WASHINGTON (AP)—A Federal Civil Defense Administration said Friday a national plan has been drafted detailing every level of government responsibility in event of an enemy attack.

Thieves Rob, Dump Envoy Into Creek

WASHINGTON (AP)—Police reported that three men kidnaped and robbed a Polish diplomat and later dumped him into Rock Creek.

Police Capt. Nunzio Bonaccors said Marian Dobrasielski, 35, first secretary of the Polish Embassy, was seized early Friday morning, blindfolded and taken on a wild ride through city streets.

Dobrasielski reported he was robbed of \$25, his watch and a belt before the trio stopped in Rock Creek Park, attacked him and tossed him into the creek.

Jobless Total In Insured Ranks Down

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government reported Friday that the number of jobless insured workers had declined to a new 1958 low during the week ended June 14.

The Labor Department Employment Security Bureau said the total declined by 113,000 to 2,704,600. It was the ninth successive weekly drop. The bureau said all but three states reported job improvement and attributed it mainly to seasonal expansion in outdoor activities.

The data is tempered by the fact a growing number of workers have exhausted eligibility to further jobless benefits; an undetermined number of them are still unemployed and not showing up in the figures.

Insured unemployment is still more than double last year's total of 1,268,700 at this time.

The largest declines in insured unemployment were reported for the June 14 week by California 22,300, Ohio 15,000, Michigan, 10,600, and New York 9,300.

Initial claims for jobless benefits, indicating new job layoffs, dropped by 13,800 to 318,500 during the week ended June 21. This was the lowest number for any week since mid-November last year.

The 318,500 weekly total of new claims compares with 202,600 for the same week a year ago.

Simpson said the continuity in government plan had been developed by the FCDA and the National Guard has an important role in it. Speaking for the state governors, he testified to the Senate Armed Services Committee on the administration's defense reorganization plan.

The FCDA official said he knew of no emergency plan now in effect for all states. But he said his organization has a Continuity in Government Division in Battle Creek, Mich., which has been trying for about a year to get all levels of government to take four major steps in preparation for a possible atomic attack.

Progress Made
He said good progress is being made with the program, which calls on state, county and local governments to:

1. Legally set up a line of succession for all key officials.
2. Establish relocation sites at which government activities could be carried on. Some such sites have been set up by the federal, state and city governments and many are secret.
3. Provide for duplication of records and their storage in a safe place.
4. Establish emergency assignments for every government employee who does not already have such a duty.

Negro Paper Denies Vote Buying Story

BATON ROUGE (AP)—A Baton Rouge weekly newspaper for Negroes said Friday a story last week that aroused the wrath of the Louisiana Legislature was "erroneous."

The News Leader reported last week that the "First Ward Voters League, Inc." would pay \$25 to every Negro registering before the books closed for the congressional primaries.

The legislature reacted with a bill by Rep. William Percy of East Feliciana extending the state law banning buying of votes to include vote registration.

The proposal, drafted by the Joint Legislative Committee on Segregation will be up for committee action next week.

"We aren't sponsoring it," said Leslie Barnum, managing editor. "We merely carried the announcement. Of course we're sympathetic with their desire for more voters."

"We lend our support to it. When we found our information was erroneous, we apprised our readers of it."

On its latest front page, the News Leader said:

"Unregistered voters were stirred up to increased action last week when the First Ward Voters League, Inc., announced in the News Leader it would give \$15 to every new voter as of June 18, but the announcement was erroneous."

"What the News Leader learned later was that every new voter would be eligible to participate in a drawing for \$15 sponsored by the organization."

Young Trujillo Plans 'Bang-Up' Party on Yacht

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Zsa Zsa Gabor's ballyhooed party for Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr. next month is merely a warmup for a really swinging affair aboard the handsome general's yacht.

That's what the son of the Dominican Republic dictator said Friday in an interview.

"At Zsa Zsa's party I will have a chance to meet many people," Trujillo told Mirror-News columnist Paul Coates. "Then I can select the ones to invite to my party on the boat."

