

New Warning Plans Failed For 'Wrong-Way' Tornado

(Picture on wirephoto page.) EL DORADO, Kan. (AP) — A wrong-way tornado that came at El Dorado from the northwest instead of the southwest Tuesday, killing 13 persons and injuring 57 others, caused at least two million dollars damage.

"And that's only a rough estimate," City Manager Stanley Dial said today.

The twister cut through a residential area on the southwest edge of town, leaving a swath four blocks wide and a mile long.

The estimate of the loss was made by the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

Marion-Polk Agencies Linked by Committee

Five major governmental agencies in Marion and Polk counties linked themselves Wednesday into a cooperative committee to improve public services while lowering costs.

Salem, city, two counties and Salem School District joined hands in a meeting in Hotel Marion. The group elected Marion County Judge Rex Hartley as chairman and Salem city manager Kent Mathewson secretary, and authorized them to prepare plans for study.

Discussion indicated that the committee will delve first into the possibilities of inter-governmental cooperation for parks, recreation, purchasing, engineering, fire protection, equipment maintenance, and Capitol Area building plans.

The committee grew out of a recommendation in a recent city budget message by Mathewson, who said, "A pooling of these vast resources (of the agencies involved) on a cooperative basis can provide for our citizens an unmatched community while saving thousands of tax dollars."

The agencies, and their representatives who attended the meeting were Marion County (Judge Hartley); Polk County (County Judge C. M. Barnhart); City of Salem (Mayor Robert F. White and Mathewson); State of Oregon, as it pertains to the immediate area (State Finance Director John F. Richardson); Salem School District 24CJ (Board Chairman Gardner Knapp).

Housing Bill Approved By Solons

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Banking Committee voted Wednesday for a multi-billion-dollar housing bill going far beyond what the Eisenhower administration asked.

Among its key points the bill calls for:

- A six-year, \$2,100,000,000 urban renewal program much more costly than the administration wanted.
- A bitterly contested public housing program for low-income families. It would authorize construction of 35,000 additional low-rental units.

Family to Take Nunn Ruling To High Court

A test of Gov. Robert D. Holmes' authority to commute the death sentence of convicted killer Billy Nunn will be taken to the Oregon Supreme Court.

Formal notice was filed Wednesday in Marion County Circuit Court by Mr. and Mrs. John Eacret of Klamath Falls to appeal a decision by Judge Val D. Sloper.

Judge Sloper's ruling last April contended that the court had no jurisdiction as to the governor's right to commute death sentences.

The Eacrets are the parents of 14-year-old Alvin Eacret, for whose death Nunn was convicted.

Nunn's execution, originally scheduled in March, has been delayed by Holmes pending final outcome of court proceedings in the matter.

Holmes has said that he is opposed to capital punishment on religious grounds and because he is not convinced that the death penalty is a deterrent to murder.

Opponent of A-Tests Sails From Hawaii

HONOLULU (AP)—Another opponent of nuclear tests, sailed with his family Wednesday night for Japan on a voyage that may take them into the forbidden Pacific nuclear testing grounds around Eniwetok.

Earle L. Reynolds, an anthropologist, cast off at sunset in his 80-foot ketch "Phoenix of Hiroshima." On board also were his wife, his son, 17, his daughter, Jessica, 14, and Japanese crewman Nick Nikami, 35, of Hiroshima.

Reynolds and his family are supporters of the pacifist crew of the ketch Golden Rule. All five Golden Rule crew men are in jail for defying Atomic Energy Commission policy and a federal court injunction against trying to enter the nuclear test area.

Missionary Succumbs

PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y. (AP)—Dr. Sam Higginbottom, 83, long-time Presbyterian educational missionary and founder of an agricultural school in India, died Wednesday.

De Gaulle Slaps Down Insurgents in Algeria

PARIS (AP) — Premier de Gaulle slapped down the insurgent Committee of Public Safety in Algiers for challenging his program of equality in Algeria.

De Gaulle sent his military commander in Algeria, Gen. Raoul Salan, a blistering cable Wednesday telling him to free himself of any political ideas put forward by the committee.

De Gaulle's words, in effect, applied to paratrooper Brig. Gen. Jacques Massu and other military men still working with the public safety committees that sprung up after the May 13 revolt.

Plan Opposed

The committee Tuesday adopted a resolution opposing De Gaulle's plan for holding local elections in Algeria. The committee also called for a housecleaning in Paris.

De Gaulle's stern words provoked immediate rifts in the Algerian committee and threatened a showdown with the right-wingers, whose revolt propelled De Gaulle back to power.

