Rain Cancels Tilt; Contest Tonight

Senators Meet Lewiston at 8 P.M.

Rain washed out the Salem Senators and Lewiston Broncos Friday night at Waters Field, but the two teams will try it again Saturday night at 8.

The teams also have a two-night doubleheader scheduled Sunday, starting at 6 p.m. The rain-out game will be made up next time the Broncos come to town, July 8-10, the Senator front office announced Friday afternoon.

Left-hander Don White (1-3) who was scheduled to pitch Friday night, will draw the mound assignment Saturday for manager Pappy Kinsfather's Senators, who finally broke their 15-game home losing streak last Wednesday against Eugene. Lewiston manager Hillis Layne's choice wasn't available Friday.

Going into Friday night's rain-out, the Broncos were leading the Northwest League by five games over second place Wenatchee. Two of the main reasons for that lead were Layne and first baseman Bruce McIntosh. Layne was batting an even .400 in the latest official league averages, and McIntosh, a former University of Idaho star, was right behind with .392.

Second baseman Cal Bauer is leading the cellar-dwelling Senators at the plate with a .333 average. Bauer, however, missed the final game of the Eugene series Thursday night with a bruised leg after being involved in a one-punch brawl with Emerald outfielder Chuck Stacy Wednesday. Bauer floored Stacy after the Eugene player, trying to break up a double play, applied the pressure to Bauer's leg, which was caught in the base. Stacy is living on liquids and waiting for some new bridgework. Bauer may be out for as much as a week.

Salem business manager John Enger reported no changes in the Senator playing personnel Friday, but said Tony Robello, the New York Yankee scout in this area, was to get in touch with the club Saturday. Robello is reportedly seeking several players to help the Salem club.

McMullen in Dallas Lead

DALLAS, Tex. (U-P) — Tour freshman John McMullen refused to wilt under pressure Friday and fashioned a 5-under-par 65 to retain the lead by a stroke in the \$25,000 Dallas Open.

The lean young man from Fair Oaks, Calif., finished an hour after Tommy Bolt of Paradise, Fla., had shot the lowest round of the year in an 8-under-par 62 to compile 130 for 36 holes. The McMullen's birdie streak now gave him 129.

The two leaders were a startling contrast—Bolt, the erstwhile tempestuous one, has won over \$13,000 this year. McMullen, making his first swing with the hotshots of the links, hasn't earned enough to pay expenses.

The 23-year-old McMullen said that while he didn't play as well as Thursday when he took the lead with a 64, "I didn't feel the pressure too much."

He compiled his round despite a bogey when his tee shot hit a tree on the ninth hole. He said he missed several putts that he should have made—he rimmed the cup to miss a birdie from 15 feet on the tenth hole—but generally he was as hot as the blistering sun around the greens.

Bolt was setting a new record for the 6,469-yard Oak Cliff Country Club course—McMullen's 64 Thursday was what he shot down—and turning in the lowest round of all the tournaments played this year.

Just-joined Tommy, now managing to keep his temper under control along with his golf game—he once was a noted club thrower—had only 25 putts on his tour with just 12 on the front nine.

All-Star Tickets Sell Out Rapidly

BALTIMORE (U-P) — An avalanche of mail applications for tickets to the July 8 All-Star baseball game caused Baltimore Orioles officials to announce Friday night no more could be handled.

Bill Wasingham, executive vice president of the Orioles, said that within 18 hours after the midnight starting deadline for postmarking of mail applications, the club had received requests for about 40,000 tickets. Only 20,000 are available to mail applicants.

The rest of the 49,278 seats in Memorial Stadium already were committed to holders of Orioles season tickets, major and minor league baseball clubs, and sports reporters.

Bums Drop Milwaukee New York Ups American Lead

SAN FRANCISCO (U-P) — A five-run sixth inning, capped by Jerry Lynch's three-run homer, carried the Cincinnati Reds from behind for a 5-4 victory over San Francisco Friday night. The two-out rally prevented the Giants from regaining the National League lead, as first place Milwaukee led 4-3 at Los Angeles.

The Braves still lead, by .008 percentage points.

