

Ex-Con Won't Be Prosecuted for Kidnap Plot Against Bing's Wife

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The sheriff's office said Sunday there are no immediate plans to prosecute an ex-convict for an admitted plot—which didn't come off—to kidnap the wife of Bing Crosby for ransom.

Wilburn E. Davison, 48, admitted to sheriff's officers Saturday that he and a partner planned to abduct actress Kathy Grant Crosby and hold her for payment of \$100,000.

He said the scheme was abandoned when he learned the intended victim was pregnant.

Detective Sgt. Jack Norris, who is handling the investigation, pointed out that Davison is a three-time loser and explained: "He's going to get life anyway and I don't think we have enough evidence in the Crosby case to make

a kidnapping conspiracy charge stick against him.

"We can't do much about what a man plans and thinks and does not do. We don't plan any action on this unless we catch his partner and he gives us something concrete on which to file charges."

But Norris said that Davison had admitted to participation in four robberies and two kidnappings with intent to commit robbery. "And for this he can get life," he said.

Davison named as his partner Gene Kling, 40, who escaped with \$23,000 of loot taken in the \$25,000 robbery of a suburban Lakewood supermarket last May 30. He is still at large.

Davison was arrested a few minutes after the robbery.

The plot to kidnap Mrs. Crosby came to light when Davison's 19-year-old niece, Niki Snow, told Sheriff Bill Nicholson of Seminole County, Okla., about it. He alerted the sheriff's office here.

Soviets Cancel Canada Flight To Avoid Hassle

VANCOUVER, B. C. (CP) — Russia's TU-104 jet airlines cancelled a 75-mile flight here Sunday afternoon to avoid a possible international incident.

The crowd-catching aircraft, biggest draw at Vancouver's centennial air show, had planned to make a courtesy flight from the show's Sea Island, near here, to Victoria.

But local air force officials were unable to give assurances from United States Air Force authorities that the Russian aircraft would not be challenged by American fighters should it cross the international boundary.

Exactly on Course

Capt. T. T. Frolov, the Russian plane's pilot, saw by studying a B.C. road map that he could fly from Vancouver to Victoria without leaving Canadian territory, only if he kept exactly on course. The slightest drift could take the TU-104 over the U.S. island of San Juan, which juts up into Canadian waters in the Strait of Georgia.

Instead, Frolov decided to tour the greater Vancouver area on the craft's one courtesy flight of the day.

His passenger load was made up of representatives of the provincial government, aviation-including a number of U. S. citizens and the press.

Handles Boeing 707

Earlier in the day, Frolov handled the controls of the giant Boeing 707 jet stratosphere on a courtesy flight. He said the plane had "beautiful light control."

On Saturday, the 12-man Russian crew of the TU-104 spent the day examining other aircraft on display. The visiting RAF Vulcan jet bomber came in for much of their attention.

Maine Votes In Primary Election Today

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — Republican Sen. Frederick G. Payne, who says he once accepted one of Boston millionaire Bernard Goldfine's vicuna coats, is up for re-nomination in Monday's Maine primaries.

His opponent, Herman D. Shagan, remarked at a GOP rally in Farmington Saturday night that he "wears his own coat" — that neither he nor his clothing are bought by anyone.

Payne has said in Washington that he never was asked for favors by Goldfine, a long-time friend whose reported gifts to presidential assistant Sherman Adams have evoked a furor in the capital.

Unopposed for Democratic nomination to Payne's seat is Gov. Edmund S. Muskie, who if successful in Maine's early September election would be the first Democrat to go the Senate since 1911.

State Employees' Officer Leaves on United States Tour

James B. Daniels, executive secretary of the Oregon State Employees Association, has left on an extended tour that will find him visiting a number of other state employee groups throughout the country.

Daniels' itinerary includes visits to associations in the following states: Colorado, Nebraska, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois and Indiana.

U.S. Aviation Pioneer Dies; Won DFC in '29

ELIZABETH CITY, N. C. (AP) — Maj. Alford Al Williams, 61, one of American aviation's most aggressive pioneers, died at a hospital here Sunday.

He had been seriously ill a week after a period of declining health.

Williams bought a farm near here in 1940 and went into semi-retirement in 1949. He named the farm "Elyrie-Eagle's Nest."

His work as a chief test pilot for the Navy won him a Distinguished Flying Cross in 1929. He was praised as one of the pioneers of high-speed flight in the accompanying citation.

Born in New York

Williams was born in New York City and graduated from Fordham University.