Zsa Zsa is in charge of the party July 8 at the ritzy L'Escoffier hotel at the Beverly Hilton Hotel. But Trujillo said he's picking up the tab.

"It's the only way to do it," Trujillo said. "I want to have a party on my boat, but I can't invite people until we have been properly introduced."

Multnomah GOP Again Selects Robert Jordan

PORTLAND (AP)—The Multnomah County Democratic Central Committee will be headed another year by Robert Jordan, a Portland attorney.

The committee unanimously re-elected him and named Mrs. Gustava Thompson alternate vice chairman. Jordan said she is the first Negro elected to major party office in Oregon.

Mrs. Thompson, a former president of the Richmond Parent-Teachers Assn., is secretary of the Portland chapter of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People.

British Admit Envoy Tried to Smuggle Czech

LONDON (AP)—Britain admitted Friday night a British diplomat was caught by Czechoslovak frontier guards April 3 while trying to smuggle a Czechoslovak into West Germany.

The Foreign Office said, however, that the diplomat was framed by the Czechoslovaks.

The admission came after the Czechoslovak Embassy here announced that Eric Page Bedford had been expelled on charges of spying and accepting a bribe. Bedford was a visa examiner ranked as second secretary. He has since quit the foreign service.

'Selling Secrets'
The Czechoslovaks claimed Ladislav Machacek had been selling military secrets to Bedford. When suspicions were aroused, Machacek was alleged to have paid Bedford the equivalent of \$14,000 to take him out of the country in the luggage compartment of the Bedford car. Another \$4,200 was to have been paid if the attempt succeeded, the Czechoslovaks said.

Bedford and his wife were caught and given 48 hours to leave the country.

The Foreign Office admitted Bedford had agreed, without telling his superiors, to smuggle Machacek out of the country. But it added, "It is clear that this was a deliberate frame-up on the part of the Czechoslovak authorities when Machacek was discovered. He showed no sign of fright or distress."

Profit Denied
Bedford denied he did it for money, the Foreign Office statement said. The statement also pointed out that the Czechoslovak charge of spying was voiced for the first time Friday.

Bedford was not available for comment.

Earlier this week the Czechoslovak military attaché in London was accused in British spy trial of obtaining military secrets from a British engineer.

River Level To Jump for Snagged Boat

BROWNLEE, Idaho (AP)—Idaho Power Co. will increase the flow of the Snake River below Brownlee Dam Saturday in an effort to free a stranded river boat.

The additional 5,000 second feet of water is expected to reach the boat Sunday, resident engineer Gomer Condit said Friday.

The 52-foot boat, the Wenaha, became stranded Wednesday night.

Condit said the flow of the Snake River as measured downstream at the Oxbow Dam construction site, had been reduced from 23,400 second feet to 9,600 feet.

The flow was reduced to fill the Brownlee Reservoir and make it easier to close a cofferdam at Oxbow, Condit said.

Condit said 9,600 feet is almost twice the minimum amount required by the company's Federal Power Commission license. It is approximately the normal flow for this time of year.

The engineers said the flow into the reservoir, measured at Weiser, was 15,800 second feet.

The Wenaha, owned by the Inland Navigation Co. of Portland, became stranded on a rock about five miles downstream from the Pleasant Valley dam site. Its 10 passengers were flown to Lewiston.

Inland said it has not decided whether to continue passenger, mail and supply runs up the Snake River from Lewiston with the boat. Officials said a decision will probably be reached by July 1.

Ship Pact Signed

WARSAW (AP)—Poland signed a contract this week for delivery of 24 ships aggregating 64,000 tons to Indonesia by 1962.

Foster Galligan, OFM, who have just finished theology at Santa Barbara; and Rev. Simeon Vandervelde, OFM, who has been at Central Catholic High School in Portland.

Mrs. Chiang Calls for Aid In Red Fight

NEW YORK (AP)—Mme. Chiang Kai-shek Friday called on the free world to support countries fighting communism and stop helping neutrals.