Willie Mays, belting his 14th home run for a first-inning, 1-0 Giant lead, took over the NL batting lead with 3-for-3 and a .433 average. The three hits, running Willie's string to seven in a row, rushed him past Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals. Stan was 0-for-2 and dropped to .420 in a 3-1 victory over Philadelphia.

BC Games Pole Wins Three-Mile

VANCOUVER, B.C. (U-P) — Zdzislaw Krzyszkowiak, 28-year-old second lieutenant in the Polish Army, brushed aside the Canadian open record in the three-mile event Friday night at the British Columbia Centennial Games, sprinting the last lap to win in 13:34.8.

He was a full 50 yards ahead of England's George Knight.

Doug Kyle of Calgary was a solid third, breaking his own Canadian native record with a time of 13:57.8.

The former Canadian open record was 13:55.2, set during the British Empire Games here in 1954 by Chris Chataway of England. Kyle's former native record was 14:03.8, set last year in Hamilton, Ont.

Krzyszkowiak's time was only 8.4 seconds off the world record held by Vladimir Kuts of Russia.

He did it despite a brisk south wind that raced down the home stretch portion of the track, which was wet but fast.

Frank Wyatt of England and the University of Idaho was a half-minute behind Kyle in fourth place, and was followed closely by Maury Graves of Stanford and Jim Moore of Vancouver.

Krzyszkowiak took the lead in the second lap and never faded. Knight held closely to him and Kyle moved ahead of Graves and Wyatt in the fifth lap to third place. The leaders began lapping the field in the seventh.

A forecast of rain proved true, with intermittent showers dampening the field before the games began, but fading out before the main invitational race.

Centennial Mile Today

VANCOUVER, B.C. (U-P) — Alex Henderson of Australia and Arizona State College said Friday he plans to "start fast and keep it up" to finish in Saturday's mile race, feature event of the British Columbia Centennial Games.

The two-day track program opened Friday night in Vancouver's Empire Stadium.

Henderson's intention to set a fast pace may insure a 4-minute mile. The field includes Merv Lincoln of Australia, who has cracked the magic 4 three times; Stefan Lewandowski, who has beaten 4 minutes; and Derek Ibbotson of England, whose 3:57.2 is the best ever, although not yet officially recognized.

Akins New Welter King

Grabs Title With TKO

Martinez Takes Savage Beating

ST. LOUIS (U-P) — Virgil (Honeybear) Akins, a savage puncher from St. Louis, destroyed Vince Martinez with a barrage of fierce blows Friday night to win the vacant world's welterweight championship on a fourth round technical knockout.

Martinez was down seven times before referee Harry Kessler stopped it with the Paterson, N.J., boxer flat on his back. Kessler could have counted 30.

The end came after 52 seconds of the fourth.

It was a brutal beating that this 30-year-old slinger handed the handsome stylist from New Jersey. Almost before the battle was under way, Martinez was on the deck when he jabbed and Akins crossed over a solid right to the jaw. Vince bounced up but it was apparent that he was badly hurt. Twice more in that wild first round Martinez was dropped, and twice he fell or was pushed to the deck.

Martinez's legs were wobbly and his face was bloody in the second round as he stayed off certain disaster. Only in the final second of that round did he get his vaunted jab into action.

The third round showed Martinez jabbing and moving away with some of the style he has shown in previous bouts. Akins, throwing punches with abandon, landed a clubbing right to the head as Martinez backed off balance and was starting to fall under his own steam. The crowd boomed as Martinez took another count of three.

A crashing left to the jaw upended Martinez again just before the bell as Akins drove home at least 10 straight punches. In the midst of that barrage Vince lost his mouth piece. He was backed against the ropes and hammered without return.

Martinez obviously could not take much more of this sort of beating. He looked the worse for wear as he came off the floor. Akins now waiting for the finisher, slipped down on all fours when he hit a slippery spot in mid-ring.

Then Akins cranked up his finishing attack and drove Vince around the ring with a right and a left after a body barrage. Vince just made it this time, taking the nine count. Then came the finisher, a savage left hook to the jaw, and down went Martinez once more.