De Gaulle's Cabinet approved an invitation to Secretary of State Dulles to visit Paris and confer with De Gaulle July 5. The Dulles meeting could be in conjunction with similar meetings of De Gaulle with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Efforts Rejected

On the domestic front, De Gaulle rejected efforts by the National Assembly to question his ministers. Although the Assembly is in recess — at De Gaulle's insistence — its committees remain in Paris. Several had asked for reports from ministers, primarily Finance Minister Antoine Pinay.

Pinay sent word that he had no authorization from De Gaulle to appear. The foreign affairs, overseas territories and the labor committees had also wanted reports.

Land Added To County's Soil District

WOODBURN — Property owners in this area decided by referendum vote Wednesday to add 80,000 acres of land to the Marion County Soil Conservation District.

With a favorable 182 out of a total of 222 votes cast, virtually all of Marion County is now in the soil district.

The district soil program, with headquarters in Mt. Angel, aids farmers and land holders with conservation problems and advanced methods of better land use through irrigation.

The "annexed" area lies in the northwest section of the county, north of Wheatland Ferry and west of Highway 99E.

Halfway Banker Pleads Guilty to Embezzlement

PORTLAND (AP)—Clair Ritter, 52, Wednesday pleaded guilty to embezzling \$99,000 from a bank in Halfway, Ore.

The small, mild-mannered cashier of the now-closed First National Bank of Halfway entered the plea in a voice that was barely audible.

U.S. Dist. Judge William East delayed sentencing pending a probation office investigation. Ritter is free on \$10,000 bail.

The independent bank in the small Eastern Oregon town has been closed since the shortage was discovered three months ago.

It is being liquidated by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Asst. U.S. Atty. Robert Carney said Ritter probably will be able to pay back almost all the money.

Hiding Groom Now Wanted By Policemen

SEATTLE (AP) — Remember that game of hide and seek Mr. and Mrs. Jack C. Simpson never finished playing in a vacant lot here early Wednesday morning?

Well, now they both are playing hide and seek with cops, friends and families all over the Pacific Northwest.

Mrs. Simpson reported to Seattle police Wednesday she and her husband started the game of hide and seek in the early morning hours while on a honeymoon visit to Seattle. But Simpson hid too well, she said, and she never did find him. Neither has anyone else.

Said She Was 23

At the time she gave her age as 20 and said her husband of a few days was a 27-year-old disc jockey.

Today, an all points bulletin was issued by police for a pickup of Simpson. Judge said he failed to show up in Yakima, Wash., Monday to answer a second degree assault charge. Simpson is accused of pistol whipping a guest at Simpson's wedding the night of May 31.

Seattle police also said they wish to discuss some other matters with him which they were not at liberty to divulge.

Then, Walla Walla police asked that Mrs. Simpson be picked up as a runaway. Her father, Casper Carter, a correctional sergeant at the state penitentiary in Walla Walla, said his daughter wasn't 20.

"She's only 15 years old," Carter reported, and she didn't have his permission to marry.

The pickup order was too late, however. Judge said a person had checked out, police were told by hotel officials where she had stayed here, and left no forwarding address.

Simpson once was a disc jockey for a Walla Walla radio station and later for one in Yakima. He hadn't stayed much longer in either station, however, than he did in that vacant lot here.

EUGENE (AP) — The annual meeting of the Oregon Grange continued here Wednesday with a panel discussion on methods of increasing the volume of agriculture cooperatives.