He enlisted in the Navy in World War I and resigned in 1930 with the rank of senior lieutenant. He joined the Marine Corps as a captain, resigning in 1940 with the rank of major.

He flew around the country in a single-seat fighter plane, the Gulfhawk, now enshrined in the Smithsonian Institution as "the plane that taught young America to fly."

Conceived Dive-Bombing

He perfected the technique of inverted flying and conceived the dive-bombing technique during vertical speed trials 35 years ago.

His widow, Alice, and a son, John, of Elizabeth City, survive.

Funeral services will be held here Tuesday, after which the body will be taken to Washington, D. C., for a military funeral Wednesday and burial at Arlington National Cemetery.

New Locomotive To Be Dedicated By 40 et 8 Unit

Marion County Vulture 153, 40 et 8, will christen its new fun-making locomotive at 7 p.m. Wednesday at Chuck's Steak House on Portland Road.

Built from scratch by various donations and labor of Vulture members, the \$8,000 vehicle will be used by the organization in street parades and similar events. It also will be employed to transport children as a part of the Vulture's program of helping needy youngsters.

In charge of the christening ceremonies will be Chief de Gare Al Friesen, Chief de Gare-Edith Kenneth Muller and Carl Roth, co-chairman with Muller of the locomotive committee.

Graham Ends His Crusade in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Evangelist Billy Graham wound up his seven weeks crusade in San Francisco Sunday by packing the 16,500-seat Cow Palace with 16,500 people.

The house was full and the service started half an hour ahead of the scheduled time.

"I did not come here with lofty words of wisdom, but in a demonstration of the spirit and power of Christ," he said.

"I am here to tell you about the living Christ who is in the world today and who is able to transform and change your life."

"If you live less than your best you are committing a sin. Just enough religion to be respectable is one of the sins that nailed Jesus to the cross," he said.

"Some of you are like Judas. You are greedy and will sell your soul and your future for a few pieces of silver. Some of those who steal from God are those with the most money."

"Christ never sinned himself, but he took our sins upon himself so that we might be forgiven. The cross is where God's love is poured out for us. There is no other way to receive forgiveness of your sins except as you come to the cross. Let Christ make you a new person this day," he pleaded.

"Christ went a long way for you. You can take a few steps for him."

At the end of his plea 500 persons went forward in "decisions for Christ," raising the total for the crusade to 25,575. Total attendance for the seven weeks was 696,525.

Twenty Hurt In Georgia Bus Accident

MARIETTA, Ga. (AP) — Twenty persons were injured Sunday when a Greyhound bus plunged down an embankment and overturned.

Six others aboard the Jacksonville, Fla., to Cincinnati bus escaped unhurt.

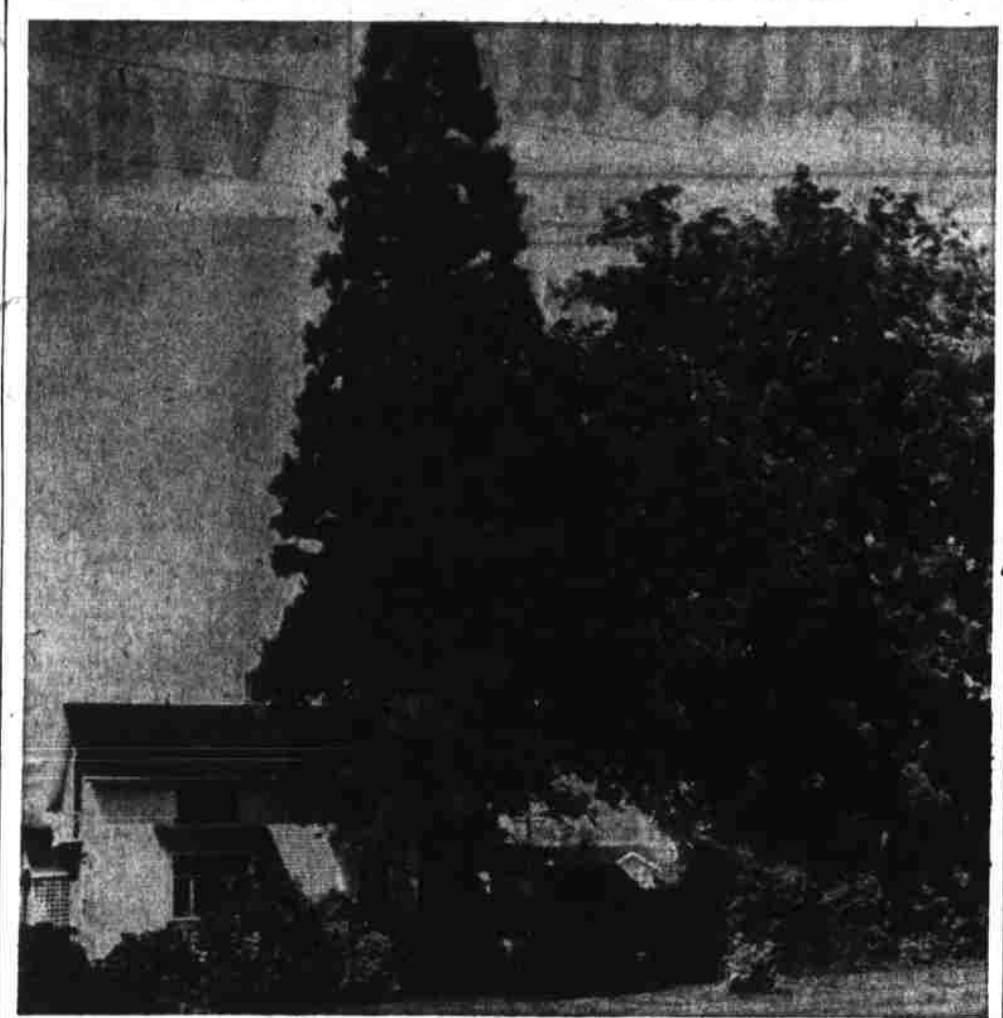
Police Sgt. Charles Cheshire quoted driver Floyd A. Jones, 46, of Ringgold, Ga., as saying he was going down a hill on four-lane U.S. 41 in heavy rain when he applied the brakes and the right wheel locked.

