

# Reich Denies U.S. Airmen Will Face Charges of Spying

BERLIN (AP)—Red-ruled East Germany Tuesday night disavowed any intention of bringing spy charges against nine U.S. Army helicopter men stranded in the Communist zone.

The Defense Ministry implied in a statement that the only charge involved in the case of the straying helicopter is violation of East German air space.

It repeated the ministry's official newspaper Volksarmee and said an editor had been disciplined for printing a hint that the eight officers and sergeant who made a forced landing after crossing the Iron Curtain in a storm Saturday might be treated as spies.

"Such a combination is wrong and misleading," the ministry said.

## Dulles Indicates Dealing

The repudiation came a few hours after Secretary of State Dulles announced in Washington the United States would deal with the East Germans if necessary to obtain the Americans' release. But he told a news conference this would carry no implication of recognition.

The Soviet Union, to whom American authorities first appealed, have sought to use the case to needle the United States into recognizing East Germany's Red government. A Soviet Embassy spokesman here insisted U.S. officials ask the East German government directly for their release.

The Dulles announcement and the East German statement seem to open the way for a settlement if and when negotiations can be opened between East Germans and American officials.

Dulles at the same time denounced the East Germans as kidnappers.

The United States has repeatedly emphasized it will not recognize the regime and insists on free elections for a unified Germany.

Dulles' statement caught State Department officials here by surprise. U.S. authorities had been operating with strict instructions to have no verbal or written deal.

# Macmillan, Dulles Confer For 2½ Hours

WASHINGTON (AP)—British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Secretary of State Dulles conferred for 2½ hours Tuesday, chiefly about new ways to help needy nations.

"We had very good talks," Macmillan told reporters at the State Department.

"We covered a wide range of topics, mainly economic," he added.

Macmillan left the State Department for the British Embassy to prepare for a White House "working dinner," where the chief topic was reported to be the question of suspension of nuclear tests.

The chief clue to the dinner topic was the lineup of guests. The White House has been maintaining a tight blanket of secrecy about subjects under discussion. But both Lewis L. Strauss and Sir Edwin Plowden, atomic chiefs in the two countries, were on the dinner guest list.

Dulles told his news conference, prior to meeting Macmillan, that economic matters were uppermost on the schedule.

The State Department press chief, Lincoln White, told newsmen no decisions were taken at the Macmillan-Dulles meeting.

"The emphasis in the talks Tuesday afternoon was on economic and financial problems," White said. "These consisted merely of a general exchange of views."

# Pacific Atom Test Revealed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The fifth nuclear detonation in this year's test series in the mid-Pacific took place at 12:30 p.m. EST Tuesday, the government announced.

The joint announcement by the Atomic Energy Commission and the Defense Department said merely:

"A nuclear test detonation took place at 5:30 a.m., June 11, 1958, Eniwetok time (12:30 p.m., June 10, 1958, EST) at the Bikini atoll. The test is part of the Hardtack nuclear weapons test series under way at the Eniwetok proving ground."

The first announced test in the series, officially designated "hard-tack" was officially confirmed May 7 after Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) made public the April 28 explosion.

# Textron Sells Coquille Mills

NEW YORK (AP)—Textron Inc. sold its Coquille plywood division to interests affiliated with Roseburg Lumber Co. of Roseburg, Ore.

Coquille has three plywood mills at Coquille, Bandon and Norway, Ore. According to Textron these operations will be carried on by the Douglas Fir Plywood Co. Kenneth W. Ford, head of Douglas Fir, is also president of Roseburg Lumber Co.

Chairman Royal Little recently estimated that Textron lost about two million dollars last year on plywood operations. It acquired the Coquille plant in 1955 and the two other Oregon plants in 1956.

# Pendleton Youth Wins FFA Grand Championship

THE DALLES, Ore. (AP)—A 17-year-old Pendleton youth Tuesday won his fourth grand championship in the Future Farmers of America steer division of the Oregon Wheat League fat stock show here.

Mike Thorne had won the grand championship three times in the past four shows. The other time he won the reserve championship.

Mike Gray, Heppner, took the reserve championship. Both the champion and the reserve were Herefords.

# Oregon State Grange Opens Convention

EUGENE (AP)—More than 1,000 delegates Tuesday opened a series of closed business sessions at the 85th annual convention of the Oregon State Grange.

The sessions will continue through Friday, when the meeting ends with installation of officers. One of the key meetings scheduled will be Wednesday's session of the Grange's state agriculture committee. It will be open.

Delegates heard the president of the University of Oregon say in a welcoming address that "Our discontents on the farms are not discontents of hunger and want. They are not discontents of famine, but of surplus," Dr. O. Meredith Wilson said.

"The power potential of man has been barely touched. The grain bins are filled and poverty could be made old-fashioned by science."

But this same laboratory also is capable of wiping out whole cities," he said.

Wilson noted some of the periods of great discontent in this nation's history, particularly strife over grain prices in the late 19th century.

"We must remind ourselves of these things or we will think that we are the first generation to have discontents," he said.