The wife of the Chinese Nationalist President discussed world problems—particularly the Chinese problem—with a small group of reporters she invited to tea. She looked youthful and attractive in a navy blue silk gown.

"The free world," she said, "should not countenance neutrals who are trying to play one side against the other. If they do, the countries fighting communism are going to ask: Why should we fight when the neutrals sit on the fence and get just as much as we do?"

It was Madame Chiang's first meeting with the press since her arrival in New York from Formosa several weeks ago for medical treatment. She said she plans to go to Ann Arbor July 9 to receive an honorary degree from the University of Michigan. After that she will go to Washington for an official visit.

Court Rules Woman May Keep 49 Dogs

NEW YORK (AP)—A little gray-haired woman who shares her home with 49 dogs she calls her babies is going to be allowed to keep them despite neighbors' complaints.

But a court ruled Friday she must turn all but two over to the Society For Prevention of Cruelty to Animals for 10 days while she cleans out her four-story brownstone house on the Upper West Side.

The thought of even temporary parting brought tears to Mrs. Martha Hinrichson, 65, the owner.

"That's nothing but murder," she told Magistrate Walter J. Bayer. "Please, please, please, you can't take them away. They'll get sick in cages, go crazy."

Bayer, paroled her for sentencing until July 1 with the understanding she make her home "fit for both dogs and human beings."

Mrs. Hinrichson said she spent \$17 to \$25 a day for their food on income derived from rentals on houses she owns.

Salem Student Wins National Education Office

BOWLING GREEN, Ohio (AP)—Wilfred Blalock of New York City has been elected president of the Student National Education Assn. Blalock, who attended Winston-Salem Teachers College, is the first Negro ever to hold that post.

Other new officers include Robert Myers of Salem, Ore., and Oregon College of Education, parliamentarian.

Boat Trip With Girl, 11, Brings Man Prison Term

SEATTLE (AP)—An 11-times married Seattle man who vanished for several days with his 12-year-old stepdaughter on a boat trip last month, was sentenced Friday to a maximum of 20 years in the state prison.

Darrell A. Rubens, 34, had pleaded guilty to a morals charge involving the girl. He blamed liquor.

Superior Judge Lloyd Shorett, who pronounced the sentence, recommended that Rubens' minimum term be fixed at 10 years.

Rubens and his stepdaughter were found on Vancouver Island several days after they left Seattle in a rented cabin cruiser.

Bypass Threatened

SINGAPORE (AP)—Twelve international airlines this week threatened to bypass Singapore airport with jet airliners of the future if the city fathers abandon the projected modern air terminal building in a current economy move. The lines contend old facilities can't handle 160-passenger planes that are coming.

Exiled Hungarian Declares Nagy Executed in Moscow

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—A Hungarian exile spokesman has charged that ex-Premier Imre Nagy and Gen. Pal Maleter of Hungary were tried, sentenced and executed in Moscow.

Bela Fabian of New York, chairman of the federation of Hungarian Former Political Prisoners, made the charge Friday in an open letter to E. Ronald Walker of Australia, chairman of the U.N. Special Committee on Hungary.

Fabian also charged that a trial is in the making for Lutheran Bishop Lajos Ordass, recently ousted from his post by the Hungarian government.

Communist Hungary itself refused to answer the committee's request for information on where and when Nagy, Maleter and two Hungarian journalists were tried and executed for their roles in the 1956 Hungarian uprising.

Fabian's letter offered as evidence on the executions:

1. Rumors originating in Communist circles in Budapest.
2. The fact Nagy had not been seen in Budapest or in any Hungarian prison since his arrest by Soviet troops.

3. A Hungarian in which the published judgement was phrased, indicating "the test was probably translated ... from the Russian."

Neuberger Asks Mail Facility at Portland Airport

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) Friday proposed an airport facility at Portland, Ore., to speed handling of air mail.

Neuberger in a letter to Postmaster General Summerfield, renewed his request of two years ago for expanded mail facilities at the Portland airport.

Neuberger said the facility must be established if increased speed by airliners "is to be translated into an actual saving of time in the movement of a given piece of mail."
