**PORTLAND**-Only four Portland roses placed in the 11 top spots in this year's Portland Rose Show. Two of the sweepstakes prizes went to Corvallis growers—D. Curtis Mumford and P. W. Miller—with Washington growers taking the remainder. Both of the Corvallis growers have shown and placed in Salem rose shows.

Portland's Golden Rose Festival Thursday was drawing favorable comments all around from visitors who expressed satisfaction with the new arrangements.

This year the Festival Center is on S. W. Park. An art show and a trade fair at the Festival Center, both free to the public, are being enjoyed by thousands of visitors.

**Better Reception**  
The rose show itself, formerly held at the Public Auditorium on S.W. 3rd Street, was finding better reception, rose show officials said, in the Sunken Garden of the Masonic Temple this year. Competitive displays are many and a large section is reserved for the educational division where named roses are on exhibition.

Irvin B. Betzel, Eugene, one of the top winners at the recent Salem Rose Show, placed at the Portland show also with his Betzel's Pink, and Mrs. Earl W. Wells, Corvallis, took a blue on her first show.

Thursday night's stadium show, featuring Gloria Krieger, Indiana Women's Chorus, Jerry Colonna and Purdue Singers, at 8 p.m., and the Jazz Concert featuring Charlie Barnett, Red Nichols and Buddy De Franco at Shattuck School grounds, 8:30 p.m., will be repeated Friday night at the same hours.

## Salem Pool Work Speeds

Reconstruction of Salem's two public swimming pools is proceeding rapidly, according to general contractor Erwin E. Battersman. He said Thursday that work at Olinger is about 60 per cent complete and at Leslie pool about 35 per cent complete. Workmen were putting up the

concrete block bathhouse walls Thursday at Olinger with expectations they would be ready to roof the bath houses in two weeks.

Sand blasting the entire pool surface will begin Monday at Olinger where a new drain and filling system already has been installed. This pool should be completed the latter part of July and ready to go by at least Aug. 1, the contractor said.

At Leslie workmen have finished most of the plumbing work and have poured cement floors for the bath houses. They will start putting up walls in about 10 days. This pool will be operational about 30 days after Olinger opens, Battersman said.

A complaint was signed by the mother of one of two boys allegedly beaten Sunday on the Willamette University campus during a fight.

The four charged youths were held in detention Wednesday night, and appeared before juvenile Judge Joseph B. Felton Thursday. The boys were reprimanded and the matter was continued for further study.

## Polk Hearing Due on Street, House Numbers

A public hearing on the possible extension of Salem's postal house numbering and street suffix designations into Polk County suburban areas of West Salem will be held Monday at 8 p.m. at the county courthouse in Dallas.

The proposed extension, the same plan recently adopted for Salem suburban areas in Marion County, would not affect postal service, but merely tie the area more closely with the system used within the city limits, officials said.

Final adoption would be by county court members. Proposed suffixes would be NW for areas north of Dallas Road and SW for areas south of the highway.

At the regular Polk County Planning Commission meeting to follow the public hearing, representatives of the Wallace-Sheridan Orchard Heights Zoning District will be present to discuss the drawing up of zoning regulations for the area.

The 790-acre section was made into a zoning district by vote in April. Officials of the district have requested assistance of the planning commission in forming zoning regulations.

The dedication of the two-acre parcel of land in Vick Heights Subdivision will also be considered by the commission. The land, which is near Wallace Road east of Brush College Community Club, has been offered use as a county park.

## Burglars Raid Church Office

Burglars ransacked an office at St. Mark's Lutheran Church early Thursday morning but apparently nothing was taken, city police said.

Drawers and cabinets were opened in the office of Church Secretary Mrs. Charles Vavrick after the would-be thieves apparently gained entry through an unlocked church door, according to officers. Mrs. Vavrick discovered the burglary attempt later Thursday morning.