# Former Wife Of John Jacob Astor Dies

NEW YORK (AP)—Mrs. Thomas Lister, 88, widow of Britain's fourth Baron Ribblesdale and one-time wife of the late John Jacob Astor, died Monday night at her Park avenue home.

She was known as Lady Ribblesdale until she renounced the title and her British citizenship in 1940. She originally was Ava Willing of Newport, R.I.

At the age of 21, she married Astor. They had a son, Vincent Astor, and a daughter who died in 1956. They were divorced in 1909 and Astor died in 1912 in the sinking of the Titanic.

Mrs. Astor made her home abroad for many years. In 1919 she was married to Lister. He died in 1925. She returned to this country early in World War II.

# New Tempest Challenges Prince's Rule

MONTE CARLO, Monaco (AP)—Another political tempest blew in this tiny principality Tuesday. The 18 representatives making up the National Council of Monaco voted unanimously Monday night for a motion which, in effect, challenges Prince Rainier's sovereignty.

The motion called on the Prince to annul a month old ordinance creating an administrative appeal court. Monacans at first had greeted the ordinance as the Prince's first step toward liberalizing the monarchy.

Since then Monacan assemblymen have had second thoughts. The ordinance provides that Monacans can appeal to the new court against any administrative measure, such as arbitrary expulsions from estates. But it also provides that Prince Rainier keeps the privilege of overruling the court.

This prompted the Assembly's vice chairman, Auguste Medecin, to complain that the ordinance constituted "not progress on the way to reforms but a step back."

The Prince's ministers walked out of the council in protest when the motion calling for abrogation of the ordinance was voted.

# Former Educator Voted Into South Carolina Demo Race

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP)—Lt. Gov. Ernest F. Hollings and Donald Russell, former University of South Carolina president, were voted into a runoff election Tuesday night in the South Carolina Democratic primary for governor.

Hollings, 38-year-old Charleston lawyer who received heavy rural and home county support, was struck by five bullets as he sat in the office of Sheriff William J. Weatherly listening to election returns. He died in the emergency room at the hospital 10 minutes later.

Rogers, 67, was arrested and held without bond. Police said the shooting resulted from "a personal matter" between the two men. Wallace's opponent in the primary was William A. Rogers, a distant relative of Henry A. Rogers. Officers said the shooting apparently had nothing to do with the primary.

Wallace was a large landowner whose home was some 18 miles from here. He had served in the State Senate since 1947.

# Nun Tells How Fire Started That Killed 12

WILLIAM LAKE, B. C. (CP)—Sister Mary of the Cross, heroic young Roman Catholic nun, testified from her hospital bed Tuesday that she poured an inflammable liquid into a stove May 28, touching off an explosion and fire which killed 12 Indian children.

It was the first word of the cause behind the tragedy at the hospital and school on the Anahim Reserve, 70 miles west of here in the Cariboo cattle country.

The sister said she believed she was using coal oil.

The coroner's jury, to which she gave the statement, found that the deaths of the 12 children were accidental, with no blame attached to anyone.

# Talkathon Ends After 38 Hours

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. (AP)—Thirty-eight hours, 41 minutes and 50 seconds of nonstop talking won for Mrs. Frank Williams Tuesday the title: The World's Biggest talkathon.

Mrs. Williams, a Fayetteville housewife and last of the six contestants, won the talkathon sponsored by a local appliance store. The contest started at 10:30 a.m. June 2 and ended at 4:14 p.m. Tuesday when Mrs. Williams shut up.

Each of the contestants, successively, claimed a world's record. A local television personality, Ernie E. wife of an Army colonel stationed at nearby Ft. Bragg, at 5:07 p.m. started trying to make good her initial challenge to outtalk all comers. She was not eligible, however, for the \$1,500 worth of prizes awarded the contestants by the store.

Contestants were allowed 2½ minutes of golden silence each hour.

# Farm Employment Rises During May

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department reported Tuesday that farm employment increased 14 per cent during May and was running 2 per cent higher than a year earlier.

The department said increases from late April to late May were larger than usual for both farm families and hired workers. The number of hired workers was 10 per cent above that of a year earlier.

# Man Dies of Burns From Fiery Blast

HUNTINGTON, Ore. (AP)—De-saire Suire, 46, a cook at Huntington High School, died Tuesday afternoon from burns received in a fiery explosion Monday.

He died at Holy Rosary Hospital in nearby Ontario. Janitor Earl Burgess, 36, who rescued Suire from the flames, was still in poor condition at the hospital.

Huntington City Marshall John Umbarger said Suire was spreading wax remover on the floor of a room in the school when a spark from his floor sander apparently ignited it.

He was immediately engulfed in flames. Umbarger said Burgess heard the explosion, rushed in and pulled Suire outside, he added.

The Marshall said Burgess' clothes caught fire but he put the flames out with a garden hose. Umbarger said Burgess had third degree burns over half of his body, and Suire has third degree burns over 90 per cent of his body.

