

Gun-Toting Woman Holds Posse at Bay for 3 Hours

WATERVILLE, Wash. (AP) — An armed, middle-aged Oregon woman, cornered after a wild, 28-mile chase, held a posse at bay for nearly three hours Thursday from a railway trestle, hiding place, then meekly surrendered.

The woman, identified as Lee Mae Webb, 41, of Arlington, Ore., was held in the Douglas County jail here in connection with the \$400 holdup of an East Westchee supermarket in mid-afternoon.

Prosecutor R. A. Hensel said he would charge her with armed robbery Friday.

The chase, by a deputy sheriff and state patrolmen, carried over winding, dusty mountain roads and across wheat flatlands in north central Washington.

Methodists for Seating of Red Chinese in U.N.

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Methodist Conference Thursday recommended admission of Red China to the United Nations.

In the controversial resolution the conference asked that "steps be taken to fulfill the responsibilities of the free world, and the United States in particular, for the safety and well-being of refugees from the Chinese Communist dictatorship, especially in Formosa."

A majority of the delegates voted in favor of the move, but a minority report was filed. The minority statement urged further study and prayer on the issue.

The Rev. Norman Thomas of Portland said other anti-Christian nations are members of the U.N., but Ervin Potter, Salem attorney, said that Red China is not ready for membership "if we have to protect them in the resolution asking for recognition."

The conference also passed resolutions asking Methodists to observe Sunday as Family Day and recommended support of Sunday business closures.

The conference will close Friday with the reading of new ministerial assignments.

Court Decides Security Risk Firings Illegal

WASHINGTON (AP)—A three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals ruled unanimously Thursday that six employees of the Army Signal Center at Ft. Monmouth, N.J. were improperly fired as security risks in 1954.

Government lawyers interpreted the opinion as meaning the six are entitled to reinstatement with back pay of about \$180,000. They were fired during an investigation conducted by the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Senate Vote Condemns Red Execution of Nagy

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate adopted a resolution Thursday expressing deep indignation over the "barbarism and perfidy" of the Soviet Union in connection with the execution of Imre Nagy, Hungary's revolutionary premier.

The Senate action came on the heels of a State Department statement denouncing the execution of Nagy and his minister of defense, Gen. Pal Maleter, as "an affront to all members of the United Nations and to the conscience of the world."

A roll-call vote in the Senate sent the resolution to the House where it was expected to receive similar quick action.

It ended about 7 miles south of here when Mrs. Webb abandoned her 1958 pickup truck, fired one aimless shot and then fled to a nearby wooden railroad trestle where she hid behind the beams. Cheilan and Douglas County sheriff's officers, state patrolmen, members of the Douglas County Sheriff's Posse, a volunteer group, and others soon ringed the spot.

During the three-hour siege Mrs. Webb fired three other shots from her 38 caliber pistol, all apparently into the air. State Patrolman Emmett Smith finally persuaded the woman to give herself up after talking with her for nearly two hours. When she surrendered she turned over the gun and about \$400 in currency she was carrying.

Smith said Mrs. Webb told him she came to the Wenatchee area earlier this week seeking and failing to find work. She said she had become deeply despondent and was desperately in need of money.

\$2.5 Million Grading Pact Let by State

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon's Highway Commission awarded a \$2.5 million dollar contract Thursday for 3 1/2 miles of grading.

It was the biggest grading-only award in commission history.

The work is on 3.21 miles of the Oregon Coast Highway relocation on the mountainous Hookanaden Creek-Thomas Creek section in Curry County. Successful bidder was Morrison-Knudsen Co., Boise.

The short stretch of grading will require excavation of 4 1/2 million cubic yards of earth.

The award was one of a number totaling 13 million dollars. All of the awards went to low bidders whose offers were opened previously. Some of the bids were opened at Salem May 29 and others at Salem two days ago.

After the bid openings, commission engineers studied them but no changes were made in what were announced at the time as low bids.

The commission's next meeting will be at Salem July 31 and Aug. 1.

Bus Carrying 16 Overturns

PAINTSVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A Greyhound bus with 16 passengers aboard overturned on a hilltop near here Thursday night after colliding with a car.

No one was killed. A woman passenger, Mrs. Lula Mae Burdett, 29, Columbus, Ohio, was reported in fair condition with a neck injury.

