

Mother, Sons Spend Terrorizing Hours In Overturned Boat

GRAFTON, Ill. (AP)—A mother and her two young sons were trapped for three terrorizing hours Sunday in their overturned cabin cruiser on the Mississippi River near here.

They were rescued by two men who swam through 50 feet of choppy water. Using axes and saws they chopped a hole in the bottom of the boat through which the trio escaped.

The victims were Mrs. Marcus C. Bauer, 37, and her two sons, Ronald, 15, and Michael, 10, all of Belleville, Ill.

Their rescuers were Harry Roither and George Garrett, both of St. Louis.

Woman Dies From Stay In Lime Pit

DENVER (AP)—An unidentified woman died in Colorado General Hospital Sunday five hours after police found her floundering nude in a suburban lime pit. Officers estimated her age at 40-45.

Bill Kearns, Adams County investigator, said the death is being investigated as a possible homicide.

An unidentified man called the sheriff's office at 4 a. m. and said he heard screams as he drove past the isolated lime pit at the Acetylene Gas Co.

Firemen, wearing rubber hip boots and gloves, waded through the knee-deep solution and rescued the woman. Her clothes were found nearby.

Death Claims A. B. McCoy

Possible Conclave Between Ike, De Gaulle Seen in U.S. Statement

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration made a bid Sunday night for "intimate and friendly relations" with the new crisis government of France under Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

The use of that phrase in a White House statement fed speculation that when the time is right

President Eisenhower will seek personal meeting with the new French Premier, a wartime associate. The President said last week he had liked De Gaulle.

The White House statement was issued to newsmen at Gettysburg, Pa., where the President was spending the weekend.

It was the first formal U.S. government comment on the French

crisis since it developed. There was obvious relief in official quarters here that De Gaulle had finally come to power as premier, an action which the White House and State Department had considered for some days to be inevitable if political chaos was to be avoided in France.

At the same time, there was deep and worrisome uncertainty in official quarters over De Gaulle's policies now that he has charge of the destiny of France. It was assumed that he would stick to the main lines of foreign policy, including France's key role in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, yet De Gaulle made a wartime record of stubbornness and hypersensitivity in dealing with allies so that many authorities believe there may be much trouble ahead.

No NATO Change Seen

Secretary of Defense Neil McElroy said however he saw no need for any changes in NATO defense plans because of De Gaulle's rise to power.

"We will deal with him in the same way as we have dealt with previous premiers" and with the same confidence, McElroy said.

"He represents France as a traditional ally of this country of the past and the future as well," McElroy added in a TV interview.

The White House statement said "We look forward to the continuation of the intimate and friendly relations which have always characterized our long association with France."

SILVERTON—Two Silverton women injured Friday in a Memorial Day auto accident were still listed in serious condition Sunday, attendants at Silverton General Hospital said.

They said Mrs. Wilda Charlesworth, 87, received deep face and head lacerations, and Mrs. Nellie Moser, 74, internal injuries.

Rain, Storms Cover Much of U.S. Sunday; Minor Tornadoes Strike

Showers, thunderstorms, dark clouds and drizzle covered much of the nation Sunday, following a night of skipping tornadoes in Kansas, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan.

The minor tornadoes did little damage.

At dawn Sunday the squally weather moved into western Ohio and the west end of Lake Erie, but the rains were lighter than those which accompanied the heavy thunderstorms late Saturday along the Mississippi Valley into Illinois.

A surge of cold air moved into the western Great Lakes region and the Plains. Most of Wisconsin and Michigan shivered in drizzle and low 40-degree readings.

There were showers Sunday in the upper Hudson River Valley of New York and near Buffalo. Rain also fell in the South as it pushed through northern Georgia into the western Carolinas.

Pacific air streamed across the northern Rockies and developed into shower bands from the West through eastern Montana into the western Dakotas.

In the northwest overrunning Pacific winds maintained considerable cloudiness in western Washington and Oregon.

The Weather Bureau said warm, showery weather will continue through most of the Southland, while cooler and drier air was expected to clear skies into the mountains of Pennsylvania and New York.

Nationwide temperature extremes ranged from Saturday's 110 at Presidio, Texas, to Sunday's early morning 23 at Eagle, Colo.

AF Plane Lost; Crash Reported By Observers

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (AP)

Three men reported what they believed was a plane crash in the mountains northeast of here Sunday and the Air Force launched an air and ground search for an overdue two-place plane.

The first reports came from two airmen. Hours later, an unidentified man said he had seen a plane crash about a mile from him, near the Long Tom Reservoir some 40 miles northeast of Mountain Home on Canyon Creek.

The Air Force sent a survival team to pick the man up and go on with him to the scene of the reported crash.

A TV2, the Navy version of the Air Force's T33 trainer, was more than four hours overdue on a flight to Buckley Field in Denver. The plane filed a flight plan out of Seattle and stopped at Gelger Field in Spokane, taking off at 11 a. m., (PST).

Military Burial Due for Ross

Military burial for Willis M. (Bill) Ross, manager of radio station KSLM, who died Friday, will be Tuesday at 2 p. m. at Williamette National Cemetery in Portland.

Members of the Oregon National Guard and veterans who served with Ross overseas with the 41st Division will be among those attending.

Ross was aide-de-camp to Maj. General Thomas A. Riley, then commander of a brigade with the Oregon National Guard Division in New Orleans during World War II.

Funeral services are set for 2 p. m. today at Clough-Barrick Chapel with Rev. Paul Poling officiating. Ritualistic rites will be conducted by the Masonic Lodge.