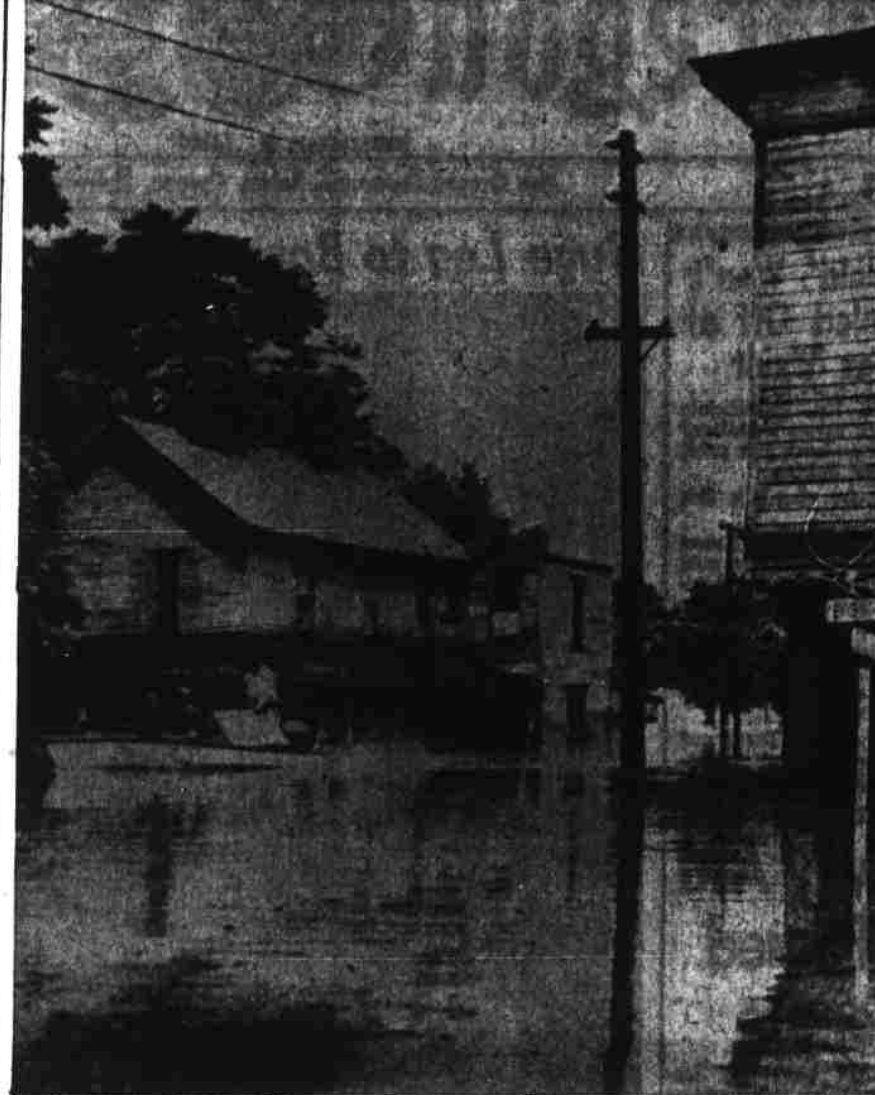
A panel headed by J. R. Beck of Oregon State College agreed that Oregon co-ops could double their volume if their members would patronize them more.

Feelings High After Florida Family Beaten

BONIFAY, Fla. (AP)—Two Negroes were sought Wednesday night in the beating of five members of a young white family, and the rape of the wife. Two members of the family died. Only a 2-month-old baby escaped unhurt.

Feelings were running high in the community.

Sheriff Cletus Andrews said doctors who examined the woman reported she had been raped. He quoted her as saying that two Negroes were responsible for the early morning attacks.

Tenant Farmer Dead

Imagene Carnley, 26-year-old tenant farmer and pulpwood worker, was found dead in his small farm house. A 2-year-old daughter, Ernestine, died a few hours later.

In critical condition were Carnley's wife, 21; a 6-year-old son, Hershel Gene; and a 5-year-old daughter, Geraldine.

They were in a hospital, which also was caring for the baby, Bobby Ray.

Mike Darley, reporter for the Panama City News-Herald, reported that 150-200 people were at the Carnley home throughout the day and that there was a lot of mob talk.

Woman Gives Story

Mrs. Carnley gave this account: She and the baby were sleeping in a bedroom off the living room when she heard blows. She stepped into the other room and saw that her husband had been killed. One of the Negroes grabbed her and raped her, then beat her. She said she did not know if the other man attacked her.

When the children tried to help her, the men hit them with a weapon.

Thousands Evacuate Flood Area Along Indiana River

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Peru Disaster Committee ordered 1,000 residents from their homes on the south side of Peru Wednesday night as the rising Wabash River lapped at sandbags on top of the floodwall.

The surging river threatened serious flooding as far downstream as Terre Haute.

The rate of rise at Peru, 77 miles north of Indianapolis, increased to one-fifth of a foot an hour. A narrow barrier of sandbags placed by high school boys on top of the wall was all that kept the river out of the city.

Water Seeping Through

Water was seeping through the walls, through the sandbags and through the pavement of the street along the wall. Airmen from Bunker Hill Air Force Base patrolled the levee.

Fourteen miles upstream at Wabash the river crested at 3 p.m.

Three days of cloudbursts across north-central Indiana had sent many streams out of their banks. Hundreds had been driven from their homes by the rising water.

As the Wabash River crest approached Peru, a city of 14,000, high school students and other volunteers joined civil defense workers and National Guardsmen in piling sandbags atop the flood wall.

Emergency Infirmary

Thousands of cots were set up in the high school gymnasium and four churches. Doctors and nurses were lined up for an emergency infirmary.

Policeman Cleared of Assault Count

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—A policeman was cleared of an assault charge shortly after a key witness was declared in contempt of court Wednesday.

Circuit Judge David Vandenberg ordered dismissed an indictment which had charged John Wilson with assault, with a dangerous weapon.

Wilson was suspended from the police force shortly after the indictment was returned last winter.

Witness Absent

The trial began Wednesday and was interrupted when Cloyd Cloud, 51, a key state witness, did not appear in court.

Judge Vandenberg, after a check, said the clock in the cafe and courthouse showed identical times.

