Many States Slow To Accept Aid of Jobless Pay Fund

WASHINGTON (AP)—The states are showing little inclination to rush into the Eisenhower administration's emergency unemployment relief program.

President Eisenhower has asked Congress for \$665,700,000 to finance the program on the assumption that all states will come into it and that 2,650,000 eligible unemployed will draw additional benefits for an average of 8 1/2 weeks.

An Associated Press survey shows that some states definitely plan to sign up—Pennsylvania has become the first state to do so—but that some want no part of the program. A great many more don't know what they are going to do. A number will reach decisions in the next few days.

Ast. Secretary of Labor Newell Brown predicted recently that all but a few of the states will go along.

Greatest Pressure

The greatest pressure to lengthen the period of payments naturally has built up in states with big populations and comparatively heavy unemployment.

In addition to Pennsylvania, governors of six states already have taken steps, or probably will, toward participation in the program. The states: New York, Michigan, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Minnesota, Maryland and Indiana.

Connecticut has extended its period of jobless payments without federal aid. Ohio and Illinois also may use their own reserve funds instead of obtaining federal loans, and possibly the Michigan legislature will take this course.

About half the states can participate in the federal program only if they amend their constitutions, hold referendums—Rhode Island has one coming up Tuesday—or get specific authority from their legislatures.

Special Sessions

In many instances it would be necessary for the governors to call special sessions to obtain legislative action. A number already have issued calls and several are considering doing so.

A few have no intention of summoning legislatures to special sessions. Some states, chiefly in the West and South, report that unemployment and economic conditions appear to be improving. In Kansas, unemployment has dropped below the 1937 level.

New York put through a stand-by law even before Congress enacted emergency legislation, and will begin extra jobless relief payments June 23.

The federal law, signed by President Eisenhower Wednesday, takes effect June 19 and expires next April 1. States may take advantage of it or not, as they choose.

Exhausted Benefits

In participating states, insured workers who have exhausted their benefits through prolonged unemployment will have the duration of payments extended 50 per cent. In states now paying benefits for 20 weeks, for example, the extension thus will be for another 10 weeks.

Most states provide compensation for 26 weeks. In these, idle workers will receive an additional 13 weeks of benefits.

Eisenhower has asked Congress to provide \$640,000,000, plus \$25,700,000 for expenses, on which the states could draw. The money is to be paid back in four years, from state appropriations, unemployment compensation reserve funds or higher unemployment compensation taxes collected from employers.

Queen Bestows Honors in Her Birthday List

LONDON (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II bestowed honors in her birthday list on a playwright, an actress, a soccer manager, a one-time Philadelphia, two royal surgeons and many others.

The honors list is a semiannual event on New Year's Day and on the Queen's selected date in June for her birthday celebration. This one ran to more than 2,300 names.

The honored surgeons participated in removing the tonsils of the Queen's children.

The ex-Philadelphia, a Briton for 40 years, was one of two men created barons in the listing. He is Sir Thomas Ellis Robins, 73, president of the British South Africa Co. His parents were U.S. Army Maj. Robert P. Robins and Mrs. Mary Ellis Robins. He became a naturalized Briton in 1918.

Oliver Poole, deputy chairman of the Conservative party, is the other new baron. He and Robins now may sit in the House of Lords.

Terrence Rattigan, 47-year-old playwright who has had hits in New York and London, was named a commander in the Order of the British Empire.

Civil Service Pay Boost Wins Backing

WASHINGTON (AP)—A 10 per cent pay increase for 1,021,000 civil service and other government employees was agreed on Thursday by Senate-House conferees.

The measure now goes back to the Senate and House for action on the conferees' report. If approved, as seems certain, it then will be sent to the White House.

In addition to the regular classified civil service employees, the bill would boost the pay of congressional and federal judiciary employees, Foreign Service officers, Atomic Energy Commission workers, and Veterans Administration medical service employees.

It would increase the federal payroll by about 542 million dollars a year. Because the pay boosts are retroactive to Jan. 1 of the first year's cost would be close to 800 million dollars.

The Senate-House conferees settled two remaining differences. They agreed to permit the creation of 599 new supergrade jobs paying \$13,000 to \$19,000 a year. The Senate had voted for 1,000 of these jobs and the House had limited the number to 38.

The conferees also agreed to give the full 10 per cent increase to 67,000 scientists and engineers who recently received pay raises because they were in hard-to-hire categories.

For bottom grade classified workers the bill would boost pay

from \$2,690-\$3,200 to \$2,960-\$3,530. Top grades would be raised from \$16,000 to \$17,500.

Swift and Co. paid 48 cents a pound for the top FFA hog owned by Jerry Harms of Canby. The animal weighed 190 pounds.

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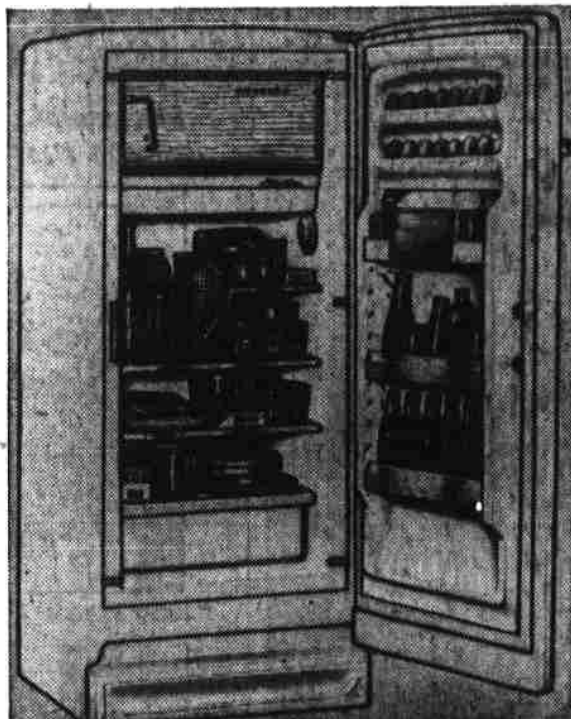
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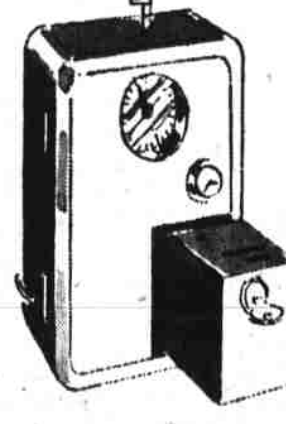
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
