

Lawyer Attempts to Assure Eugene Mother Son Not Linked to Galindez

NEW YORK (AP) — Attorney Morris Ernst Wednesday sought to reassure the mother of a missing American pilot that her son had nothing to do with the disappearance of Jesus De Galindez.

Gov. Holmes To Address Legionnaires

ASTORIA (AP) — Gov. Robert Holmes Thursday will address the opening session of the American Legion's annual Oregon convention here.

Murphy himself later disappeared and the Dominican government announced that he had been killed by a jealous Dominican pilot who eventually committed suicide in remorse. Other sources have said Murphy was deliberately murdered by Trujillo agents because he knew too much about the Galindez case.

Ernst was hired by the Dominican government to investigate the Galindez case. He recently published a lengthy report in which he said there was not the slightest evidence to connect Trujillo's government with the disappearance.

Notes Made Public

However, Rep. Charles Porter (D-Ore) this week in Washington made public notes and a notebook said to be written by Murphy in which Galindez name is mentioned several times.

Porter said the Murphy notes demolish Ernst's contention that Murphy had nothing to do with the Galindez case and cast doubt on the entire Ernst report on the case.

Ernst Wednesday sent a telegram, released by his office here, to the flyer's mother, Mrs. Emma L. Murphy of Eugene, Ore. Ernst said:

"No matter what Jerry did he had nothing to do with the Galindez matter, even though your attorney and congressman is trying to prove that Jerry was either involved in or had knowledge of a kidnapping expedition."

Neuberger Raps Lumber Group For Conduct

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore) Wednesday released a letter he wrote to a Junction City, Ore., lumberman who said he is being used by the National Lumber Manufacturers Assn. "to embarrass me."

Neuberger accused the lumber group of reprehensible conduct in its opposition to the Neuberger bill designed to stop forced sale of timber on the Klamath Indian Reservation in Oregon.

The Oregon senator released a letter at a news conference here Wednesday that he wrote Nils Hult, Junction City, chairman of the association's forest management committee and author of a letter to a house committee opposing the bill.

As he told Hult "It is disturbing to me that you have let your good name be used" by the association "in an effort to thwart reasonable solution to problems" posed by the Klamath Termination Act.

More than four billion feet of timber is located on the 800,000-acre southern Oregon reservation. Some 77 per cent of the Klamath Indians have asked for liquidation of their share of the assets so that they may receive cash.

Under the existing law, the lands must be sold at the end of this congressional session.

Musicians to Picket Sites In Film Issue

NEW YORK (AP) — The American Federation of Musicians Wednesday announced 19 cities where it said picketing will begin Thursday at theaters showing the two movies, "10 North Frederick" and "Vertigo."

A spokesman said the executive board had taken the action in support of its Hollywood local's continuing contract dispute with major movie studios, and because the musical backgrounds for the two pictures were recorded abroad.

The picketing, he said, will not bar members of other unions from reporting to work at theaters, but is designed to inform the public of the union's grievance.

The cities include: Portland, Ore.

PORTLAND (AP) — The Retail Clerks union Wednesday said its members at Lipman Wolfe and Co. have voted to remove pickets from the department store in downtown Portland.

Lowell Ashbaugh, the union's secretary-treasurer, said the removal of pickets was favored by a 144-42 margin.

The picket line was placed at the store in 1957. The union said it was to protest the failure of Roberts Brothers to re-hire workers after it purchased Lipman.

GENEVA (AP) — David A. Morse, director general of the International Labor Organization, reports Moscow has invited an ILO mission to study union organization in the Soviet Union. The United States has invited a similar study of American unions.

Free Food for Needy Measure Gains in House

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill directing the secretary of agriculture to set up a food stamp plan to provide free food to the needy was approved Wednesday by a House Agriculture Committee meeting boycotted by Republican members.

The vote was 18-1, the lone dissenter being the only Republican present, Rep. Robert D. Harrison of Nebraska.

Republicans on the committee walked out of a session Tuesday when Chairman Harold Cooley (D-NC) called for a vote on the bill. Several said they considered the measure impractical and too costly.

Under the plan, farm products would be made available to low income and needy groups. The plan would be financed by direct appropriations by Congress. The money would redeem food stamps issued by welfare agencies to certified needy people, who could exchange them for food at grocery stores.

