

UAW Attempts to Nip Strike Threat Faced by Chrysler

DETROIT, Mich. (AP)—The United Auto Workers attempted Saturday to quell strike sentiment among Chrysler workers and hold them on the job during the uneasy labor truce in the auto industry.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther's aides appealed to a meeting of 500 stewards and shop committeemen from Chrysler plants to avoid repetition of incidents that Friday resulted in the shutdown of two Chrysler plants here.

Angered by limitations put on them by the company during the first week of no-contract operations, some stewards and committeemen demanded immediate strike action.

Art Hughes, head of the UAW's bargaining team in Chrysler contract talks, told newsmen he believed Chrysler workers will stay on the job next week. He said stewards and committeemen were advised to turn the other cheek to anything they considered strike provocation. He said the union, when it comes to signing a contract, will demand full settlement of any grievances that arise during the no-contract period.

Every imposition or obstacle the corporation may impose because a new proposal on the bargaining table," Hughes said.

The union also has announced that General Motors and Ford will be held accountable in final settlements for anything the union considers to be undue hardships put on members while working without contracts.

Both GM and Ford reported their plants operated smoothly during the past week. GM's only major disturbance was a 24-hour strike at a plant near Pittsburgh. Officials said it involved local grievances.

Chrysler sent home 5,400 workers at two plants in Detroit Friday in a dispute with union stewards and committeemen. The company said unauthorized walkouts called by disgruntled stewards forced shutdown of Plymouth assembly operations here.

100 Expected At Meeting of Indoor Sports

More than 100 delegates are expected in Salem next weekend for the annual district convention of Indoor Sports clubs, convention chairman Leon Ficus said Saturday night after a final planning meeting of the Salem club in Hollywood Lions Den.

The four Northwest states will be represented at the three-day meeting starting Friday in Hotel Senator. It will be the first district convention to be held in Salem.

Main speaker at a dinner 6:30 p.m. Saturday will be Mrs. Gladys Workman of Drain, world traveler and advocate of employment for physically handicapped persons.

District officers will be elected Saturday afternoon and installed that night following the dinner.

Employment of handicapped persons will be discussed by a panel at an 11 a.m. lunch Saturday. Moderator will be Wayne A. Anderson, State Industrial Accident Commission personnel officer. Panel members will be William C. Wiegman, Salem District supervisor for Division of Vocational Rehabilitation; Howard H. Van Nice, Portland, handicapped employment representative for the State Unemployment Compensation Commission; Al Zander, Portland, West Coast Lumbermen's Association public relations director; Mickey McGuire, Portland, Buttermakers Union representative.

Mayor Robert F. White is scheduled to welcome the delegates at a 9 a.m. meeting Saturday.

A district board meeting is scheduled for Friday night, to be followed by entertainment which will include a wheelchair square dance.

New district officers will hold their first meetings Sunday.

Area Firemen Attend School At 4 Corners

FOUR CORNERS—Firemen from several mid-Willamette Valley departments attended the Four Corners and Keizer area weekend Firemen's Training School which opened here Saturday.

Mostly volunteers from St. Paul, Woodburn, Keizer, Liberty-Salem Heights, Sublimity and Four Corners watched a demonstration of tandem pumping on Mill Creek behind the State Prison.

This type of pumping is used when water has to be drawn from a great distance from the fire. Pumper trucks line up at 500-foot intervals to keep up pressure in the hose.

Cecil Dill, instructor for the State Fire Safety Training program, also conducted an inspection and pre-fire planning program of the Fred Smith Lumber Co. here. The 20 firemen present studied layouts of buildings and streets and location of hydrants and prepared diagrams of how they would combat a serious fire at the lumber yard.

Sunday's classes will include demonstration on controlling and extinguishing liquified petroleum and gas fires. The classes are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Four Corners Fire Hall.

Two Students Held After Bombing At Eugene School

EUGENE (AP)—Two South Eugene High School students were accused Saturday of planting two home-made bombs that blew up four lockers at the school.

No one was injured, but the lockers were wrecked in the explosion Friday.

The students arrested were John Patrick Seeley, 18, and James C. Williams, 17.

Oregon's Junior Chamber of Commerce's sponsored teen-age driving Road-o ended in Clatskanie Saturday with Ron Timpe of Portland winning first place.

Douglas Hirtle of Lyons was second and Eland Herring of Newberg placed third. Timpe won with 528 points out of a total of 568. Hirtle received 507 and Herring had 488.

Jerry Harding of Stayton placed fourth. Ken Simila of Salem seventh and Jim Heater of Sublimity finished tenth with over 50 boys and girls competing in the state finals.