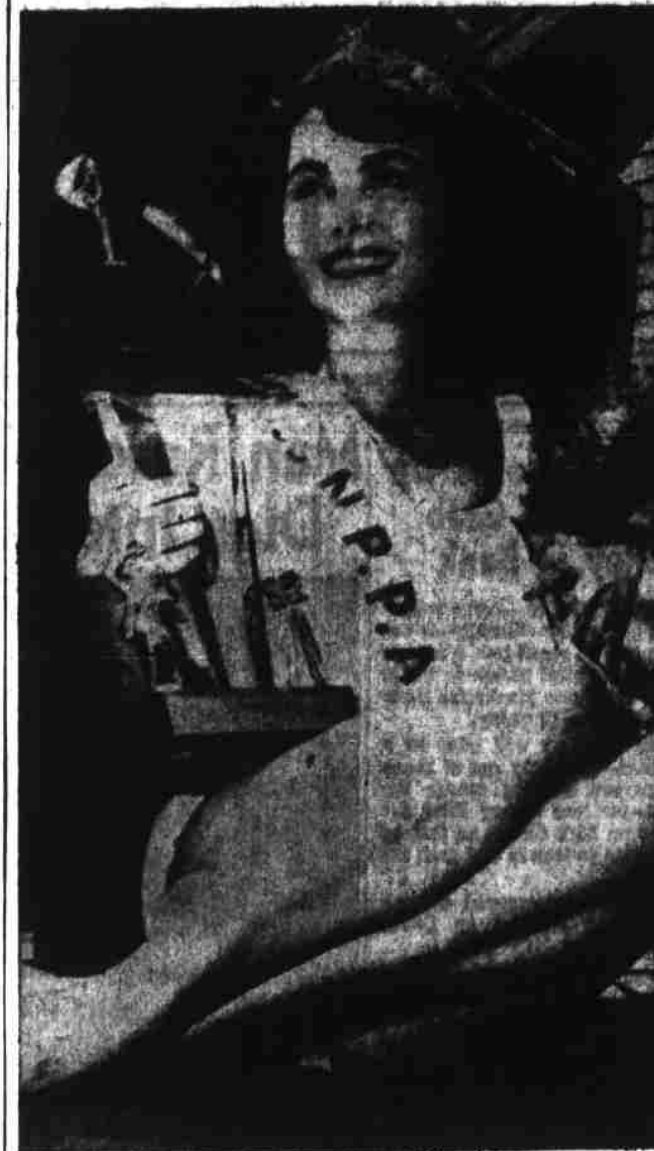

CORNELIUS (AP) — A 55-year-old farmer was killed Thursday afternoon when crushed by a tractor on his farm north of here.

Victor Joseph Vanderzanden, 55, Rt. 1, Cornelius was filling a low place in his pasture about 2:30 p.m. when the accident occurred.

He backed a home-made trailer into the low place, and the trailer, picking up momentum, pulled the tractor over him.

He was killed instantly, Washington County Sheriff R. H. Bush said. Vanderzanden is survived by his widow and 13 children.

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Demo Mayor Slices Ribbon After Hassle But Governor Saves the Pieces for GOP

BALTIMORE (AP) — It was a beautiful morning. Tommy D'Alessandro hopped out of his limousine and bounced down the length of the pier, ready for the dedication.

As mayor of Baltimore, he was there to help officially open the new helicopter service between Baltimore and Washington, 35 miles away.

The shiny new ribbon was in readiness for the cutting. At one side stood a beaming public relations man.

D'Alessandro walked over to get the ceremonial scissors.

Well, you see, sir, you aren't actually going to cut the ribbon. The governor is going to do that. He's here, too. You are here to have your picture taken with him.

Tommy's smile froze, then melted away.

"Don't they know I'm mayor of this city?" cried D'Alessandro, a life-long Democrat. "If they're going to have a Republican cut the ribbon, I don't want to attend."

Picks Up Speed

His delivery picked up speed. "I never heard of such a thing. You don't think they would invite me down to Annapolis to break ground for the State House, do you?"

"I'm going home."

The public relations man hurried along in the swirl of D'Alessandro's wake. So did City Councilman Leon Rubenstein.

Tommy got into his car. It started off.

Rubenstein broke into a run. "Wait a minute, Tommy. Wait a minute. You can't leave. You're the mayor. You ought to attend."

"You can cut it. They just told me."

Mayor Mopes

"I don't care," moped the mayor. "I don't want them to change."

But finally, the mayor was cajoled back to the ribbon.

"What are you going to say to the governor?" someone asked the publicist.

"Please, let's leave well enough alone," the harried publicist said. Sympathetic words soothed the mayor's dander somewhat.

"You certainly should cut it."

"It does seem sort of silly that you weren't supposed to cut it."

The mayor erupted again. "I know it. It's just downright ridiculous."

Then the Republican governor, Theodore R. McKeldin, and Republican Sen. J. Glenn Beall, whom D'Alessandro is opposing for the Senate seat in November, met at the center of the ribbon.

A survey of state agencies' warehouse space in the Salem area might lead to construction or purchase of a central warehouse, John Richardson, state finance director, said Thursday.

Richardson, who ordered the survey, said it possibly could show that state agencies and institutions with the facilities of more warehouse space could buy in bigger quantities and thus save money.

But centralization or de-centralization of warehouse space will depend on the report, he added. The survey, to last all summer, will be conducted by William R. Hanson, Berkeley, Calif., who recently won his master's degree in public health at the University of California.