Jones said the bus spun around, went down an embankment and overturned on its side about 35 feet from the highway.

Trees Planted in 1870 Doomed

Parking Lot to Replace Old House, Trees

One of Salem's oldest homes currently is being razed at northeast corner of Center and Summer streets NE—and doomed to die along with it are some historic trees.

The frame two-story home, bought by the state from Miss Mabel Robertson, is being leveled to make way for a parking lot.

Soon to feel the bite of the axe are two towering incense cedar and black walnut trees standing at side of the house.

The trees, both planted in 1870, are sort of step-brothers to the more famous redwood at Summer and Union Streets NE.

The three trees were brought from California by the pioneer Waldo family and planted by an early resident named Bass, a nephew of the Waldo.

The Bass family built the house at Center and Summer, probably around 1870, on a site formerly occupied by a brickyard. It was purchased in 1909 by Mr. and Mrs. John P. Robertson and in later years was the home of Mabel Robertson, longtime teacher at Old Salem High School.

"So far as I know," said Miss Robertson Sunday, "the incense cedar is the only one of its type in this area."

Searing Pool Kills Boy at Yellowstone

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo. (AP) — Danny Lewis, 6, of Austin, Minn., died Sunday of burns suffered when he fell into a searing pool near Old Faithful geyser.

His father, William Lewis, pulled the boy from the pool. The two had been fishing when the accident took place Friday.

The youngster suffered second- and third-degree burns over 75 per cent of his body.

The pool, filled with boiling water, is one of several thousand throughout the park. Many of them are fenced or marked with warning signs. They vary in size from 12 feet across to 50 feet.

Some are inactive geysers, while others are small active geysers. In addition, there are many small mud pools reaching even higher temperatures.

Deputy Killed, 3 Wounded by Angry Suitor

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — An angry suitor killed a deputy sheriff and wounded his girl friend's parents and another deputy Sunday night.

The assailant then fled into a nearby wooded area of a Pensacola suburb with his sweetheart following him. The girl, Wesie Jernigan, 19, was found a short time later near her home.

The Alabama Highway Patrol reported early Monday that Alabama and Florida state and local police were alerted to watch for Ed Golden, 25.

The Alabama patrol reported that the Escambia County sheriff's office said deputy Bert Adams, 32, died of a bullet wound in the head.

In critical condition at Pensacola hospital is Pierce Jernigan, 48, the girl's father. Less seriously wounded at the same hospital is Escambia deputy Leslie Brock, 31, who suffered a bullet wound in the neck, and the girl's mother, Mrs. Essie Jernigan, who suffered a flesh wound in the right shoulder.

