

Oregon Guardsmen Come Near Clash With Washington Youths

OLYMPIA (AP) — A potential skirmish involving more than 100 teenagers and young National Guard trainees was averted here Thursday night, Police Chief Roy L. Kelly reported Friday.

City police, Thurston county deputy sheriffs, state patrolmen, police and sheriff reserves and a detachment of military police from nearby Ft. Lewis were called in to break up the milling crowd of young men, that had congregated at a drive-in restaurant at the eastern edge of Olympia.

Fiery End for Explorer III Expected; Reports Lacking

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP) — Explorer III was due to plunge to a fiery death in the earth's atmosphere Friday, but by midnight no witness reports were available.

Army scientists said that the tiny man-made moon and its companion, Explorer I, have proved that man can control the temperature of space vehicles within ranges easily acceptable for human survival.

In radio broadcasts back to earth the Explorers also reported that cosmic radiation at higher altitudes is considerably more intense than had been anticipated. They also recorded atmospheric density several times greater than had been predicted in pre-satellite calculations.

Friction with the atmosphere as it zoomed erratically through space doomed Explorer III to an early death. Explorer I is expected to circle the earth for another seven years.

Explorer III was launched at Cape Canaveral, Fla., March 26. Its highly elliptical orbit carried it as far as 1,700 miles from the earth, and as near as 117 miles in its early stages.

Explorer III transmitted four separate signals until its batteries died two months ago. They told about the temperature, and the frequency of meteorites and cosmic rays.

Explorer II fell back into the atmosphere and was destroyed shortly after being launched.

Explorer III was an 80-inch tube

weighing 31 pounds. Scientists estimate that it had travelled more than 32 million miles as its doom neared.

Ike Worried Over Foreign Aid Cutback

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower reported himself Friday to be deeply distressed over a House Appropriations Committee slash of \$72 million dollars from the foreign aid funds he asked. Saying he hoped and believed that this cut would not stand up the rest of the way through Congress, Eisenhower added in a statement that if it did: "I fear there will be important losses for the free world and a serious decreasing of the security of the United States."

The committee recommended \$3,978,092,500 in new funds for the program for the fiscal year beginning next Tuesday. Its action preceded by only an hour House passage of a separate bill authorizing a \$3,975,992,500 aid program for the year.

Later in the day, the Senate similarly passed the authorization bill, sending it to the White House. The authorization measure merely sets a ceiling and the terms for expenditures, which are determined by actual appropriations. Congress often authorizes bigger programs than it eventually finances.

Eisenhower originally had asked for \$3,960,092,500 in new aid funds.

Phony Phone Calls Traced

TURNER—Eight days of mysterious and demanding phone calls to the Junior Whitfield home ended Friday morning as police apprehended a 14-year-old local boy.

Police Chief John Rose said the first call was received a week ago Thursday, demanding to know where the family was hiding a Billy Whitfield. The couple knew no one of that name. A second call was made the same day, and eight during the following week.

By the final one Friday morning, police were waiting to trace the call through the telephone company.

Calls were made when his parents were not home, the police chief was told by the boy.

"We most certainly will appeal," said Nobuo Inaki, Kupski's lawyer. He had predicted an acquittal.

Jets, Artillery Blast Rebels In Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Jet planes, artillery and armored cars thundered into action Friday against rebel forces slashing at Lebanon's hard-pressed government. An army communiqué said rebel attacks were stopped on four fronts in a new spread of fighting.

The pro-Western regime of President Camille Chamoun was facing the hardest challenge of the seven-week-old rebellion.

Sporadic shooting and bomb blasts echoed through Beirut Friday night.

Heavy fighting broke out in Beirut's Basta Moslem quarter in the morning and again in the afternoon. Machine gun and rifle fire and both mortar and bomb explosions shook the city.

Rebel fighters opened a heavy attack on army positions on Mt. Tereol in north Lebanon, but were driven off after jet planes and artillery were thrown in to support the troops, the communiqué said. It claimed the rebels outnumbered government troops 5-1 in that action.

Indiana GOP Puts Handley In Senate Bid

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Gov. Harold W. Handley was nominated for U.S. senator Friday at a cut and dried Republican state convention enlivened chiefly by the keynote oratory of retiring Sen. William F. Jenner and Handley's acceptance speech.

Handley's only opponent, State Sen. D. Russell Bontrager of Elkhart, went down to the wire in his hopeless contest but got only 688 votes to Handley's 1,967. Both are members of the party's conservative wing.

Handley for the first time answered the criticism leveled against him by his Democratic opponent, Mayor Vance Hartke of Evansville.

As to Hartke's calling him a Jenner stooge, Handley said both he and Jenner always have run on their own records. But, he added, as to lifetime friendship and sharing of conviction, "I'm with Bill Jenner all the way."