Boat, Jewelry Stolen in Salem

Four separate larcenies including expensive watches and a boat totalling about \$225, in value were reported to city police Wednesday night.

Student Aid Bill Advances

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Education Committee agreed Wednesday to a program of aid to expand graduate study, including 5,500 fellowships and aid to institutions.

The program is a part of a general federal aid to education measure the committee has been considering.

A final committee vote on the bill may come Thursday.

Provisions approved, subject to change before the final vote, include a four-year 70 million-dollar scholarship program; 240 million dollars in matching grants to the states for four years for science teaching equipment; and a four-year 220-million-dollar student loan program.

State Food, Dairy Leader Heads Western Officials

O. K. Beals, Salem, chief of the State Agricultural Department's Food and Dairies Division, was elected president of the Western Association of Food and Drug Officials at its meeting in Las Vegas, Nev., this week.

A panel discussion on "How the Consumer Looks at Food and Drug Enforcement" was included in the program. Dorothy Sherrill, consumer marketing specialist with Oregon State College, was a panel member.

NEWBERG (AP) — State Rep. George Layman (R-Newberg) Wednesday said he wants to be the next speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives—if he is re-elected—and if the Republicans win control of the House in the November election.

Layman, now completing his third term as a representative from Yamhill County, is one of five Republicans who, if re-elected, will have served consecutively for the last three terms.

There will be no other members of the House in either party who will have seniority based on continuous service, he said.

Letter Writers Urged to Include Zone Numbers

Leaflets urging letter writers to use zone numbers on addresses when applicable are being distributed this week to every mail patron in Salem.

The notices are being distributed by Salem Postmaster Albert C. Gragg in an effort to speed up mail delivery in 106 cities which use zone numbers. These cities are listed on the notice.

Salem has made application for the right to institute delivery zoning, and Gragg said he expected an answer "in the very near future." The city would be divided into eight zones, running from two to nine.

Night Recreation Provided for State Prison Convicts

Evening recreation for selected convicts at Oregon State Penitentiary is now providing an unusual experiment at the prison.

Warden Clarence T. Gladden has set up the recreation program for some 50 men in a minimum-custody cellblock. Part of C-block has been arranged so the men can read, write, visit or play games there at night until 10:30.

The warden said he hoped the plan could be extended to other parts of the prison later.

Four Aboard Carrier Hurt; Pilot Killed

SAN DIEGO, Calif., (AP) — Four crewmen aboard the aircraft carrier Bon Homme Richard were seriously injured Tuesday when a jet fighter crashed on the flight deck, killing the pilot, the Navy reported Wednesday.

Pacific Fleet Air Force headquarters here identified the pilot as Lt. Cmdr. Richard M. Hopfinger of Air Development Squadron 3, China Lake, Calif. His widow, Beulah Jeanne, and three children live at China Lake.

Among those taken to Oakland Naval Hospital with second and third degree burns was Marion Edward Fuller, fireman apprentice, of Fort Valley, Ga.

The Navy said Hopfinger's F4B Fury jet crashed into the end of the flight deck as he returned from an in-flight refueling operation off the coast of northern California the four crewmen were on the deck at the time.

The plane fell into the water and Hopfinger's body was not recovered, the Navy said.

Logging Truck Driver Crushed

MITCHELL, Ore. (AP) — A logging truck veered off a road Wednesday and the driver was crushed beneath its load.

State police said he was Raymond G. Addison, 27, Prineville, Ore., a driver for Hudspheth Pine Inc.

The truck veered off Highway 27 just east of this Central Oregon town late Wednesday. The vehicle overturned, and logs crushed Addison.

Sex Magazines Target of Group

CORVALLIS (AP) — Magazines that emphasize sex are the target of a citizens committee organized here by Dist. Atty. John Fenner.

Fenner said the committee, composed of a lumberman, school official, housewife and magazine distributor, will evaluate the magazines and indicate which ones are not desirable.

Those under fire, he said, are the ones which have a "deleterious effect on the minds of young people."

The committee hopes to co-operate with distributors and retailers, Fenner said. The support of the community will determine the success of the program, he said.

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
