LONGVIEW, Tex. (AP)—Two search planes from Hensley Air Force Base, Dallas, reported Friday night that they saw something in the woods between Henderson and Tatum, Tex., that could be Donald Keeton's missing aircraft.

Ground crews made their way toward the spot.

Keeton has been missing since Thursday when he flew a rented Cessna 120 out of Gulfport, Miss., leaving behind a note that he contemplated suicide.

Marie McDonald Takes Accidental Pill Overdose

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Accident Marie McDonald took an accidental overdose of sleeping pills Friday night, a hospital spokesman said.

She has been staying at the Flamingo Hotel since closing an engagement two weeks ago at the Desert Inn.

The hospital said she was in bed in the dark at the Flamingo when she reached over to a night stand, intending to take a couple of aspirin and a couple of tranquilizer pills. Instead, the spokesman said, she accidentally swallowed about a half dozen pills.

When she realized her mistake, the spokesman said, she called a girl friend who summoned hotel authorities. An ambulance took Miss McDonald to the Rose De

Baptist Faculty Members Fired in Controversy

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Trustees have dismissed almost one-third of the faculty of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in a dispute over administrative policy and the seminary.

Thirteen members of the faculty objected to an administrative shift from a trustee-faculty operation to a trustee-president operation, the trustees said. The seminary has 44 full-time faculty members.

The dissent group wanted a voice in policymaking as a matter of principle. They earlier challenged the administration of the seminary president, Dr. Duke McCall. A series of trustee meetings was held in an attempt to iron out the problem, the trustees said.

Announcement of the firings came late Thursday after a meeting of more than 12 hours in which trustees sought to straighten out the dispute.

McCall said Friday the controversy which led to dismissal might have been resolved if the 13 had been able to deal with it on an individual basis.

Instead, McCall said, they chose to negotiate as a group, thereby creating a power bloc within the faculty.

Check Counts Face Zusman

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland night club operator Nate Zusman—who told a congressional committee last year that he was known as the "Mark of Stark"—was arrested Friday on two indictments involving bad checks.

He was released after posting \$1,000 bail. The indictments accused him of drawing bank checks with insufficient funds to pay.

Zusman operates a night spot at Portland's Stark Street. He held the labor racket committee in March, 1957, that he was known as the "Mark of Stark" because he was willing to help people who were in trouble.

Witnesses testified that the club was a hangout for underworld figures. Zusman denied that.

Former Valley Woman's Child, Husband Drown

FALLS CITY—The daughter and husband of a former Falls City woman, Mrs. Joanne Upmeyer Preslar, drowned Thursday near Lewiston, Calif.

The victims were Floyd Preslar, a construction worker, and Joanne, 3. Accounts received here indicated the daughter fell into the Trinity River while on a family outing and Preslar died trying to save her.

Their bodies were swept downstream and the little girl's was recovered, Associated Press reported.

Mrs. Preslar, who witnessed the tragedy, was taken to a hospital suffering from severe shock. She recently gave birth to another child.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Upmeyer of Falls City and last lived here about three years ago.

Glass Defeats Burglary Try

A would-be burglar was believed to have suffered injuries Friday night in an unsuccessful attempt to enter a garage at the Pete L. Parano home, 6085 River Rd. NE, state police said.

Parano notified officers after he returned home and found a garage window broken. A considerable amount of blood at the scene indicated the intruder cut himself on broken glass.

Employers Threaten to Quit Apprentice Group

PORTLAND (AP)—A mass resignation by employer representatives to the Oregon State Apprenticeship Council has been threatened.

Harry Heuer of Portland said he and the other three employers were "disgusted with Portland (union) locals' control of apprentice training throughout Oregon."

He said that Portland unions were attempting to dominate the training program.

Norman O. Nilsen, state labor commissioner and chairman of the council, said the dispute stemmed from part of the administration of the program by A. C. Hoggan, state apprenticeship director.

Nilsen said Hoggan had been ill in recent months.

