

Soviet's Terror Policies Dash Hopes of Fruitful Summit Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said Wednesday Soviet "policies of terror and intimidation" have dashed his hope of fruitful negotiations at the summit or anywhere else.

Eisenhower opened his news conference with a denunciation of

the Communists' execution of former Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy and Nagy's military chief, Pál Maléter.

"These two men were not guilty of evil-doing," Eisenhower said in biting tones. "They were fighting for their own country to eliminate or to reduce domination by force

of their country on the part of the Soviets."

The president added: "It is clear evidence that the intent of the Soviets is to pursue their own policies of terror and intimidation in any way they choose, to bring about complete subservience to their will."

"I think there is no incident that should have more alerted the free world to the lack of confidence that we are compelled to feel in the words and actions of these Communist imperialists."

In questions that followed, Eisenhower was asked what the new Soviet action did to changes of a heads-of-government meeting or other East-West negotiations.

"Anything of this kind that shocks the whole free world, its whole conscience and its whole beliefs is detrimental to fruitful negotiations," Eisenhower replied.

He said that, as a result of Nagy's execution and Russia's break-off of diplomatic talks looking toward a summit meeting, the whole question of East-West relations is being seriously re-evaluated at the White House.

"The whole thing has been a very great setback to my hopes," Eisenhower said.

Abortion Charge Filed After Police Raid Home

TACOMA — A nursing home operator was arrested in a raid Wednesday on a warrant charging her with attempted abortion. Her husband also was arrested for questioning.

Anna Moody, also known as Anna Milleson, and her husband, Robert, were taken to the County Jail following the raid. Bail was set at \$10,000 for Mrs. Moody.

Chief Criminal Deputy Sheriff Dick McCreadie, Chief Deputy Prosecutor Nels B. Nelson, Jr., Capt. Lyle Lathrop and two detectives burst into the lavish home.

Nelson said they found medical instruments in an upstairs room. Three women, who said their homes were in Kirkland, Wenatchee and Albany, Ore., were in bedrooms of the nursing home.

Nelson said one told the raiders she had paid \$450 to Mrs. Moody and another related she had turned over \$1,000 for operations not yet performed.

McCreadie said the raid culminated a long investigation. He said he and Nelson have been posing as surveyors. They used surveying equipment as they watched the home, taking down license numbers of numerous cars which went to the house and left.

Nelson said the raid was staged after a woman came to his office inquiring about the nursing home. He said she had been persuaded to return to the home Wednesday morning with \$350 in marked money.

A number of mid-Willamette Valley residents reported sighting what they believe was Sputnik III Wednesday.

Most of those reporting, including Mr. and Mrs. James Saxton, Salem, Rt. 1, Box 38, said it was heading northeast and looked like a large star.

The Saxtons daughter, Mrs. Laurel Williams of McMinnville, visiting her parents, also spotted it about 3:15 a.m. along with her brother, David Saxton.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Brockhaus, Mt. Angel, viewed a similar object for about two minutes. They said it flickered as it traveled from southwest to northeast across the sky.

Ernest Bearre, 2055 Liberty St. NE, called The Statesman at 9:20 p.m. Wednesday after he saw what was probably the Russian Sputnik. He said it appeared to be a round white light with a trail of light behind it.

He said that on this past Wednesday he was traveling from east to southeast. He said four other persons also reported sighting it.

"It was brighter than a star and seemed to be tumbling and turning as it passed over," said Mrs. Solon L. Shinkle, 1087 Broadway NE.

She said it was in her view "at least several minutes." It appeared in pre-dawn darkness "between 3:15 a.m. and 3:20 a.m.," she said. It passed from the southwest to the northeast.

Others who reported seeing the Sputnik early Wednesday included Mrs. Ray Lewis, 542 Kingwood Dr. NW, and Mrs. Esther Rasmussen, 1070 Garnet St. NE.

PORTLAND (AP)—Henry Reznick, who died June 14, left an estate valued at more than \$250,000, according to a will filed in probate court here Wednesday.

Reznick, 66, had been president of Westerners Inc. and the Kirby Parts Corp., which both dealt with vacuum cleaner sales and service.

The will contained bequests for Lewis and Clark College, the University of Oregon Medical School and the Presbyterian Church.

Allen Leaves To Inspect Fair Exhibits

NEW YORK (AP)—George V. Allen, director of the U.S. Information Agency, left by plane Wednesday night to inspect this country's exhibit at the Brussels World Fair. He is due back Monday to report to President Eisenhower.

There have been criticisms of some of the American displays at the fair. Allen said his trip abroad was planned before the criticisms arose but that, at Eisenhower's request, he would investigate them.

Sen. Styles Bridges (R-NH) passed some complaints to the president Tuesday. They were contained in a letter from a person Bridges did not identify.

The letter claimed that at the entrance to the American exhibit is the etching of a woman, nude to the waist, on a beach with savages roasting what looks like a human body.

The letter writer complained that picture on the walls are poor, that hamburgers and hot dogs offered visitors are not good and that some of the floating orange peels covered a pool in the middle of the exhibit.

Also, the letter claimed an International Business Machines UNIVAC was not working.

In New York, however, IBM said it did not produce UNIVAC computing systems. It does have an IBM 365 RAMAC at the fair. But it said this so-called mechanical brain has been operating continuously since the opening of the fair in April.

Trujillo Asked To End U.S. Military Aid

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic (AP)—The Dominican Congress Wednesday approved a resolution asking President Hector Trujillo to terminate U.S. military assistance and other agreements with this country.

Among agreements named was one to facilitate U.S. guided missile tests. Another was for cooperation on nuclear energy for civilian purposes. Included were "every accord tending to promote technical assistance by the United States in the Dominican Republic."

He added, however, that "we don't mind competition, but feel it would be wrong if we did not have the regulation of the ICC and public utilities commission."

The SP proposed slashing rates in April to put Western Oregon shippers in a competitive position with Northern California and Arizona shippers.

Later, the ICC suspended an earlier order granting the rate decreases.

Negro Pastor Wins Release

JACKSON, Miss. (AP)—Clenton King, a Negro minister, earned his release Wednesday from the state mental hospital, where he landed after trying to enroll in the University of Mississippi.

The 37-year-old former professor at Alcorn A&M College for Negroes appeared before the hospital psychiatric and psychological staff for final tests. He was committed to Whitfield two weeks ago to decide if he was sane.

Dr. W. L. Jaguth, hospital superintendent said test results could not be made public.

The attorney general's office said it did not know what would happen to King now. King had been committed after the state charged he went berserk while trying to enroll at the university.

Court Upholds Ruling Against Sheldon Sackett

ASHEVILLE, N. C. (AP)—The U. S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeal upheld Wednesday a lower court ruling against Sheldon F. Sackett, who sought to purchase the bankrupt Portsmouth Times with an upset bid of \$125,100.
