around the Champs Elysees. But a Paris afternoon newspaper, France Soir, published a huge, four-column photograph of the fighting.

Negro, White Pair Battle; Melee Follows

CHALFONT, Pa. (AP) — The 372 guests at a Negro teenage sorority picnic had been plagued by random fights with whites all Memorial Day. Then, without warning, the trouble exploded into rioting. Before it ended, an hour or so later, about 500 people, mostly teenagers, had been embroiled. Holiday crowds that jammed Forest Amusement Park streaked for cover. Many women fainted. Children were terrified.

Pearson Thinks He Has Presidency of Senate Sewed UP

PORTLAND (AP)—State Sen. Walter Pearson (D-Portland) Saturday said he has the presidency of the Senate in the 1959 legislative session sewed up. Pearson said a majority of senators in his own party as well as Republicans advised him they will support him. Pearson said he had polled only those who are certain to return to the next session. Other Democrats who have announced for the Senate presidency are Dick Chapman of Coos Bay and Alfred Corbett of Portland.

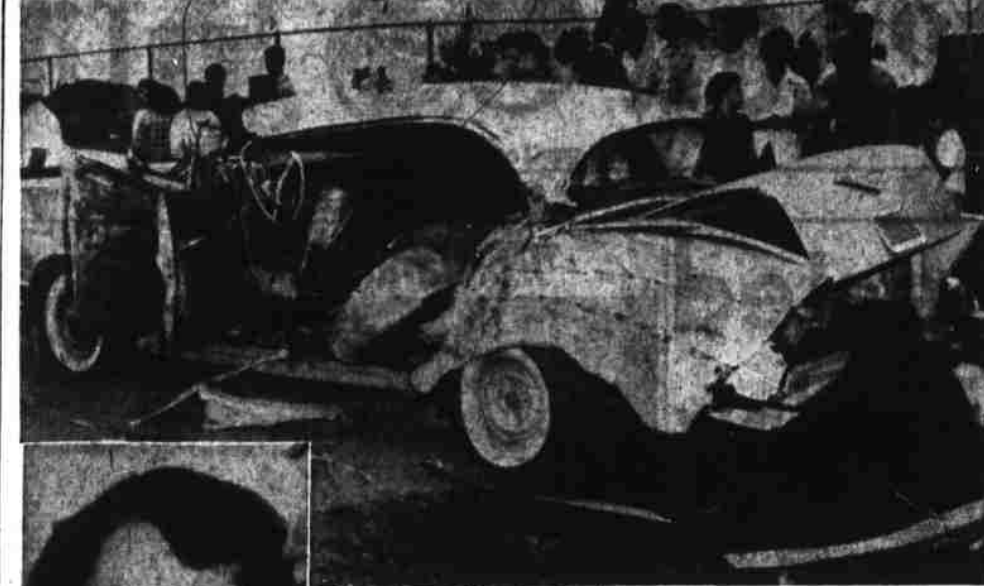
World Population To Double Within Coming 40 Years

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The world's population is expected to double in 40 years if it keeps on growing at the current rate. The prediction is made on the basis of figures in the 1957 U.N. Demographic Yearbook, published Saturday night. The yearbook said that between mid-1955 and mid-1956, world population grew 47 million to a total of 2,737,000,000. That was an over-all average increase of 1.6 per cent a year. Northern and western Europe showed the slowest—0.8 per cent. North America's rate was 1.7. The yearbook said what it called the unprecedented increase of 47 million people a year resulted from an average annual birth rate of 33 per 1,000 population and an average annual death rate of 18 per 1,000, by 1952-56 estimates.

Sweet Home Mill Plans to Reopen

SWEET HOME (AP)—The Oregon Plywood Corp., which shut down last summer, Saturday said it will resume operations Thursday. A company official said the mill plans to call 38 men back to work when it reopens on a limited basis.

Pair Saved Life of Man in Fatal Crash

A Portland nurse and a nurse aide from Dallas probably saved the life of a man injured in a traffic collision which took the life of a Valsetz girl Friday at Dallas, it was reported Saturday. Witnesses said that Cleo McKnight, 36, Dallas, was bleeding excessively from a punctured jugular vein until the bleeding was controlled by Mrs. Oscar Domaschofsky, Portland nurse, and Mrs. Homer Bevens, Bartell Hospital nurse aide from Dallas. The two women applied pressure until the arrival of Dallas Ambulance, it was reported.

