LUCO DI MUGELLO, Italy (AP)-Fido, the old dog who won a gold medal for remaining faithful to his dead master, died Mon-

The white mongrel with brown ears fell over dead as he was run-ning to meet the bus from nearby Borgo San Lorenzo, as he has done every day for the last 144 years in the futile hope that his master would return home on it. Fido's exact age was not known.

His master, Carlo Soriani, fished him wet and shivering from a river during World War II, and gave him a home. The name Soriani gave to the puppy means Used to Ride Bus

Soriani used to ride the bus every morning to work at a factory at nearby Borgo San Lorenzo. in this valley of Mugello, near Florence. For two years Fido followed

him to the bus stop in the square and waited there until Soriani returned in the evening.

One day an Allied air attack destroyed the Borgo factory and killed Soriani. That night the bus returned from Borgo without Soriani. But each night since then Fido met the bus. He soon started to sleep under it, since the bus remained in Luco's square over-