Conspicuously absent from the proceedings was the entire nine-member Hoosier GOP congressional delegation, which has not been friendly to Handley's ambition to leave the governor's chair in midterm for the Senate.

Sen. Homer E. Capehart and former Gov. Ralph F. Gates, the national committeemen, were on the platform although neither has supported Handley's candidacy.

Mrs. Lipp of Salem Dies

Mrs. Emma Lipp, a resident of the Salem area for about 40 years, died Friday in a Salem nursing home. She was about 92 years and had been in the nursing home for the last 2½ years.

She was the grandmother of Russell Pratt, of Capital City Transfer Co. in Salem.

Born in the East, she moved to this area in 1918. Her husband, Edwin S. Lipp, who died in 1932, farmed in the Chemawa area for many years.

Mrs. Lipp resided with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Pratt of Salem after the death of her husband. Her son-in-law Charles Pratt survives.

Other survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Fred Braghetta, Stockton, Calif., and a number of grandchildren.

Services are pending at the Clough-Barrett Funeral Home.

Welfare Worker Mauled; 5 Doukhobors Arrested

VICTORIA, B. C. (AP) — Five chanting Doukhobors were arrested Friday in the office of the provincial superintendent of child welfare after she had been mauled scratched and had her clothing torn.

The three women and two men, all members of the religious sect's Sons of Freedom branch, were charged with assault and held for police court appearance Saturday.

The welfare superintendent, Miss Ruby McKay, 56, was placed under a doctor's care but did not appear seriously harmed.

When police arrived, the kneeling group was chanting: "Give us back our children; please give us back our children."

The attack was said to have followed protests from the Doukhobors over keeping some of their children in public school near Nelson, B. C., during the summer months.

The five under arrest were identified as Mrs. Ann Barisoff, Mrs. Tiny Esavoloff, Mrs. Nastia Barisoff, Tim Jmaeff and William P. Dvornikoff, all from small towns in the Kootenay country of interior British Columbia where the Doukhobor colony is centered.

Later reports said the group may not have meant Miss McKay any harm but intended to strip off her clothing. Doukhobors is a common form of Doukhobor protest.

Oregon's Birth, Marriage Rate Lowest in U.S.

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon had the lowest birth rate and the second lowest marriage rate in the nation last year.

The vital statistics section of the Oregon Board of Health also said that Oregon had more deaths in 1957 than in any year in its history and the lowest divorce rate in the last 30 years.

The agency said that deteriorating economic conditions and the fact that Oregon's population is somewhat older than the national average contributed to the low birth rate.

Statisticians speculated also that a trend toward early marriages among teenagers during the past few years may also be responsible for the low marriage rate.

Another reason for the low birth and marriage rate was the smaller number of eligible persons resulting from the low birth rates during the depression years.

The Oregon birth rate in 1957 was 21.8 births per thousand population. The estimated national rate is 25.0.

The Oregon marriage rate was 5.7 per thousand population. The U. S. rate last year was 8.9.

The state's divorce rate was 3.0—the lowest in 20 years. More than half of these divorces involved children and 20 per cent of them occurred prior to the second anniversary of the marriage.

The state's death rate was 9.0 per thousand, slightly above the 1956 figure. The highest death rate was in the city of Portland with 11.3. The lowest was the 5.4 in Benton County.

Killer of State Senator Hangs Self in Hospital

COLUMBIA, S. C. (AP) — Henry A. Rogers, the slayer of a South Carolina state senator, hanged himself in pre-dawn darkness Friday in a dormitory in the state mental hospital.

Five other patients slept while the 67-year-old Marlboro County clerk of court and a long-time political leader fashioned a crude gallows from his bed, a belt and a wall composed of a network of steel wires.

Dr. William S. Hall, the hospital superintendent, said Rogers apparently looped the belt around his neck, and fastened it to the network of wires, then jumped from the bed.

Rogers walked into the Marlboro County sheriff's office the night of South Carolina's Democratic primary June 10 and fired a volley of pistol shots into State Sen. Paul A. Wallace, 56-year-old veteran of 10 years service in the State Legislature.

Wallace was listening to election returns assuring him of an other term in the Senate when the bullets ripped into him.

There were no political implications in the shooting. Friends said there had been a dispute over the amount of an oil bill Rogers said Wallace owed him.

Rogers was admitted to the hospital June 13. The mental tests ordered for him had not been completed, Dr. Hall said.

Dr. Hall said attendants are on duty in the area all night long, and that Rogers had been checked just a few minutes before he hanged himself.

U.S. Fires 2 Nuclear Shots

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two nuclear test detonations, an hour apart, took place in the Pacific Friday at Eniwetok Atoll.

A joint announcement by the Atomic Energy Commission and the Department of Defense said one occurred at 1:30 p.m. EDT and the other at 2:30 p.m.

The tests are part of the Hardtack nuclear weapons tests series now under way at the Eniwetok proving grounds.