Heuer agreed that employers have not been too satisfied with Hoggan, but he contended that "Portland labor representatives are out to get his job."

The employers said they had not submitted the resignation as yet and added that they hope a solution can be found.

Steps Urged for Better Oregon Coroner Service

PORTLAND (AP)—Appointment of a pathologist to examine coroners' qualifications was one of two proposals Friday to the legislative interim committee on coroner qualifications.

Multnomah County deputy coroner Earl Shea said such an appointment by the state would insure a better performance of coroner's duties.

Max McMillan, Josephine County district attorney, suggested that coroners' duties be assigned to the county health officer.

Both disagreed with earlier suggestions by the medical profession that coroners be given authority to order autopsies, which at present can be ordered only by district attorneys when consent of relatives is lacking.

Slip of Tongue Tells Boy of Sister's Death

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—Jimmy Joy, 11, learned accidentally Friday that his little sister, Freda, 10, is dead.

Both the children were struck by a car a week ago as they and a companion were walking home from a drive-in movie where they had celebrated the start of vacation. Freda was killed outright and Jimmy critically injured. The girl was buried Wednesday.

Jimmy had not been told of his sister's death, as doctors sought to speed his recovery at a hospital here, but Friday a visitor unknowingly let it slip. The boy called for his parents and when they arrived at the hospital he asked them if it was true.

Mr. and Mrs. Howard Joy had to tell their son his sister was dead and then explained the details of the accident, which he does not recall.

Jimmy heard a loud pop just before the accident and has insisted he was shot. Officers believe the noise may have been caused by the car breaking a bottle just before hitting the children, who were walking at the side of the road.

The prosecutor has set a hearing on the case for next Tuesday. The driver, Julian Mercier, and other witnesses will be questioned.

Two Sailors Asphyxiated Aboard Ship

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Two Navy sailors were asphyxiated Friday night when carbon dioxide from the fire smothering system of the destroyer Cogswell was released into a closed compartment, the Navy said.

Three other sailors were treated for carbon dioxide poisoning at the Navy hospital. A spokesman said they were in satisfactory condition.

Names of the dead men were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

Rear Adm. Frank Fennos, commander of the Pacific Destroyer Cruiser Force, said the accident occurred in the emergency diesel generator room, one deck below the main deck.

Fennos said it appeared the five men were accidentally locked in the inner compartment by a slamming door and carbon dioxide was released from the fire smothering system. The carbon dioxide did not escape to other parts of the ship.

Warrant Filed in Stabbing

A federal fugitive warrant has been filed against David Garcia, 22, migrant worker from Texas who is wanted by Marion County in connection with a knife in a tavern brawl May 10 at St. Paul, Federal Bureau of Investigation agents said Friday.

Garcia, charged in Marion County with assault while armed with a dangerous weapon, will now be sought by the FBI under the Federal Fugitive Felon Act, they explained.

The federal warrant was asked by Marion County District Attorney Hattie J. Brazel on information that he had fled to Washington, they said. Bond is set at \$10,000.

CAR HITS DEER

A car driven by Edward A. Hansen, Turner, was badly damaged about 10:15 p.m. Friday when it struck and killed a deer on the Salem-Portland Freeway about 12 miles north of Woodburn Junction, state police reported. Hansen escaped injury.

9 Teen-Agers Accused of Shouting 'Kill All Jews' Shown Mercy by Jewish Justice

CHAPPAQUA, N. Y. (AP)—Nine youths accused of shouting "kill all the Jews" at a rabbinical training center stood before a Jewish justice of the peace for sentencing.

They had pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct charges. The justice, Morris Lasker, could have ordered jail sentences or fines, or both.

But, instead, he sentenced each to write, within 30 days, a 1,000 word essay on "the importance of guarantees of personal rights and freedoms under the Constitution of the United States."

Police arrested the youths, ranging in age from 16 to 19, after they drove up to the Yeshiva farm settlement May 18 and started their anti-Jewish outcries. They pleaded guilty June 5 and appeared before Lasker Thursday night.

