Marion County Recording Fee Increase \$6,186

Recording fees at Marion County Courthouse reached \$18,483 during the first five months of this year, an increase of \$6,186 over the comparable period last year, County Recorder Herman Lanke said Wednesday.

Although filings increased in all areas, there was a particular spurt noted in chattel mortgages on personal property, Lanke said. May filing fees were \$3,915 as compared to \$2,743 a year ago.

Hatfield Got Big Democrat Write-in Vote

One of the largest number of write-in votes accorded a Republican on a Democratic ballot came to light Wednesday in the official canvass of most of the Marion County Democratic ballot of the May 16 primary election.

In the race for nomination for governor Gov. Robert Holmes received 6,704 votes. But Sec. of State Mark Hatfield, the Republican opponent he will face at the general election next November received 110 Democrat write-in tallies. Marion County Clerk Henry Mattson said he can recall no larger write-in votes in past elections.

Holmes easily defeated his Democratic competitors Lew Wallace, who garnered 2,845 votes in this county, and Wiley W. Smith, who received 689.

Other totals on the official canvass changed none of the results gathered in the unofficial count on election day. The canvass is to be completed this week, Clerk Mattson said.

State Board Gives Elliott Forest Report

The State Forestry Board estimated Wednesday that Elliott State Forest in Coos County will produce 40 million feet of merchantable timber per year soon, and that the cut eventually would be 55 million feet.

The forest, managed by the state forestry board, contains 71,000 acres of timberlands. The board, meeting in Salem, announced its first inventory of the forest.

The board also announced plans for protection of 70,000 acres of private lands within the Klamath Indian reservation. The protection will be provided by the Klamath Forest Protective Assn.

The board paved the way for drawing up of the first coal mining lease on state forest lands. Louis H. Mills Jr. and Dr. John D. Steinbach, both of Tillamook, want to mine coal on state lands in Tillamook County. The board ordered that the lease be drawn up.

Russians to Attend Council of Churches

THE HAGUE (AP)—Metropolitan Nikolai is expected to lead a Russian Orthodox delegation to a meeting of the World Council of Churches in the Netherlands in August. The Dutch Reformed Church announced the Russian church—not a council member—has accepted an invitation to attend.
