Workshops Bid 11 Teachers From Valley

Eleven mid-Willamette Valley teachers, including three from Salem, will participate in curriculum workshops starting next week at University of Oregon and Oregon State College.

The five groups, each meeting daily for four weeks, will seek improvements to suggest in teaching of foreign languages, art and crafts, business education, industrial arts and health.

The workshops are sponsored by the State Department of Education in conjunction with the two schools. The program is under the direction of Dr. Joseph I. Hall of Salem, state curriculum director.

In the past two years, similar committees have studied and made reports suggesting improvements in teaching of mathematics, science, physical education, music, social studies, and language arts.

A four-engine DC-7 named "Salem" will take its maiden flight sometime next week as the newest United Air Lines coast-to-coast custom coach mainliner. UAL Salem agent Harold Sweeney said Friday.

The name was chosen to honor the 1000th DC-6 and DC-7 fuselage to be turned out by Douglas aircraft. It will be delivered to UAL Thursday.

Salem will probably never see its namesake, Sweeney said, because four-engine craft seldom touch at McNary.

Honored Masons Meet, Find They've Been Near Associates for 50 Years

It wasn't until nearly 50 years after Dr. Ray L. Tower and Dr. C. L. Boldgett had practiced in the same profession, in the same town, and had joined the same fraternal organization at the same time—that they met.

The peculiarity of their semidistant comradeship was revealed Friday when Salem Consistory of Scottish Rite 32nd-degree masons bestowed 50-year caps on the Salem pair.

The parallel lines of their lives began in 1902 in Yankton, S.D., where both men had dental practices. Later, Dr. Boldgett left Yankton but returned in 1908 when both men entered the Yankton Scottish Rite Consistory in the same class—still not acquainted. Their ways parted only recently when they were rejoined, this time face to face.

Both are past masters of Blue Lodges and are affiliated with Salem Blue Lodges. Dr. Tower, who lives at 1050 Summer St. NE, is a member of Alaworth Lodge 201 and has been a Salem resident since 1946. Dr. Boldgett, 853 Commercial St. NE, is affiliated with Blue Lodge 50 and has lived in Salem since 1919. Both are retired.

County Okehs Purchase of Trailer for Timber Hauls
Purchase of a \$350, two-wheel trailer to carry long timbers was approved Friday by Marion County Court. The trailer is necessary because of state laws regarding over-length loads, said John Anderson, county engineer.

County road department trucks have been stopped by state police because of long loads being carried without this type of trailer, but no citations have been received, officials said.

In other business, a public hearing of expected improvements of Glendale Ave. NE was set for Monday at 10 a.m.