Lasker, noting he was a Jew, offered to disqualify himself from sentencing them, but their counsel declined the offer.

Then Lasker gave the young defendants a point lecture on the protection of rights.

Chart Shows Gain in Nation's Production

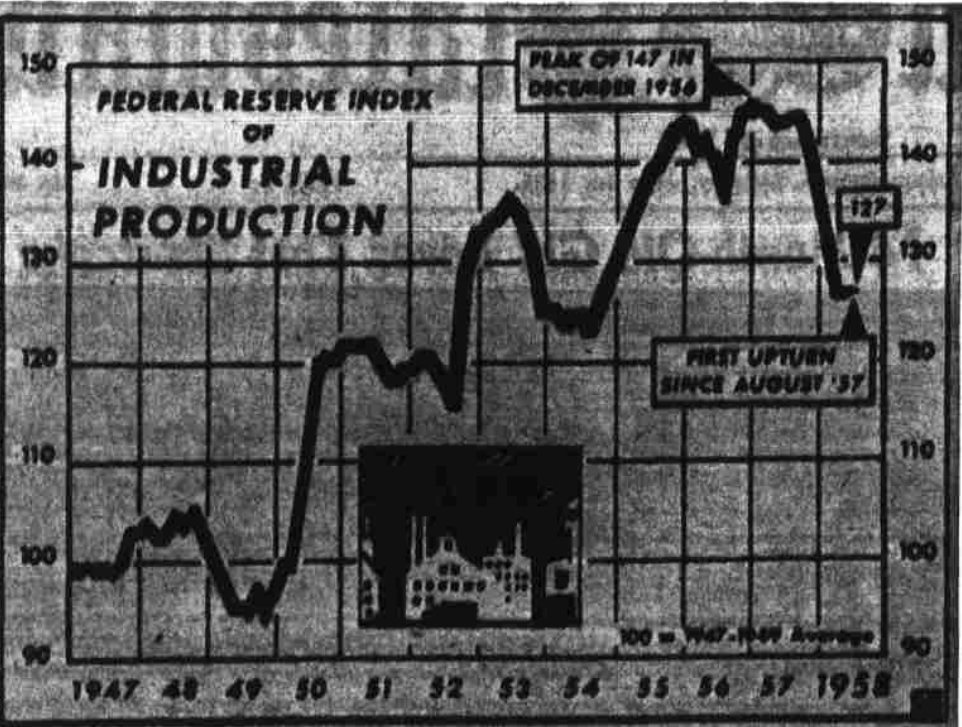

Malik Reports To Dulles on Lebanon Issue

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles was given a firsthand fill-in on the explosive situation in Lebanon Friday by Dr. Charles Malik.

Malik, who a week ago told the United Nations Security Council that only the U.N. can prevent the United Arab Republic from wiping out Lebanon's independence, spent 74 minutes in Dulles' office.

Afterward, he told reporters he was "absolutely convinced" that the United States must well for Lebanon and the Middle East.

Beyond that, he would not comment other than saying that he and the secretary had talked at length about the situation confronting Lebanon in its struggle against rebel uprisings.

When asked why he thought it necessary to state his conviction that the U.S. "means well," Malik replied that "it is always good to repeat the truth."

The foreign minister arrived here from Beirut at 1 a.m. about the time the Lebanon rebels backed by the United Arab Republic defied the U.N. Security Council's "peace terms" and threatened a new Middle East explosion.

Civil Service Pay Increase Given Senate Approval

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill carrying a 10 per cent pay raise for more than a million government workers won final Senate approval Friday but must wait until next week for House action.

The House was in weekend recess when the measure passed the Senate by voice vote. The House is expected to act on it Monday.

The bill is a compromise version of different measures previously passed by the two chambers. It provides a 10 per cent pay boost or 1,021,000 civil service and other employees retroactive to last Jan. 1.

