(Continued from preceding page) the only United States citizen ever to break four minutes in the mile, has been pointing for this mile test.

A bulk field of about 45 is in the race, however, and the top performers may lose valuable time in jockeying for position.

The USC Trojans, who have won the national collegiate team title 19 times, return to action after sitting out last year's competition because of penalties incurred by illegal aid to football players.

UCLA, winner in 1956, remains ineligible because of the penalties as does Washington.

Villanova, led by Delany who won the mile and placed second in the 800, took last year's team title with 47 points to 32 for run-

up California.

In the individual performances, McMurray won the 440 in 45.8, Bowden the 800 in 1:47.2, Delany the mile in 4:06.5, Jones the two-mile in 8:57.6, Bell the broad jump in 26-7, Oerter the discus with 185 feet 4, and Fromm the javelin with 248-1, and Stewart tied with Al Urbanckas in the high jump at 6-7 1/2.

Those defending champions all face stiff competition. Both Davis and Eddie Southern of the University of Texas have run far better than McMurray's winning time in the quarter mile last year. Jones must handle USC's great Max Truex and Stewart faces world record holder Dumas of USC who cleared 7 feet 1/2 inch two years ago.

Bell rates a good chance of beating a 25-year-old world record of 26-1 1/2 by Jesse Owens in the broad jump, but Ernie Shelby of Kansas also jumps in that vicinity.

Oerter threw the discus 202-2 early this spring to better the world record, but USC's Rink Babka has thrown 196-10.

Saturday's mile run gets most of the attention with the Delany-Bowden duel such runners as Oregon's Jim Grell, runner-up Australian attending Arizona State College who has 11 best time of 4:03.1 this year, and Joe Villarreal of Texas with 4:06.2.

Delany's best time this season is 4:07.5 while Bowden has a 4:03.1.

Tim Tam's Race Career Finished

Operation Slated on Ankle

NEW YORK (AP)—Tim Tam, who won four major 3-year-old races including the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness, will never race again because of an ankle injury suffered during the running of the Belmont Stakes.

Jimmy Jones, who trains the Calumet Farm horses for Mrs. Gene Markey of Lexington, Ky., said Tim Tam would undergo an operation next week at the University of Pennsylvania's school of veterinary medicine in Philadelphia. The operation may be performed Tuesday or Wednesday.

"I have no hopes he'll ever race again," said Jones after examining latest X-rays of the broken sesamoid bone in Tam Tam's right front ankle. This bone forms the knob at the back of the fetlock joint just above the hoof.

He's ruined, and about all we can do is save him for the stud," the trainer said. Jones had flown to New York from Chicago, and talked with his veterinarian, Dr. William O. Reed, at Belmont Park.

He also talked with Mrs. Markey on the Trans-Atlantic telephone. She is vacationing in Europe.

At first, Tim Tam was lying down in his stall, and his groom, Walter Perkin, prepared to resume ice pack treatment to help reduce the swelling. When the vet got up, he was in obvious pain for he barely touched the floor with the right foot and rested his weight on the left.

There are no facilities in New York for such an operation, and Tim Tam will be vanned to Philadelphia. A large operating table is available at the university.

At Philadelphia, Dr. Jacques Jenny said any final decision on the operation would be up to Jones and Reed.

Jenny is associate professor of surgery at the veterinary school and has performed the sesamoid operation on many horses. He said he had studied Tim Tam's X-rays and that the case was operable.

Tim Tam won eight straight races going into the mile and one half Belmont Stakes. In which he was attempting to complete the triple crown sweep. The break apparently took place as he battled for the lead with Cavan at the head of the stretch a quarter of a mile from the finish. Cavan drew off to win as Tim Tam bobbed.

Wightman Cup U.S. Slight Pick to Win

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Mrs. Dorothy Knode estimated Thursday the United States has a 60-40 chance of defeating Britain in the Wightman Cup this week.

"But I myself wouldn't like to put money on it," said the playing captain of America's tennis girls. "It looks like a close match."

The last time the British won this yearly contest was in 1956.

Five singles matches and two doubles will be played on the No. 1 grass court at the all-England Club in Wimbledon, starting Friday 8:30 a.m. (EST), and continuing Saturday, in the opener, Althea Gibson of New York takes on Britain's No. 1 women's tennis player, Shirley Bloomer.

Miss Gibson, holder of the U.S. and Wimbledon titles, is favored to win this and her singles match on Saturday against 17-year-old Christine Truman—the most promising of Britain's young players.

Nothing else rates as certain.

Mrs. Knode plays Miss Truman on the first day, and Miss Bloomer on the second. She defeated Miss Truman in two sets on their only previous meeting in Philadelphia last year and split her six 1957 matches against Miss Bloomer evenly.

In the other singles, Ann Haydon meets Mimi Arnold of Redwood City, Calif. Saturday. Miss Haydon is also a table tennis international with wide experience of top flight competition—and a good record.

The doubles matches will be: Mrs. Knode and Karol Fageros of Miami vs. Miss Bloomer and Miss Truman (Friday), Miss Gibson and Janet Hopps of Seattle vs. Ann Shilcock and Pat Ward (Saturday).