The blaze burned into the hallway of the school but firemen extinguished it in half an hour.

Suire worked as a janitor at the school during summer vacations.

# Man Pleads Innocent in Gunshot Case

Willard Alexander McBee, facing a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, tried to plead guilty in Marion County District Court Tuesday and then changed his mind.

The Keno, Ore., man, who is accused of wounding his mother-in-law in a gun battle Sunday asked District Judge E. O. Stadler Jr. if he could plead guilty and be sentenced, "to get it over with."

But when informed he could not be sentenced in the lower court, McBee indicated he would plead innocent.

Judge Stadler then set July 3 at 10 a.m. as the date for a preliminary hearing providing Mrs. Rose May Landis, 63, McBee's mother-in-law, is sufficiently recovered to appear in court. She is now in Salem Memorial Hospital recovering from a gunshot wound in the abdomen.

McBee, speaking for himself, appeared in court without an attorney. He is being held on \$10,000 bail.

Another charge, that of carrying a concealed weapon, is pending against McBee, a former Klamath Falls area electrician.

# Grasshopper War Started In Colorado

DENVER (AP)—The battle is on to save eastern Colorado's multimillion dollar wheat crop from destruction by grasshoppers.

Eight planes loaded with poison are spraying parts of nine million acres of cropland and pasture in 17 counties. Much of the area is planted in wheat and the crop is valued at 110 million dollars.

The Colorado Agriculture Department is using its own money to spray 300,000 acres. Emergency action was ordered to kill the hoppers before they develop wings and migrate to other lush grain fields. If the pests aren't killed by mid-June it may be too late. Full-scale operations are to begin Thursday.

The hoppers now number up to 400 to the square yard, about 60 times the normal danger point.

Frightened farmers have already started their own ground and aerial spray programs.

They decided not to wait for action by President Eisenhower declaring the 17 counties a disaster area and eligible for federal aid. Gov. Steve McNichols has asked for up to 10 million dollars in federal emergency funds.

More than 2,000 delegates are expected to attend the 43rd Esperanto Congress in Mainz, Germany, in August.

# City Planners Give Attention to Development of Northern Fringe

(Story also on page 1.)  
Development of the north fringe of Salem held the spotlight through most of a Salem Planning Commission meeting Tuesday night.

The commission recommended an attempt to annex a 307-acre area eyed for industrial development west of Portland Road. And it held a public hearing on a zoning change request aimed at a \$2-million business development between North River Road and Broadway.

No objections were voiced to the proposed zoning change from R1 residential to C3 business. Atty. Kenneth Sherman explained plans for the 18-acre area at the north end of Liberty and 4th streets. The commission took no action.

# Higher Buildings Permitted

Questioned by commissioners, Sherman said the more liberal C3 zoning was requested to permit higher buildings and more warehousing. He said that C2 zoning would be satisfactory when assured that it would not restrict retail storage facilities.

Sherman agreed with several commissioners who said large warehouses would be unsuitable in the area.

Sherman said the development would take several years and the zoning change is necessary before property commitments can be made. Developer is State Finance Co.

On the annexation question, city engineer Harold Davis objected to addition of the potential industrial area to a residential area west of Cherry Avenue where residents have requested annexation. He said it is "breaking faith with the people" petitioning annexation.

He did not elaborate but discussion indicated a possibility that enlarging the annexation area might work to defeat the measure at the polls. A large proposed annexation to East Salem was rejected by residents of that area in a recent election.

Mathewson Defends Proposal  
City Mgr. Kent Mathewson defended the recommendation. "It appears that the committee is trying to take them in without undue cost to present city taxpayers," he said.

Potential street developments in North Salem also got an airing in the business zoning hearing.

Sherman said the developers would cooperate willingly in any future extension of Liberty Street north to River Road to form a one-way couplet with Commercial Street, a possible future connection to the area northwest, and another cross street between Liberty Street and Broadway.

The area, which laps over the city line, now includes Morrison Avenue.

In other action at the regular meeting Tuesday night in City Hall, the commission:

Approved a committee recommendation to widen rights-of-way

for Veall and Moyer lanes NW, now 30 feet, to 50 feet, and a possible extension of Moyer Lane into Wallace Marine Park. The streets are in an area annexed to the city this spring.

Recommended rezoning from R1 to the more liberal R4 residential classification for the remaining R1 area of the old Veterans Housing Colony near Paulus Bros. cannery. A request for M1 light industrial zoning of part of the area was deferred.

Recommended vacation of a stub of Evans Avenue which dead-ends at Cummings Schoolgrounds in the Keizer area. A 10-foot strip is to be reserved for a walk between Chehalis Avenue and the school grounds.

No arguments were voiced at a public hearing on a request by St. Vincent de Paul Parish for permission to construct a 99-foot church steeple, which exceeds the height restrictions in an R1 zone. The commission took no action.

A request by Oregon Navigators, a religious youth group, to construct a club building in an R1 zone on the north side of the 1400 block of Chemeketa Street NE was withdrawn by the petitioners.