He then declared Cloud in contempt and ordered him to the custody of the sheriff.

It was then that Dist. Atty. Arthur Beddie asked that the indictment be dismissed because the state could not prove the charge. Vandenberg granted the dismissal.

Earlier Wednesday, Dr. Calvin Hunt said he had examined Cloud last November and said he thought the fractures were caused by a fall.

Storm Hits Wichita Area

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—A storm that may have included a tornado damaged about 25 houses in Northeast Wichita late Wednesday night, causing injuries to a number of persons.

Only one person was hospitalized, police said. Others suffered cuts and bruises.

A rash of tornadoes broke out in this South Central Kansas area.

The Wichita Weather Bureau issued an all-clear for nine counties at 12:15 a.m. (CST).

Residents of the area were jittery since a big tornado killed 13 persons and destroyed 289 homes at El Dorado, 35 miles northeast of Wichita, late Tuesday.

The Weather Bureau said its first report of a tornado was near Arkansas City, Kan., on the Oklahoma border southeast of Wichita at 10:56 p.m.

A second funnel was reported at Wichita's northeast edge at 11:20 p.m., a third 30 miles north of Wichita near Newton at 11:55 p.m. and a fourth at the same time 30 miles southwest of Wichita near Wellington.

School Board To Consider Pool Project

Outside toilets at the city's two public swimming pools, deleted from pool renovation plans this spring to cut costs, were on their way back Wednesday.

School District Supt. Charles D. Schmidt said that recent developments have lowered the estimated cost to the school district to the point where he will present the situation to the School Board at a regular meeting tonight.

Estimated cost to the schools is now \$2,400 with the city offering a like amount, Schmidt said. Earlier estimates were higher and the cost to the school would have been more than half.

The board also is expected to authorize calling for bids for a delivery truck and two-year contracts for ice cream and towel laundry, and to approve a Mid-Willamette Valley Planning Council plan for longrange arterial road development.

Leslie and Olinger pools which faced condemnation by the state, are being reconstructed by contractor E. E. Batterman along plans which were streamlined after all bids on original plans had to be thrown out because they were too expensive.

Schmidt said Wednesday both pools are expected to be ready for use next month.

Toilets outside the bathhouses for pool spectators were deleted from original plans in the streamlining. The city since then has appropriated money for the year starting July 1 to spend on the pools but school officials so far have resisted attempts to upset a budget which does not include any such expenditures.

Army's Huge Rocket Fired

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A huge Redstone rocket, the most advanced ballistic weapon in the U.S. arsenal, thundered into space Wednesday night.

The 63-foot Army missile streaked into the black Florida sky with a fiery burst of yellow flame at 9 p.m.

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — The Louisiana House with a lone protest passed eight segregation bills Wednesday authorizing the governor to close a public school facing racial integration.

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Fake U.S. Passport Ring Broken by Federal Agents

WASHINGTON (AP) — Smashing an Italian ring dealing in altered U.S. passports was reported by the State Department Wednesday.

It said this came about through cooperation by Italian, French and Netherlands authorities with U.S. State Department special security agents and immigration agents.

The department said the ring stole or otherwise obtained U.S. passports from American citizens in Milan, Rome, Naples, Massena, and elsewhere and took them to Palermo for alteration and sale.

It said the alteration amounted to substituting a picture of the buyer for that of the original passport owner, and stamping it with a fake U.S. seal.

Owen P. McShane, a special State Department security agent at Newark, N.J., announced early this week the arrests of eight alien passport bearers in this country, and said the faked documents sold for as much as \$1,200.

McShane also said that more than 200 American passports have been reported lost or "stolen" in Italy since January 1956.

The eight arrests in the United States were in New Jersey, New York City and Waterbury, Conn.

The State Department said three more have been arrested abroad — two in Italy and one in the Netherlands.

It added: "Some of the members of the ring are in flight in Europe and other users of the fake passports are being sought in the United States."

Swimmer Goes Through Shark Waters for Aid

PANACEA, Fla. (AP) — A 25-year-old Tallahassee man swam four miles through shark-infested Apalachee Bay waters Tuesday night to summon aid from the U.S. Coast Guard auxiliary for his disabled boat.

Capt. W. S. Schley, commandant of the auxiliary unit, said smoke from a nearby forest fire formed such a heavy haze over the water a patrol boat could not locate the craft.

The patrol boat went back out Wednesday and located the disabled boat, the Sea Sprite, with John Bates, 40, of Tallahassee aboard. Jim Stone, who made the marathon swim, and Bates were members of an oil company crew doing research work.

Schley said sharks and barracuda abound in the area where Stone did his swimming. Stone said he knew that but tried not to think about them. He said the swimming effort was pretty tiring but he suffered no ill effects.

The boat had broken down with a battery failure. Stone decided to swim for aid when they were unable to attract help.