Bill Dingwall, a reporter for the Pensacola News-Journal, quoted Mrs. Jernigan as saying the shooting occurred when deputies, which she had summoned, arrived at the Jernigan home. She said she and her husband had a violent argument with Golden over attentions to their daughter.

Disc Jockey Plays Four Hours of Caruso; Italians Shut Juke Boxes

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The biggest thing involving Enrico Caruso since the glass roof of the Palace Hotel fell on him during the 1906 earthquake happened here Sunday night.

Disc jockey Jim Lange played four hours of Caruso records on radio station KGO. He did so with trepidation. Lange is a rock 'n' roll man and admits he doesn't dig Caruso too much.

San Francisco's Bohemian North Beach batted down their juke boxes and listened to the whole show. In some places "The Purple People Eater" wasn't heard once.

"The Golden Voice"

Gino, who tends bar in a Columbus Avenue bistro, had tears in his eyes as he poured drinks for habitués and heard Caruso for the first time in years.

"The golden voice," he said. "The greatest voice of the age."

Even the so-called Beat Generation let up on its pod (marijuana) smoking parties and stopped chasing chicks up the alleys of that little bit of North Beach they have taken over. They had to. All the joints are run by Italians and the Italians turned to Caruso above all else and almost turned off their beer. At taverns and restaurants that feature Italian singing, people were ecstatic.

Lange played it real cool. He ran a contest on his program in which listeners voted by post card for their favorite singer. Lange promised to play the winner's records for four solid hours, like he did Elvis Presley's a while back.

Flooded Out Ray, Boone

Stanford students, on the assumption Lange would be unable to find four hours of Caruso records, flooded out Pat Boone and Johnny Ray with 20,000 votes for Caruso. Lange found eight long playing Caruso records recently put out by Victor.

"We got a lot of calls from people who had never listened to the station before," Lange said. "Even some of the rock 'n' roll fans listened."

Caruso died in 1920. He never returned to San Francisco after the roof of the Palace fell in on him in 1906.

But San Francisco has never forgotten him.

History Close to Lawyer Who's Still Active at 84

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Jubal Early Craig, a Californian with a name steeped in Southern history, walked into a courtroom 63 years ago to begin a law career that's still in full swing.

In his office on the ninth floor of a downtown Phoenix building, Craig, a sharp-tongued, quick-witted 84 still spends a full day behind a desk stacked high with legal papers. And, he plans to stay there, "until they carry me out in a box. I've got too much work to do to think of retirement."

Nor did he consider quitting one morning in 1906 when he stood on a hill and watched his office building crumble in the San Francisco earthquake.

Calm In Earthquake

He merely walked into a nearby cafe, ordered wine and sandwiches, and ate placidly as destruction spread through the city. A waiter informed Craig that fire was sweeping toward the cafe. The attorney finished his meal and walked out as the neighboring building burst into flames.

Recently, Craig was honored by the American Bar Assn. for more than 50 years service in upholding the traditions of the legal profession.

He accepted the award with pride, but gave the reason for his selection: "I just outlived most of them, that's all."

Modest Man

Craig, who looks much younger than his age, is modest about his long service and many honors.

"Live a long time, keep your mouth shut, and people will think you're Solomon," he says.

Craig was born in a rough and rowdy San Francisco of 1874 and as a youngster followed his lawyer father into courtrooms.

"I became a lawyer despite my father's pleas that it was too hard

Soviet Troops Begin Pulling Out of Romania

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Soviet troops began pulling out of Communist Romania Sunday, the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug reported.

The Soviet Union announced May 27 it was taking all its troops out of Romania and reducing Russian forces in Hungary. At the same time, the U.S.S.R. proposed that the Soviet bloc and the North Atlantic nations join in a 25-year non-aggression pact.

Soviet troops have been in Romania since it was liberated from the Germans in World War II. The Soviet withdrawal announcement did not specify the number of troops in Romania but some sources estimate the total at 30,000 to 40,000. Romania is believed to have an army of about 200,000 well-trained troops which could effectively handle any threat to the Communist regime.

Flood Causes Emergency in Terre Haute

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (AP) — A state of emergency was declared at Terre Haute Sunday as a Wabash River crest 14 feet over flood stage bore down on the city.

Gov. Harold W. Handley declared the emergency at the request of local officials, who were worried that an earthen levee protecting West Terre Haute might give way and let floodwaters loose on 40 per cent of the community. West Terre Haute has a population of 4,000.

The Wabash reached 27.6 feet at noon Sunday with a predicted crest at noon Monday of 28 feet. Flood level is 14 feet.