Graham Calls On U.S. for Repentance

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Evangelist Billy Graham Saturday night called for national repentance because "the handwriting is on the wall." His nationally televised sermon was delivered before a capacity 16,500 crowd in the Cow Palace. That brought the five-week total to 439,600. "God may allow a paganistic and atheistic enemy to bring judgment on us," Graham said. "The American people are being weighed in the balance, as never before. 'God measures the things we do not do as well as those we do. To whom much is given much is required. Never has a nation been blessed and prospered so mightily as America.' " "Survival of this country depends not so much on its armaments as on its moral and spiritual values."

Nixon Taking Quiet Vacation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Nixon is taking a quiet vacation at St. Catherine's Island, Ga., out of reach of telephones. An aide said Nixon left Washington by train Friday night and proceeded to the island from McIntosh, Ga. Nixon took along some work with him, the aide said, but the trip was primarily a vacation. Arrangements are pending at Macy & Sons, McMinville.

Hagerty Says Nixon Tops President Candidate Field

BLAIRSTOWN, N. J. (AP) — Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said Saturday night that Vice President Richard M. Nixon is leading the field of candidates for the 1960 presidential nomination. Hagerty addressed a senior dinner at Blair Academy, from which he was graduated in 1928. He made no mention of other Republican candidates or of possible Democratic hopefuls. Most elections, he said, were based on whether the administration in power was moving toward war or peace and the condition of the voters' pocketbooks on election day. Asked about Nixon's South American trip, Hagerty said Communists made a mistake in inspiring the riots that surrounded the vice president. "That mistake," Hagerty said, "is that they violated every cardinal rule of Spanish hospitality by insulting a guest — specially in splitting at and stoning Mrs. Nixon."

Eddie Fisher Hospitalized

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Singer Eddie Fisher was stricken Saturday night with what his physician described as a mild attack of appendicitis. Fisher was taken to Cedars of Lebanon Hospital, but the doctor said the attack was not serious and there were no immediate plans to operate.

Groundbreakers For New Church Mean Business

TORONTO (AP) — The Rev. Hugh MacDonald wants his entire Presbyterian congregation out Sunday for groundbreaking ceremonies for their new church. And he wants them with shovels in hand. None of this business of one dignitary turning over a symbolic shovel of earth—everybody digs in. Remarked the minister, a Scotsman: "If the congregation turns enough sod they may save excavation costs."

Driver Warned, Later Crashes; Death Toll Six

MOUNT VERNON, N.Y. (AP) — At 4:20 a.m. Saturday an officer in nearby Greenwich, Conn., halted a speeding car. A verbal warning about his driving was given the motorist, Llewellyn C. Byrd, a 30-year-old Negro and an orderly at Greenwich Hospital. After the reprimand, Byrd was allowed to proceed. Byrd's destination wasn't learned but somewhere he picked up three young hitchhikers. At 5:35 a.m. Byrd and his three passengers were driving westward through Mount Vernon, about 15 miles southwest of Greenwich, on Westchester County's Cross County Parkway. Veers Across Line Suddenly, parkway police said, Byrd's car veered across the dividing line in the center of the highway and smashed head on into a New Jersey station wagon going in the opposite direction. Byrd was killed and his three hitchhiking passengers critically injured. The impact was so great that the station wagon's front was shoved onto the top of the vehicle. Moments later the wreckage of the station wagon was a mass of flames. In it, three adults and two children died. Tentative Identification Tracing the license plates, police established tentative identifications of the passengers. They were Vincent Muccia, 38; his wife, Katherine, 36; their daughter, Barbara, 12; Muccia's father, Nicholas, 70, all of Ridgefield, N.J., and Antoinette De Blase, 12, also of Ridgefield, said to be a friend of the family.

Ernest Clark, 75, Succumbs

Ernest E. Clark, 4730 Silverton Rd. N.E., died Saturday night in a Salem hospital at the age of 75. He had been ill for some time. Clark was a lather. He moved to Salem from Idaho in 1950 and was employed on several large state building projects. He lived at Ballston near McMinville for 12 years before coming to Salem. Teen-Age Gun Moll Confined To Hillcrest

GOLD BEACH, Ore. (AP)—A girl who pleaded guilty to kidnapping a policeman was committed Saturday to a state school for socially maladjusted girls. Juvenile authorities said Dorothy Louise Decker, 16, Reno, Nev., will remain at the Hillcrest School for Girls in Salem, Ore., until she is 21 years old. Miss Decker was arrested early this month after Henry Thomas Hill, her companion in five brief abductions, was shot and killed by police at a roadblock. The girl pleaded guilty to a charge of kidnapping Brookings, Ore., policeman Pat Sims and then was turned over to juvenile authorities. The five kidnaped men were not harmed.