Crash Hurts Salem Girl

A Salem girl suffered a minor injury about 7 p.m. Friday in a two-car collision at Stortz Avenue and Portland Road NE, according to state police.

Toni Pruitt, 2465 Laurel Ave. NE, passenger in a car driven by Cabot Huntington Clark, 220 Culver Lane S, incurred a lip laceration and was treated by first aidmen, police said.

The Clark vehicle collided with the rear of a car driven by Harvey Bailey Gitchel, Chermawa, officers added.

Handcuffs, 5 Policemen Control Girls

Five police officers and handcuffs were necessary Friday morning to control two runaways from Hillcrest School for Girls who were arrested by Albany city police.

The teen-age girls were two of four who fled from a strawberry picking work party near Salem Thursday afternoon. While at Linn County Jail in Albany, the girls kicked, scratched and bit officers, set off a fire alarm, cut off an officer's wristwatch, smashed another's wristwatch, officers said.

Hillcrest reported two additional girls fled from berry fields Friday afternoon.

Four residents of MacLaren School for Boys at Woodburn ran from a berry field near Monitor Friday afternoon. Two of the boys were captured near the field by school officials. Two others were still missing Friday night.

14-Year Deserter Charge Faced by Dallas Cafe Cook

DALLAS, Ore. (AP)—Sen (Joe) Chong, 39, a cook at Ideal Cafe for the past year, was arrested Thursday night by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents and Dallas police on a charge of desertion, officials said Friday.

Chong was identified by officials as Joseph Leong, who went absent without leave from a Navy base at San Pedro, Calif., in 1944. For 14 years he is alleged to have eluded the FBI on the West Coast, coming to Dallas from Portland about one year ago. He was located with the aid of Salem police, they added.

Steelworker Convicted of Slaying Pregnant Beauty

BEAVER, Pa. (AP)—Theodore Pallow, 25, a Midland, Pa., steelworker was convicted early Saturday of first degree murder for the revolver slaying of Miss Rosalie Leis, 21, of Vanport, Pa., last March 13. The jury recommended life imprisonment.

More than 300 spectators who had waited in corridors since 6 p.m. jammed the courtroom to hear the verdict. Guards had to shoulder their way through the throng to bring Pallow into court.

Pallow sat with his hands folded looking at the floor while his counsel polled the jury.

Atty. John Ray, counsel for Pallow, said he had no basis for an appeal unless "I change my mind."

In his final summation to the jury, Dist. Atty. Richard Steward said the revolver slaying of the former beauty queen was "willfully, deliberated and premeditated by a philanderer without regard to his wife or children."

Miss Leis was shot to death near her Vanport home early the morning of last March 13. The commonwealth introduced evidence that she was from 4 to 6 weeks pregnant. Pallow testified he stayed with her in hotels and motels on many occasions.

Lawyer Pledge Fulfilled; Con Freed in Court

CHICAGO (AP)—A promise a lawyer made six years ago to a dying mother was fulfilled Friday when her son who had served 16 years in prison walked weeping from Criminal Court, a free man.

George E. Bray, 44, was sentenced to Stateville Prison for 99 years for a rape he says he never committed.

His freedom was gained by Attorney Joseph R. Lee, 46, of suburban Skokie, who promised Bray's cancer-stricken mother in 1952 he would help him.

The mother, Mary, insisted her son was innocent. She died in 1953.

The lawyer spent his vacations and about \$1,200 of his own money searching for witnesses in Bray's trial.

After checking telephone books, voting lists and court records for four years, Lee located the rape victim in Miami, Fla.

She told the attorney she had never been positive of her identification of Bray when he was tried for impersonating an Army officer, but had been urged by police to identify him as her attacker.

Fearing perjury charges, she refused to sign a statement to this effect, but Lee subsequently located another witness who said the woman had told him the same thing at the trial.

Bray's case was reheard Friday and he was freed by acting Chief Justice Grover C. Niemyer.
