A lineup of spring graduations shows more than 900 youngsters from Salem high schools, an increase of more than 100 over last year's production.

At the same time, 150 children are graduating from private grade schools that end at the eighth grade, while more than 1,000 enter into the public high schools from Leslie and Parrish junior high schools.

Sacred Heart Academy will have baccalaureate services 9:15 a.m. today in St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church. Graduation will be 8:15 p.m. Tuesday in St. Joseph's auditorium.

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## Technologists Hear of New Radiation Curbs

Medical technologists are keeping pace with this atomic age and its fears of excessive radio active fallout, a widely known laboratory researcher from Detroit, Mich., said here Saturday.

"Faced by the challenge of atomic irradiation, laboratories have developed new products which give the individual 100 to 1,000 times as much tolerance to radiation," said Dr. C. W. Christensen, a director of Difco Laboratories in Detroit.

Dr. Christensen was among featured speakers at 11th annual meeting of the Association of Oregon Medical Technologists, which opened Saturday at Hotel Marion. Some 100 persons are attending the affair, which will close with a breakfast and business meeting this morning.

**Also Offer Possibilities**  
"New products from laboratories also offer possibilities of prevention and control of various allergic ailments such as asthma and hay fever," pointed out Dr. Christensen. "Many of the new products are derived from bacteria, the agents that cause human infections."

Turning to the topic of cancer, the Detroit authority said value of test tube studies of cell tissues was proved when polio was whipped.

**Turning to Test Tubes**  
He added that more cancer researchers are turning to test tubes instead of "colonies of monkeys" because of saving in time and money.

"Tissue studied in tubes gives an idea of cancer cell characteristics an effect on them of various pharmaceuticals," added Dr. Christensen. "Some day the right chemical may be found."

Other speakers at the Saturday program included Dr. James J. Griffiths, nationally known Miami, Fla., authority, who spoke on blood transfusion services, and Dr. Stanley K. Davis and Dr. John R. Christopher, both Salem pathologists.

Dr. William Lidbeck, Salem, served as master of ceremonies.

## Salem Man Commended for Saving Jet Lost in Clouds

Castle Air Base, Calif.—An Air Force radar technician from Salem, Ore., recently received a commendation here after being credited with saving a jet fighter lost high in the clouds.

The high honor, called the Save Certificate, was presented to Master Sgt. Harold W. Reid, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Reid, 4982 Rickman Rd.

The certificate, signed by Maj. Gen. Daniel Doubleday, commander of Airways and Communications Service, cited Sgt. Reid "for outstanding job knowledge by handling the situation and guiding the aircraft to a safe landing at Castle Air Base."

Reid, a radar approach controller with the 2055th Airways and Air Communications Service Squadron, was credited with saving the pilot's life and the aircraft from destruction.

The Air Force said the episode involved an F-102 jet fighter which became lost above clouds and was almost out of fuel.

Sgt. Reid was presented the commendation by Maj. Leo J. Whited, commander of the 2055th Squadron.