No Cars Downtown, Electric Power From Sun Seen in Cities by 2000

WASHINGTON (AP)—In 2000 A.D., a mere 42 years from now, autos will be barred from downtown—above ground, at least.

Low cost housing projects built in the 1940s and 1950s will have become slums and bulldozed out of existence.

Electric power will be generated by the sun's rays and transmitted without wires.

Main highways will be double-decked, autos above and trucks below, and the highways will be equipped with built-in heating elements to melt ice and snow.

These predictions on the turn of the millennium will be sealed into the cornerstone of the new headquarters building of the Associated General Contractors of America.

On Tuesday Vice President Nixon will dedicate the structure and place in the cornerstone a chest holding the forecasts by editors of architectural, engineering and construction journals.

"The nobility of the city will return," said the prediction of Joseph Watterson, editor of The Journal of the American Institute of Architects.

"Through the suppression of traffic and the creation of neighborhoods, communal life will return to the streets, similar to that of the medieval cities. The city will come into its proper place in the scheme of life, as a delightful place to live and to work."

The editors see city-center traffic carried on fast, clean transit lines in depressed rights of way, or high in the air; they will carry car owners to the fringes of the city where their autos will wait in municipal garages.

Business centers will be rebuilt with spreading buildings—and some skyscrapers, retained largely for prestige or historical interest—set in landscaped malls.

Highways of the 21st century will be built, according to Col. W. A. Hardenbergh, editor of Public Works magazine, fusing earth and stone on the spot with portable atomic reactors to form the road foundation.

While nuclear fuel may be the chief energy source in the rest of the world, George B. Roscoe, editor of Qualified Contractor magazine believes North America may generally skip atomic power.

Coal, oil, and gas are abundant here, Roscoe reasoned, so this continent may move directly to solar energy for heating homes and running smokeless factories.

The outer and inner walls of houses may be made of lightweight aluminum panels coated with colorful porcelain enamel glass. These can be made fluorescent so the walls will glow for lighting, or so thinks J. J. Svec, assistant publisher of Building Construction Illustrated.

Airfields will be cities themselves, linked to the metropolis by small plane and helicopters.

Ex-Flame of Peron Wed In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Nelly Rivas, the shapely teen-ager who was wooed by dictator Juan D. Peron, donned a simple beige dress and a lace shawl Friday and became the bride of a clerk in the U. S. embassy. He is an Argentine.

Nelly, now 19, popped suddenly into the news in 1955 when Peron was kicked out as dictator. Letters found among Peron's belongings revealed a romance between the two.

She was only 13—the daughter of a poor Argentine living near the Presidential Palace—when first spotted her. He took her into the palace and lavished upon her furs and jewels that once belonged to his late wife, Eva. But her father said Saturday:

"The past is the past. That episode in her life is all over. She's married now and wants to start a new life."

Her new life is Carlos Ramil, 24, who works in the accounting department of the U. S. Embassy. He has taken a leave of absence of several weeks.

The sheriff said Miller and four other youths from Halfway were on their way to Cambridge, where Miller's girl friend lives, when they stopped on a rural road to try a few shots with a pistol Miller had just bought.

Miller stuck the gun out an open window and tried to twist it. The gun fired, and the bullet hit Miller in the chest, the sheriff said.

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King's Relative Convicted of Plot on Nasser

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP)—King Saud's father-in-law was convicted Saturday of plotting to assassinate President Nasser and sentenced to life imprisonment.

A three-man military tribunal tried the father-in-law, Asad Ibrahim Meri, and his brother, Majed Ibrahim Meri, in absentia. The brother also got a life sentence.

Both defendants were found guilty of plotting at King Saud's instigation to assassinate Nasser and launch a military coup d'etat in Syria. Syria charged the plot was designed to sabotage the Egyptian-Syrian merger of last February into the United Arab Republic, headed by Nasser. Saudi Arabia denied the charge.

Firemen Make Needless Trip

SILVERTON—Silverton Fire Department was called by a passerby to the scene of a turkey-shed fire Saturday night west of Silverton only to find that the sheds were being destroyed by the owner.

The run was made about 6:45 p.m. to the Howard Kyrk turkey farm on Silverton Rd. 3, Box 184, about one mile outside the city. Capt. Dentil Legard said several turkey sheds and a large chicken-house were burned.

He pointed out that firefighters could have been saved the trip if Kyrk had obtained a permit for the fire.

Education Key to Erasing Prejudice, Gov. Holmes Says