Referee Kessler took one look and stopped the slaughter. It went as a technical knockout because he didn't bother to count him out. As Kessler came to a neutral corner, he told ringsiders "I could have counted 30."

Akins has been a 2 to 1 favorite on his punching power but not even his strongest supporters expected such a performance. After the opening bell only thing that was equal about the two fighters was their weight. Each scaled 146½ pounds at the noon weigh-in.

The attendance was 9,777 and the gate was \$62,810. Each fighter received \$15,000 with an option of 30 per cent of the gate, plus \$15,000 from television.

Carmen Basilio, who gave up the welter title automatically the night he won the middle-weight crown from Sugar Ray Robinson last September, was an interested ring-side spectator. He had picked Martinez and must have been impressed by the power of Akins' punches.

Akins, 30, has been an inconsistent performer most of his 66-bout career. However he suddenly hit the jackpot with two knockouts over Tom DeMarco, the ex-champ, and a TKO over Isaac Logart that sent him into the finals of an elimination tournament with Martinez.

Central Union High School goes after its first state baseball championship Saturday night in Portland against Myrtle Creek in the second game of a prep tripleheader.

Champions in all three high school divisions will be decided in the games at Multnomah Stadium. Gaston and Adrian, the same teams who met in last year's final, start the action at 5 p.m. when they play for the class B crown. The Central-Myrtle Creek game for the class A-2 title is slated for approximately 7 p.m., and two Portland teams, Grant and Lincoln, meet for the A-1 title at about 9 p.m.

Central, boasting a 12-3 season record, won the Willamette Valley League title and made its way into the finals with playoff victories over Sherwood and Wy'east. Coach Ray Coleman said Friday he would start right-hander Bill Lukens (6-1) on the mound for the Panthers. The Monmouth-Independence team is led at the plate by Lukens, who is hitting .345, and by shortstop Darrell Brandt, who is whacking the ball at a .315 clip. Brandt's defensive work at shortstop has also been impressive.

Elsewhere, Coleman will have Harry Cummins catching, Bob Marr at first, Barry Martin at second, Jim Turner at third, and Dan Lovelace, Glen Albin and Dewey Cummins in the outfield.

Myrtle Creek enters the title game with playoff wins over Junction City and Stayton. Wes Davidson a right-hander, will be on the mound for the Vikings.

The rest of the lineup will include Ed Cearley behind the plate, Fred Earwood at first, Bob Cavener at second, Rod Trask at short, Gregg Lindquist at third, and Jim Murray, Don Bishop and Bob Paine in the outfield.

Bishop leads the team in hitting with a .400 average in the two playoff games.

Top Favorite in 8 Horse Field

NEW YORK (U-P) — Seven horses, including a longshot intruder named Saferis, were named to oppose the Calumet Farm's Tim Tam Saturday in the tough mile and a half Belmont Stakes at Swanky Belmont Park.

All week long the management had figured only six colts would go against Tim Tam, the Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner, who would become the ninth horse in history to complete the triple crown if he can take the Belmont.

The colt given the best chance to make a battle of it is Irish-bred Belmont Stakes Lineup

Cavan, who came from 14 lengths behind and won the Peter Pan handicap last week. Cavan, owned by Joseph E. O'Connell of Boston, won going away by 4 lengths in that mile and one-eighth race.

S. R. (Skippy) Shapoff, who trains Saferis for the Two Brooks Farm at Basking Ridge, N.J., made the surprise entry. Saferis's owner is Mike Sakale, a Manhattan restaurateur, and the colt has yet to win in nine starts this year. A week ago Saferis ran fourth in a one mile race at Belmont.

Saferis met Tim Tam last March at Gulfstream Park, and finished seventh by almost 9 lengths when the Calumet flyer won the Fountain of Youth Stakes. If eight start in the Belmont, to be televised and broadcast (CBS) nationally from 12:30 p.m. PST, the pot will gross \$114,600, with \$73,440 net to the winner.

Hedley Woodhouse was named to ride Saferis, who managed to win two races on a sloppy track last fall at Pimlico. They were his only victories in 10 outings as a 2-year-old.

All owners must put \$1,000 to start, and the weather doesn't see a chance of any mud for Saferis. The forecast is for sunny skies.
